We expect to complete this record as soon as possible. Those of you who read this and have relatives buried here that have no markers, won't you please write or call us and give these dates. Otherwise, that relatives' name may be recorded without the dates. If we are unable to contact you and we know this will save a lot of time in getting the list completed. We will appreciate your cooperation so much.

Work was completed at the cemetery last Wednesday. A complete mowing job and hoeing and raking of all supported lots, and making several fills on graves was accomplished. Mrs. R. W. Hutton had called us and asked us to try and get three large abortives cut at the W. J. Hutton lot. This we did, which helped the looks of the lot quiet a bit and ceased the damaging effects of the monument by one of them. Mrs. Hutton deposited \$5 at Hico to pay for the labor in removing them.

Other donations received were \$1 by Mrs. Jessie Edwards of Hico and \$1 by Roy Davis of Hamilton, who with his wife were at the cemetery to work their lot, and Roy borrowed the lawn mower and worked around the east side of their lot. We were fixing to take over and mow some as our helpers, Sammy Guinn and Jimmie Sellers worked until 3:30. We took over after the Davis left and run the mower until 5:30 to get the highest of the grass cut. It all looks real nice, but we feel sure there will be one more working before freezing weather sets in. Thanks to these donors and others who help from time to time.

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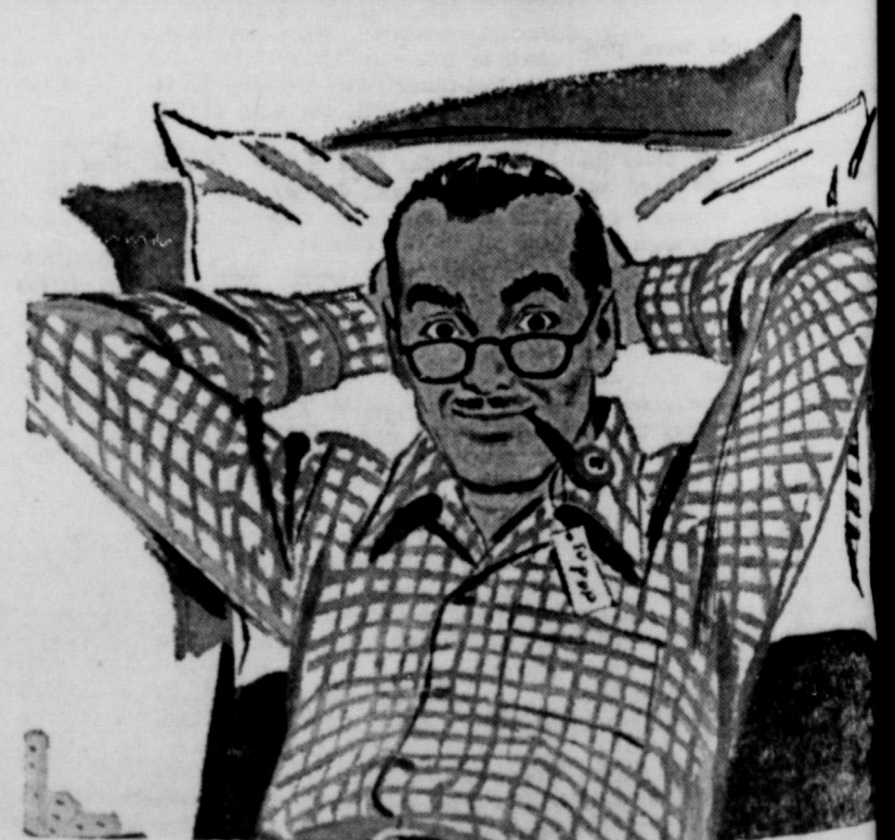

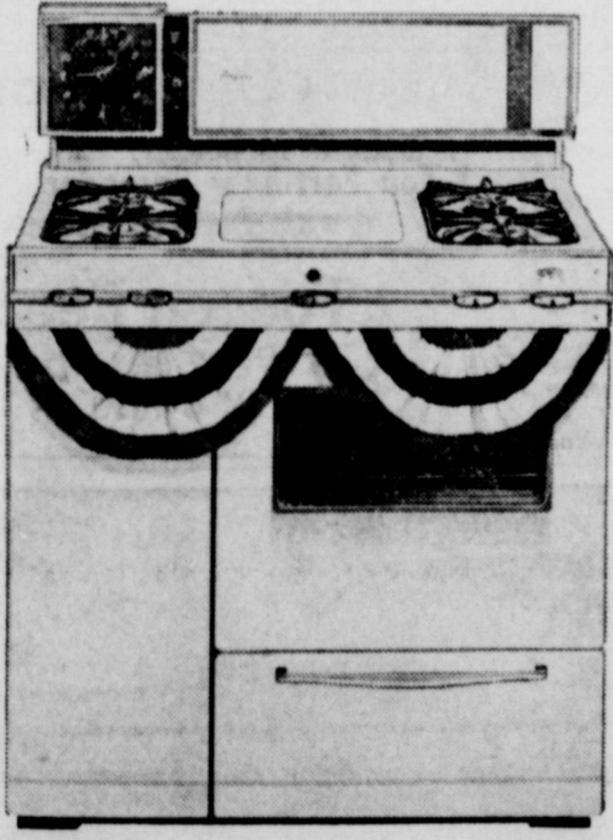

The president then read a letter from Susan Witcher, an FHA member from Clifton. The letter requested we attend the district meeting.

