Tigers, Wildcats Will Do Battle Friday in Season Grid Opener

Hico Tigers will lift the lid on the 1964 football season this Friday at the local stadium when they entertain Godley's Wildcats in an 8 p. m. encounter. This will be the third meeting of the two teams with Hico victorious in the past two.

Coach Jack Barnett has declared his charges ready for the open-

er, and expects the boys to give a good account of themselves.

Godley will field a team that out-weighs the Tigers by approximately 24 pounds per man, which has caused some concern among the coaches. However, Godley was one of the largest teams that the Tigers met last year, and the final count in that game was 24-22, Hico on top.

Coach Barnett has indicated that he would start a team composed of Ronnie Partain and Jas. Crews at ends, James Johnson and Reece Giesecke at tackles, Edmund Horton and Edwin Black at

guards James Randals or Dwain Fall at center, Charles Erick at quarterback, Mike Gravette and Alan Solsbery at halfbacks, and Dwain Gray at fullback. All of the starters are lettermen.

Erick and Solsbery are the two most experienced on the starting team, both seeking their fourth letters. The other two backs, Gravette and Gray, are red-shirts (ineligibles) from last season, and are being counted on heavily to fill the gaps left by the departing Jerry Casey and Bill Rutledge.

In the line, all of the starters are numeral winners, with James Johnson standing out as an all-district performer last season. H: teams with Giesecke, largest man on the team at 180 pounds, at the tackle slots. Both guards, Horton and Black are lightweights, and the two starting ends, Crews and Partain, could be considered featherweights at 140 pounds each.

Should any of the above-named

starters falter, Coach Barnett has 22 others squad members waiting in the background to take over.

The team has displayed excellent spirit during the long work-out period, and the coaching staff is hopeful that the group will make up for their lack of size with their desire and attitude.

Backs: James McGehee 190, Larry Carrell 150, Ben Smelley 160, and Ricky Thurston 150.

In a scrimmage session last Thursday night against Granbury B team, the Tigers showed up exceptionally well, but the caliber of opposition was very doubtful, and it was hard for the coaches to get a true picture of what to expect from the team.

Stadium Improvements

Several improvements have been made at Tiger Stadium in preparation for the opener. Foremost is addition of public rest rooms on the east (home) side of the stadium. A visiting team dressing room has also been added.

The new scoreboard and clock is expected to be erected in time for the first game, giving Hico one of the better football plants in this area. The scoreboard was purchased by Hico Civic Club, in cooperation with Coca Cola Bottling Co.

Everyone is urged to attend the game Friday night and support the Tigers.

Meridian, Valley Mills Picked to Win District

It's coin-flipping time again in District 19-B with the Meridian Yellow Jackets and Valley Mills Eagles again waiting until the last night of the regular season to make the toss and decide the championship.

This has been the case for many seasons and 1964 will be no exception.

Both teams are fortified with fine manpower, plenty of experience, excellent men in the head coaching spots, great tradition and their burning bitterness in the rivalry between the two good Class B teams.

Both Meridian and Valley Mills will be among the top five Class B teams in Central Texas this fall. Meridian is the current champion, standing supreme last season with a 9-2-1 record and a regional championship, and is prepared to meet the oncoming year with 10 lettermen and seven seasoned starters.

Bill Real takes over the Meridian reins this fall and the Yellow Jackets are beginning to take excellent shape.

Larry Weeks, a Waco product, starts his first full season at Valley Mills and has 13 lettermen and seven starters ready for the war. Weeks took over the Eagle command after four games last year and finished brilliantly with a 5-1 record.

The only loss was a 14-13 decision to Meridian at Meridian on the last night of the season and decided the 19-B title.

Hico, Cranfills Gap and Evant all hope for improved seasons but are not expected to challenge for the crown. Hico looms as the league darkhorse this season should Meridian and Valley Mills falter.

Here is the team-by-team rundown of the league rivals in District 19-B this fall.

MERIDIAN

Real begins his Meridian program with a strong nucleus on hand from the Jacket squad that captured the regional crown last year.

The likable mentor is getting oriented daily on the pros and cons of Central Texas football and by the season kickoff on Sept. 11 against mighty Clifton, he should be well informed.

Real is counting on a solid defense, a good running game when it develops, and a fine passing attack triggered by veteran junior quarterback Don Hennessee returning at 170 pounds. Joe Allen (170) will give the Jackets fine running power at fullback and Real is trying to solve his half-back vacancies with Don Gandy (140), Pat Close (135) and Kenny Baucom (140).

Key losses from the winning Meridian team included Jimmy Smith, John Allen, James Parks and Mike Close.

