Switch! Democrats Regain Edge In Hamilton County

In one of the biggest switches in history—the local level—Hamilton County voters endorsed the Democratic Party by a large margin in Tuesday's election.

People here will recall that this year they voted a Republican ticket in the last three presidential elections, and most observers felt that the county as a whole, and the local box in particular, would go Republican. However, that wasn't the case, with all Democratic candidates winning by margins over their Republican counterparts. Closest of the races

in the local box was that of U.S. Senate where incumbent Ralph Yarborough won re-nomination over George Bush by a count of 319 to 172.

While not a record, the 504 people that turned out was a clear showing of the interest that had been generated in this election.

The vote compares in number with 525 in 1952, 451 in 1956, and 457 in 1960.

Breakdown on the vote in the major races in the Hico box shows the following:

For President: Johnson-Humphrey 361; Goldwater-Miller 131.

For U.S. Senate: Yarborough 319; Bush 172.

For Congress, 17th District: Burleson 385; Bridges 99.

For Governor: Connally 375; Crichton 110.

Unofficial returns in the county shows the Johnson-Humphrey duo winning over Goldwater-Miller by a 2,095 to 1,101 count.

All three of the Constitutional Amendments on the ballot carried by large margins in the local box.

Commission Co. to Re-Open Thursday



NEW AUCTION OWNER — Mr. O. B. McCampbell will re-open Hico Commission Co. next Thursday, Nov. 12 with a 1 p.m. sale. The new owner has changed the sale day from Saturday to Thursday to encourage more buyers to make the Hico sale. Prior to coming to Hico, Mr. McCampbell had owned the Ranger Auction Co. for four years. He has more than 30 year's experience in the livestock business.

Mr. McCampbell, who has over 30 year's experience in the cattle business, has changed the sale day from the traditional Saturday to Thursday. First sale will be next Thursday, November 12, beginning at 1 p.m.

For the past four years, Mr. McCampbell has owned Ranger Auction Co. at Ranger, and prior to that he spent 27 years on the Fort Worth Stockyards. He has been a familiar figure in this area among livestock raisers the past several years, and has been in the livestock business all his life.

Local businessmen have received news of the re-opening enthusiastically, and have expressed their desire to work with, and help the new owner in any way possible. In turn Mr. McCampbell expressed his hopes that he would have full support from local business leaders and area farmers, ranchers and stockmen in making the Hico sale one of the most attractive in this area.

In changing the day of the sale from Saturday to Thursday, the new owner said, "The success of any sale is dependent upon having enough buyers present to insure a strong market. We intend to have plenty of buyers present for every sale, and a strong market is indicated for opening sale. We feel that more buyers can make the Hico sale on Thursday than can on Saturday, and that is our main objective—to have as many buyers and numbers of livestock available as possible."

The Commission Company will continue to buy hogs six days a week as in the past.

Mr. McCampbell said that he was looking forward to the opening next Thursday, and invites everyone in the area to attend. A display advertisement on page 6 of this issue contains a message from both the present owner and the Hill brothers.

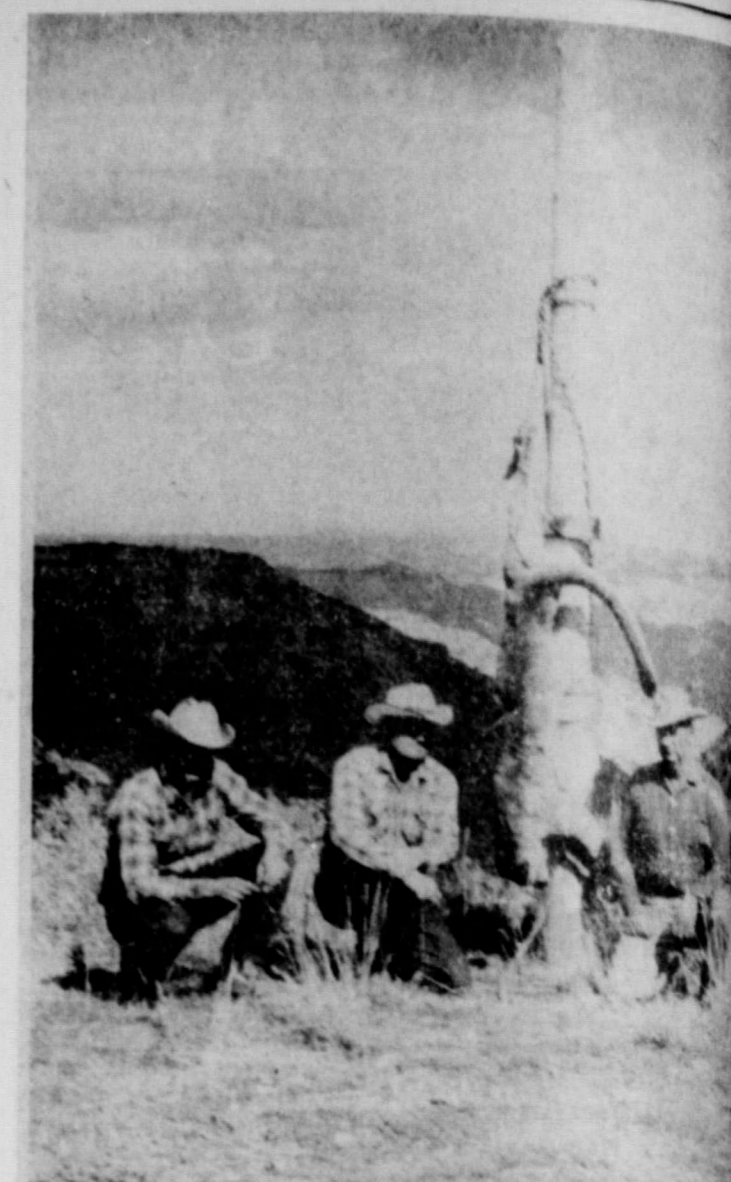
