

## **Tigers Clout** stadium. Never has a Hico team Stephenville B

Former Hico star Bill Keeney made his coaching debut at the local stadium last Thursday night. and his hometown proved rude

Stephenville B team that provided Hico with its first victory of the year, and the way the locals did it added further insult to injury.

The Tigers used some fierce line play, good blocking and tackling, fine receiving by James Crews. and the talents of backs Charles Erick, Alan Solsbery, Mike Gravette and Dwain Gray to route the Bees 34-16.

The game, which was originally scheduled to be played at Stephenville, was one of the "big play' with the Tigers consistently able to come up with a big gainer at opportune times. Quarterback Erick mixed in just enough passes 2:30 p.m. Wednesday in Hico First to keep the defense honest, completing four of eight attempts for 94 yards and one touchdown. He had two swiped by the Bees.

James Crews was the target on three of the completions, gaining Hamilton County. He had lived 70 yards on the receptions, a 41north of town for the past six yarder going for the second TD of the night.