The Jacket interior line will be a magnificent one with Tommy Belcher, 185, returning at center, Dowell Josey, 145 and Allen Alford 145 at guard and Ted Sivard 275, and Dale Smith 190, at tackle. Jimmy Heath or Nolan Trimble will be at one flank position with veteran Bill Shields, 185, at the other spot. The line will be big, fast and mobile and will deal enemy offenses a rugged time.

Probable finish—first or second.

VALLEY MILLS

Weeks expects a slight rebuilding campaign during the early games but the Eagles should be going full steam when Meridian rolls into town on Nov. 20.

The Eagles will be sound at the halfback spots with veterans Geo. Tenant, 140, and Jimmy Denton, 143, returning. Rusty Pickens, 150, will move into the fullback post, with Maurice Jaynes, 130, handling the quarterbacking chores. Jaynes started the last four games a year ago and Pickens started early in the season but was injured during the last half of the year.

Valley Mills will be lighter than usual in the line with only Joe Ficklin, 195, giving good size to cast at tackle. He will team with Gary Phillips, 162, and Reagan Greenhaw, 155, in the key tackle spots.

Jerry Ogle, 130, Glen Ficklin 135 and Joe Barnett 135, will man the flank positions with Bobby Olson 139 and Dick Owens 162, at guard

and Larry Jaynes 140 at center. Olson and Larry Jaynes are the only returning starters in the Valley Mills line.

Probable finish: first or second.

HICO

Coach Jack Barnett hopes for bigger and better things than the 3-6-1 record of 1963 and he gets 14 lettermen and eight sound starters returning for 1964.

Barnett will have a veteran at each of his starting positions as he prepares to spring some upset traps on Meridian or Valley Mills.

Either James Crews 140, Larry Shipman 140, and Ronnie Partain 145 are lettermen returning at end, and Reece Giesecke 180, and James Johnson 150 are veterans back at tackle.

Edwin Black 140, and Edmund Horton 160, are back for another year at guard, with either James Randals 150, or Dwain Fall 150, handling the center chores.

Charles Erick 130, will be gunning for his fourth letter at quarterback, with Mike Gravette 140, Leslie Royal 140, and Alan Solsbery 165, at halfback, and Dwain Gray 150 at fullback.

Probable finish: third.

EVANT

Six returning starters and some hefty linemen will give Coach Ed Mitchell a running start for more victories this season as the Elks hope to improve on their 5-5 record. Everitt Vandiver 206, and Bob-

by Doyle 194, will give Mitchell good size at the tackle, with Mike Graziel 195, anchoring the guard position along with Donald Parrish, 156.

Graham Wall is a returning starter at center and Mickey Lee 150, and Gary Standard 175, will fill in at end.

Mitchell will have two veterans returning to his backfield with Ronald Ray 160, back at quarterback and Sammy Gummelt 129, giving the Elks a basis for a good running attack. Roger Medart, 143 steps into the other halfback spot with David Sims 158 at fullback.

Probable finish: fourth.

CRANFILLS GAP

Coach D. R. Thompson has 8 lettermen and five starters ready to lift the Lion hopes this season. The Gap finished with a respectable 5-3-1 record a year ago.

The Lions will have a fine backfield returning with Jerry Ditt-rich 150, back at quarterback for his fourth letter as a starter. Bob Viertel 155, and Jack Henderson 155, are starters returning at halfback and David Brinegar 165 is a letter winner back at fullback.

Only one starter returns in the line with Joe Hickox 160, back at center. From there Thompson will have new faces Danny Fin-stad 155 and Danny Rudd 160 at end, Robert Meissner 150 and Robert Amundson 145 at tackle, and Marvin Wickman 130 and Glenn Hanson 130 at guard.

