Hico Winners at State Fair Listed

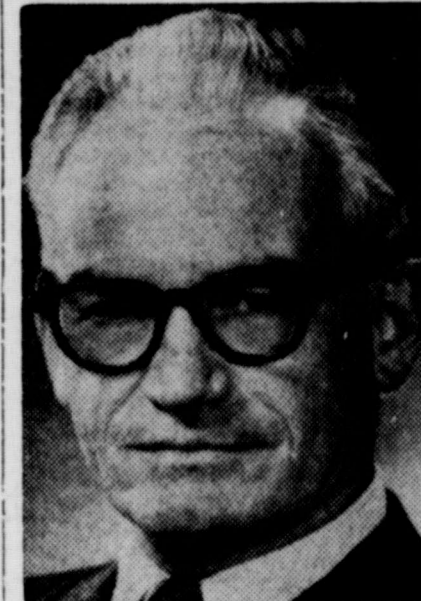
Hico and area winners in the Junior Dairy Show at the State Fair were named as follows:

Neil Ellis Serving as Student Math Teacher At Richland High

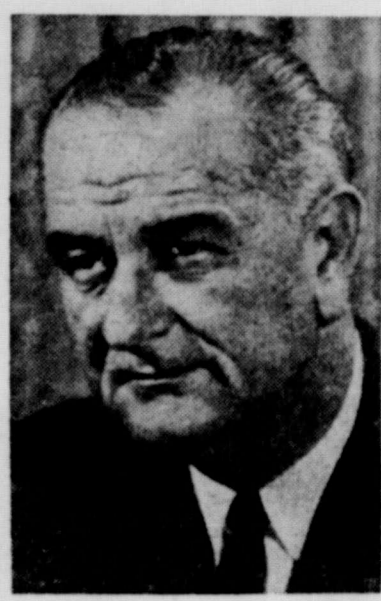
Denton, Tex.—Spl.—Jerry Neil Ellis of Hico is among 400 North Texas State University students serving as student teachers in Dallas, Fort Worth, and Denton area schools during the fall semester.
Some are teaching in area schools all day for nine weeks and others are training half a day for 18 weeks. A third group will spend the last nine weeks of the fall semester teaching all day.
An estimated 1,200 NTSU students are expected to participate in the teacher-training program during the 1964-65 school year.
Ellis, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Ellis of Hico, is teaching mathematics at Richland High in Birdville. He is a 1961 graduate of Hico High School, and is a member of Kappa Mu Epsilon, national mathematics honor society.

Nov. General Election Balloting Set Tuesday

Hico voters will join millions of other people next Tuesday, November 3, in a poll to determine the most popular man in the United States, politically speaking.
Tuesday is the day that many have been anxiously awaiting to prove that their choice of candidates is the most popular. And they have a choice. Democrats, Republicans, Conservatives, Liberals—they will all vote together in this election, and they have the choice of three specific parties in which to mark their ballot.

On the blanket-size ballot is listed Democratic, Republican, Constitution parties, and also a column for Independents, and still another for write-ins.

Foremost of the issues facing voters is the presidential candidates, Democrat L. B. Johnson and Republican Barry Goldwater. Taking only a slight back seat to the main attraction is the campaign for U.S. Senate from Texas where incumbent Ralph Yarborough is getting strong opposition from Republican George Bush. The latter contest, in some quarters, has drawn even more interest than the presidential campaign.

Most high state offices also have two and three party names listed on the ballot, with the one bearing most direct interest to local voters being that of Congressman from the 17th District, Democrat Omar Burleson is expected to retain his seat in Washington over Republican Phil M. Bridges.

In county politics, those candidates who won nominations in the June primary are "in" unless an unexpected write-in campaign crops up. There are no Republican candidates listed on the ballot for county or district offices.

Voters will also ballot on three Amendments to the State Constitution. Text of the amendments, as they appear on the ballot, reads as follows:

(FOR OR AGAINST) the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

(FOR OR AGAINST) the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts.

(FOR OR AGAINST) the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals 65 years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

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Following is listed four categories for voting qualifications in the Tuesday election.

1. You are a 21-year-old, first time voter, you are exempt from poll tax and need no receipt in Hamilton County.

2. Are 65 years of age, or older, and a resident of Hamilton County, you are exempt from poll tax and need no receipt.

3. Are a qualified voter, somewhere between the age of 21 and 65, and have a paid poll tax receipt.

4. Are a qualified voter, somewhere between the age of 21 and 65, have no poll tax, but have registered to vote for federal offices, before last March 6, you may vote for federal offices only.

Rotation grazing is a management practice which can be used by livestock men to increase the quality and quantity of forage produced. As it applies to tame pasture, several items must be considered to make it successful.

The number of pastures that will comprise the system must be considered. This will involve fence arrangement and fencing expense. A permanent fence may be involved to carry out a rotation grazing system. It may, however, be carried out successfully with an electric fence arrangement. The cost of fencing is variable, depending upon the type used.

To be most successful, pastures should be fenced in such a manner that each pasture will furnish approximately equal forage. This is essential to provide for equal rest and use for each pasture.

The number of pastures in the system will determine the days of use and days of rest for each pasture. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District assist cooperators plan and apply rotation grazing systems for improved pastures.

A system may be comprised of two, three or four pastures, depending upon the desires of the cooperator. A two pasture system can be planned which will provide for 14 days use and 14 rest for each pasture. A three pasture system provides for 10 days use 20 days rest. A four pasture system provides for 7 days use and 21 days rest.

A rotation grazing system is carried out during the growing season. It provides for growing and harvesting the vegetation during a 28 to 30 day growth cycle.

Based on studies at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, with a limited investment in labor and money in facilities, about 25 percent more production can be realized with rotational grazing than with conventional grazing.

Higher returns from other crops and land values make it necessary to use pasture land more profitably. The advantage of a rotational grazing system over conventional grazing are: 1. Better utilization of forage produced; 2. Increased production; 3. Maintain better quality of forage; 4. Better control of undesirable vegetation; and 5. Affords better management, including a fertilization program.

Game Warden Reports

By BOB RHUDY

The dove season will end at sunset October 30, with what I think has been a fair one. Due to the weather we have had it has been an on and off season—by this I mean some days there would be lots of birds in the area and other days they would be scarce or hard to find.

Most of the birds were in good physical shape although I did see some poor ones around the first of the season. The brood stock that we have left over after the season should do well as far as food in our area is concerned, because we do have an abundance of croton which is very good dove and quail food.

Goose season opens at sunrise Oct. 31, and will run through sunset Jan 13. There will be a five daily bag limit. Each hunter is instructed to be sure and pick up a Federal regulation brochure or contact the game warden for the number and species that may be legally taken in a bag limit. Again I might add that no migratory bird may be legally taken with any kind of rifle.

Duck season opens Nov. 25 and runs through Jan. 3. The daily bag limit will be four. Again I suggest that you pick up the Federal regulation brochure as to the number and specie that may be legally contained in a bag limit.

All landowners that received doe or antlerless deer permits last year are asked to come in on November 5 and 6 to receive these for the year. Joe Stevens and myself will be at the Bosque County court house from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on these two days for this purpose. If the antlerless permit area covers any more area than it did last year we will set up another day for the folks in the new area to come in for theirs before the season opens on November 14. So remember if you were in the doe area last year please come by on the days mentioned above. Also remember to bring with you a proof of ownership of the property for which you are getting permits. A tax receipt will be fine for this purpose. For you folks that want to send someone in for these please give them a letter of authority signed by you, the landowner. Again I will mention there will be no doe or antlerless permits issued in Hamilton County this year.