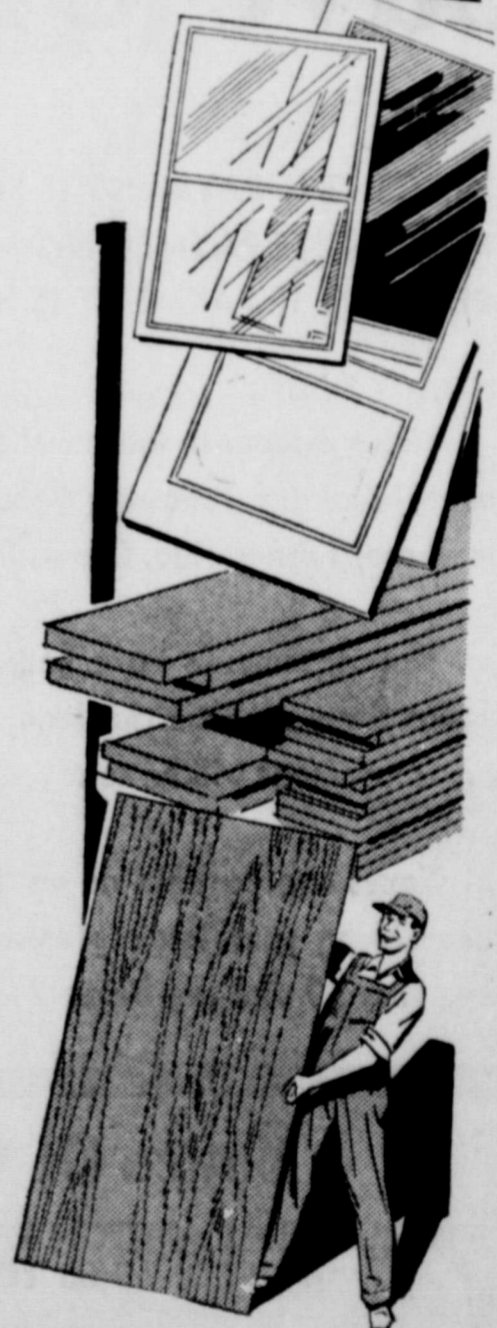
We elected Connie Smith as parliamentarian. We decided to get the Beau and the meeting was adjourned.

Mrs. Strother and Mrs. Johnson gave a demonstration on table setting and decorations.

Some basic rules are: 1. Tablecloths or place mats and napkins must all be immaculate.

2. Candles are used on the dinner table, but not at lunch. Use never less than four single candles or two candelabra.

3. The pattern by which knives, forks, decorative pieces, etc., are set on the table is geometric.

4. All forks (except the small cocktail fork, if one is called for) are placed at the left of the plate.

5. The glass for water belongs at the upper right above the tip of the dinner knife.

6. The bread and butter plate goes to the upper left of the plate with the butter knife laid either horizontally or vertically (more modernly) across it.

7. In formal or semi-formal service, a place plate is always at each place where dinner is served, and the napkin lies on it, or at the left of the forks.

Size of the mattress is also important. Many companies make up to nine different sizes. Length should be 6 to 8 inches greater than the height of the person using the bed.

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS By DeMARQUIS GORDON

The cool weather this week indicates that fall is really here and winter must not be far away. Most people got their jackets out of the closets early this week. On Monday morning I heard several farmers say that they may kill hogs Tuesday. Of course most of the people making that statement don't even own a hog but the first good cool norther always brings memories of a few years back.

When the first good norther of the fall came almost every farm family would build a fire under the wash pot and sharpen the butcher knives. It was time to kill the first fat hog. Soon there would be plenty of fresh pork chops, ribs and cracklings. The hams were salted and hung in the smoke house for curing.

The weather also reminds us that it will soon be time to pick up pecans. The pecan crop on yard trees seem to be better than usual this year. Mrs. Johnny Johnson said that she as the best pecan crop this year that she has had in a long time. She has some Texan pecans that are already falling. They are filled out very well. Those back yard pecans are going to be valuable this year because the commercial crop will be short.

The Texas crop is expected to be only about 45 percent of last year's crop. The national pecan crop will be only about one-third last year's crop. Hurricane Hilga may have reduced the estimates even more since Louisiana is a principal pecan state.

There are still several hundred acres of native pecan timber in Hamilton County that could be made productive and profitable if the trees were thinned and managed. If anyone in the county is interested in starting or continuing pecan management I will be glad to work with them. Late October and early November is a good time to evaluate pecan trees to determine which ones to leave and which to thin out.

When a neighbor is in need, farmpeople are always ready to give help. This was demonstrated in a dairy meeting which I attended in Hico last week. An accident took the life of a dairyman in the Hico area recently, and the dairymen wanted to give what help they could to the family. Some 20 Hico area dairymen at the meeting gave cash very generously to help this family. It makes everyone proud to know that this kind of spirit exists in our communities.

Fall army worms are still causing a lot of damage. Toxaphene-DDT or 2-1 mix can be used to control worms on small grain. You cannot graze dairy animals or animals being finished for slaughter. Other cattle can graze treated fields after four or five days. Use three to four pints of 2-1 mix per acre. Sevin can be used at the rate of two pounds of 50 percent wettable powder or one and a fourth pound of 80 percent wettable powder. If seven is used you can continue to graze stockers.