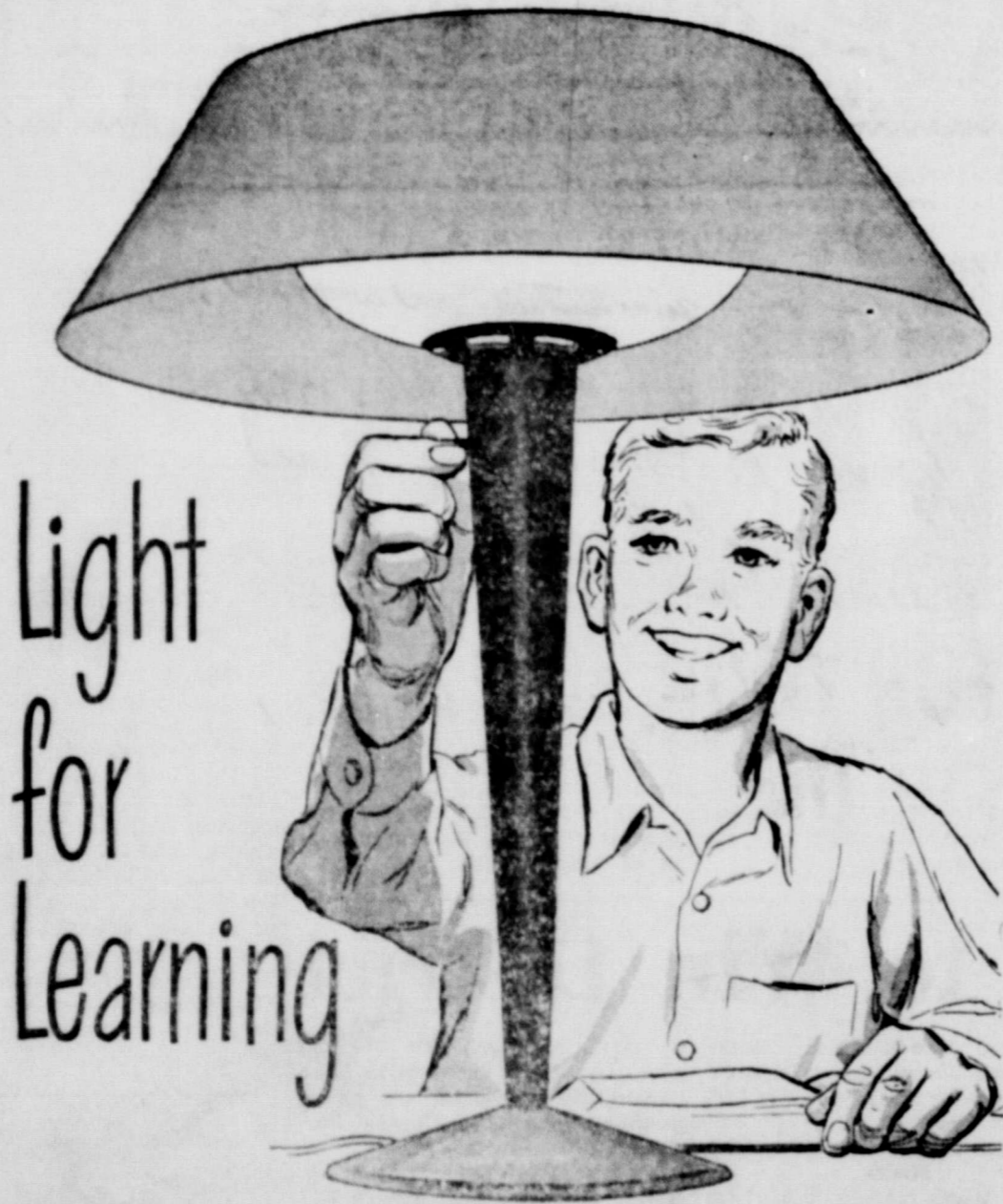

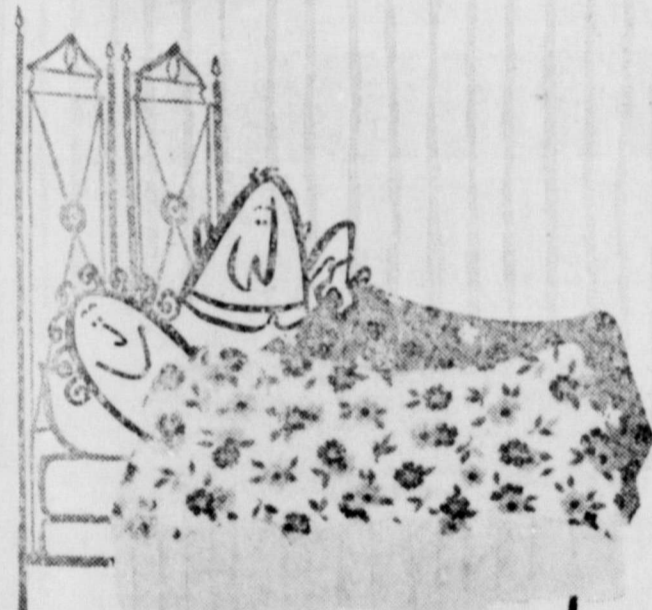

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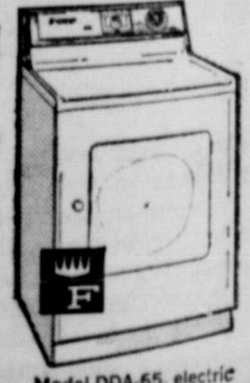
