## Hico Journeys to Blanket Friday For Battle of Bengals

With a victory and a tie to show for the season's work, and rated No. 10 Class B team in Central Texas, Hico's Tigers hit the road tonight, Friday, going to Blanket for a battle with an old foe which has death out everything but victories to the locals. In 12 years, the Tigers can point to only two wins, and both of these were at the local stadium. Never has a Hico team come up with a win at Blanket.

However, Coach Barnett said this week that his team would be in good physical condition, and that the squad was certainly in the right frame of mind following the win over Stephenville last week. He wouldn't predict a victory, but said the team would give a good effort.

Blanket has most of the team returning that downed the Tigers 16-6 last season, and Coaches Barnett and David Anderson are predicting a hard game. Coach An-

der has a personal angle on the game, Blanket being his home town.

## Tigers Clout Stephenville B Last Week

Former Hico star Bill Keeney made his coaching debut at the local stadium last Thursday night, and his hometown proved ruder hosts.

For it was the Keeney-coached Stephenville B team that provided Hico with its first victory of the year, and the way the locals did it added further insult to injury.

The Tigers used some fierce line play, good blocking and tackling, fine receiving by James Crews, and the talents of backs Charles Erick, Alan Solsbery, Mike Gravette and Dwain Gray to route the Bees 34-16.

The game, which was originally scheduled to be played at Stephenville, was one of the "big play" with the Tigers consistently able to come up with a big gainer at opportune times. Quarterback Erick mixed in just enough passes to keep the defense honest, completing four of eight attempts for 94 yards and one touchdown. He had two swiped by the Bees.

James Crews was the target on three of the completions, gaining 70 yards on the receptions, a 41-yarder going for the second TD of the night.

Mike Gravette was the leading ground gainer, stepping off 123 net yards, while Dwain Gray let go for 114 yards, and the workhorse of the night, Alan Solsbery, got 67 yards, all the hard way. Runs of 66 and 64 yards by Gravette and Gray, respectively, upped their total production.

The game was reasonably close until the third quarter, with Hico nursing a 6-0 lead at the half. The Tigers put together a 51-yard drive to chalk up the first TD with one minute, 50 seconds lapsed in the second quarter. Alan Solsbery got his first touchdown of the year with a two-yard blast.

Hico cranked up with the second half kickoff, and marched 68 yards in five plays for their second TD. The last 41 yards of the drive came on a pass play from Erick to Crews. Crews took the ball at about the 30, and with Ronnie Partain warding off two defenders, waltzed into the end zone for his first touchdown of the year. Solsbery was true with his kick, and the Tigers were out front 13-0.

The locals made it 20-0 after one exchange, with Gray setting the stage with a 37-yard punt return to the Jacket 38. The soph fullback got the call seven plays later, and delivered with a 7-yard burst for the touchdown.

The Bees didn't play dead, and took the next kickoff 80 yards for their first marker. Gary Chandler got the six-pointer with a 12-yard run on the final play of the third quarter.

On the first play of the final quarter, Gray set sail for 64 yards and his second TD to put the game on ice. But the Tigers weren't through.

Following one series of plays by Stephenville, Mike Gravette got into the act, racing 66 yards to the end zone climaxing a series of plays that saw three touchdowns scored on a total of seven plays by both teams.

After the score was 34-8, Coach Barnett inserted the reserves, and Stephenville scored their final marker against a liberal sprinkling of bench-strength. For the second week in a row, the tiny Tiger line proved its mettle, out-hitting a larger team. The defense was also a deciding factor in the contest, giving the Bees a short yardage, but otherwise containing the visitors except for the two scoring drives.

Dedication of Pioneer Hall in American Legion Park at Hamilton has been scheduled for Sept. 27. The hall is the first permanent building to be erected at the old fair park site. Built from proceeds of Homecoming Association activities, the building is suitable for various community programs.

## Tuesday Tragedy Takes Life Of Woodroe Wolfe, 51

Woodroe Harmon Wolfe, 51, was killed shortly after 3:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon when equipment with which he was working came in contact with a power line at Iredell.

Wolfe was working on a water well at the home of Wayne Wellbourn north of Iredell when a steel boom he was raising came in contact with the wire.

He was a well driller and dairy-

man.

Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home ambulance rushed Mr. Wolfe to Hico Hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday in Hico First Baptist Church, with Rev. R. E. Tatum officiating. Burial was in Fairy Cemetery.

Mr. Wolfe was born at Fairy, and was a lifetime resident of Hamilton County. He had lived north of town for the past six years where he operated a dairy. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors are his wife; three daughters, Margo, Nellye and Jean of Hico; one son, Jim Wolfe also of Hico; one brother, Wendell Wolfe of Irving; three sisters, Mrs. Eva Edwards of Hico, Mrs. Edna Blue of Hamilton, and Mrs. Donnie Driver of Grand Prairie.

Hico schools were dismissed early Wednesday afternoon in order that children and teachers could attend the funeral services.

Lloyd Hyles, who was injured last Thursday morning while at work at Ogle Bros., was reported improving in Harris Hospital in Fort Worth. He was transferred there last Saturday.

## Lois Hanshaw Recognized for Electrical Projects

Local Future Farmer Lois Hanshaw was featured on the back cover of the September issue of "Coop Power," the REA paper. She is entering his second year Vocational Agriculture. His accomplishments in farm electrification earned him \$50.00 cash and award for Area IV in the Texas FFA Electric Awards Program. The award will be presented at an activity by a representative one of the 12 sponsoring electric companies.

Purpose of the award is to stimulate members of the FFA to attain useful knowledge of electricity, and its many uses, leading to complete and efficient use of electricity on the farm and in the home.

Following is reproduction of the story about young Hanshaw as it appeared in the REA paper:

Lois Hanshaw, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Hanshaw, as a member of Hico FFA Chapter, has accomplished a great deal in the field of electricity under the guidance of teacher Harold Walker.

His work at school and in his home shop has been outstanding. He has helped prepare a series of electric wiring demonstration projects for use in teaching the student on electricity as part of vocational agriculture training.

On the farm he took an old building and made it into a well-equipped farm shop. He extended electric lines from the meter pole to the farm shop and wired the electric service into the 60-amp service breaker box. He wired a electric circuit to handle a 180-watt welder which he used to repair farm implements. He wired a shop for lighting and provided an outside light for the loading dock near the barn. In the shop he wired two other 20-amp circuits for duplex electric outlets at work benches and around the shop where electric saw, drill, and other tools may be used. All electric wiring was inspected and found to meet safety standards.

Other work by Lois included the building of an air compressor that was welded to a frame and mounted by a pulley to a half hp electric motor. It is used to air automobile tractor tires, for cleaning and

other purposes. He made a fan from a blade and an old motor to remove fumes and ventilate while welding. Other work included rewiring of grinder and repair of electric cords and other things.

The training and experience in electrical work has been a big help to Lois and his family. He has put it to use in various ways and the farm implement work made possible by his shop enables him to do work outside his own farm.
