Annual Report of Hamilton-Coryell District Given

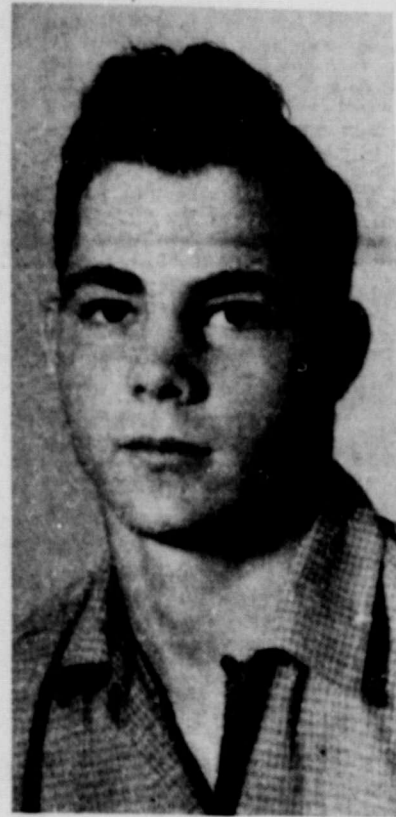

Bids Asked For New Post Office Quarters

The Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids for an improved building to house its postal operations in Hico, Postmaster General John A. Gronowski announced last week.

In telegrams received by R. E. Jackson, postmaster, and the News Review last Thursday, it was first thought that a complete new building would be erected here. However, the planning calls for renovation of existing buildings in Hico.

Under the Department's Lease Construction program, a contract will be awarded to the bidder who designates a

building suitable to the Department's needs and agrees to improve it according to departmental specifications and then lease it to the Department on a basic period of ten years, with two consecutive five-year renewal options.

The Department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

According to the telegram from Cong. Omar Burleson, the building is to be within

two blocks radius of the present quarters, contain 2128 sq. feet of interior space, 80sq. feet for platform, and approximately 3,500 square feet for parking.

Bidding documents will be available on or about November 29, and may be obtained from V. E. Bell, Real Estate Officer, P.O. Box 1386, Lubbock, Texas 79408, before December 19, 1964, which is the last day bids may be submitted. Mr. Bell will supply bidding forms, specifications, lease provisions and other information.

Bosque Soil Conservation District Holds Contests Here

The Bosque Soil Conservation District held its Annual Grass and Land Judging Contests for FFA members in its district at Hico Tuesday of this week. Approximately 64 Future Farmers from area schools participated in the contests.

Soil Conservation personnel from Stephenville, Glen Rose and Meridian set up and supervised the contests.

Grass judging included identifying 40 samples and checking characteristics, and the land contest represented four fields and was located at the Fillingim-Woodard Ranch.

Local Teachers Attend American Heritage Study

The Cen-Tex Study of American Heritage held its regular meeting Monday evening, Nov. 9 at Lampasas. The educators who participate in this study believe that Communism's accelerating ideological advances of recent decades can be reversed only through adequate instruction in public schools.

Dinner was served at 6 p.m. to educators from Burnet, Coryell, Hamilton, Mason, Llano, Blanco, San Saba, Williamson, Mills, and Lampasas counties.

District Judge Jack Miller of San Saba introduced the guest speaker, Zolzie Steakley, Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas. Judge Steakley has served as assistant Attorney General of Texas and Secretary of State. He has been a member of the Supreme Court since January 1961.

Judge Steakley's topic "A Glance back at the Past. A long look at the Present, and a close scrutiny of the Future," reminded American's that their liberties cannot be practiced unless they are understood. He stated that liberty lies in the hearts of men and women; when it dies, there is no court, or constitution, or law that can save it. He challenged Americans to the fact that no man can stand against public opinion, and that they often get the foreign policies they deserve, as a result of their public opinion.

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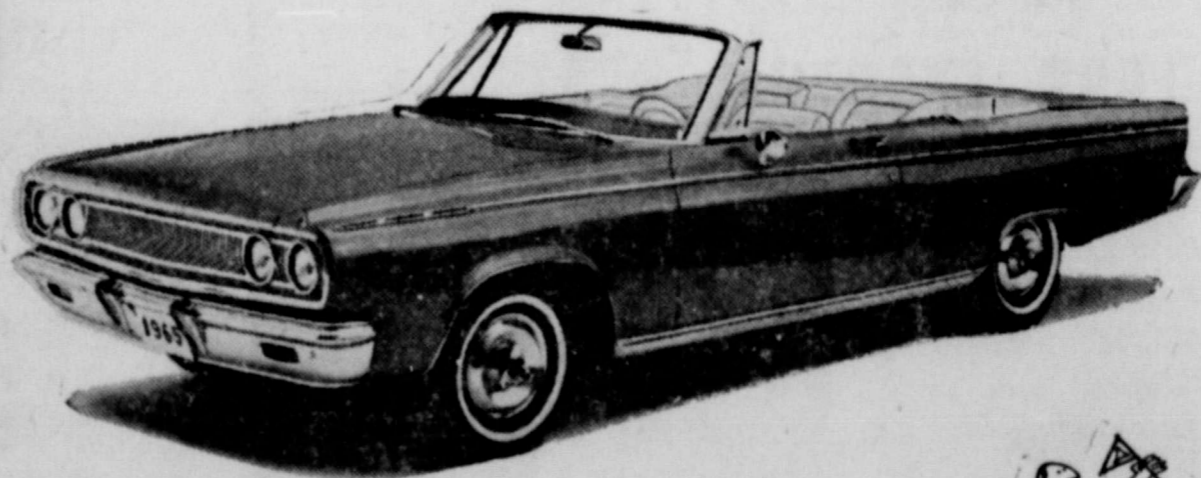
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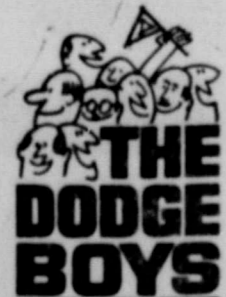

On the Home Range

The Home Demonstration Clubs Annual Achievement Day will be Friday, November 13. I want to give each of you a special invitation to come and join in the activities.

Achievement Day will be on the first floor of the court house this year. There will be educational exhibits by each of the clubs based on programs they have had this year. Also exhibited will be crafts and hobbies they have worked on. Pie and coffee will be sold to the public starting at 8:30 a.m. A bake sale will be held in conjunction with this. At 10 a.m. there will be a staged production of "The Price is Right" with Mrs. R. L. Staggs, production manager. Some 6 or 7 other Home Demonstration women will star in the show. You'll not want to miss this 30-minute of fun. Hope to see you at Achievement Day Nov. 13.

The cooler weather may bring out the "soup kettles" and what could taste better than some homemade soup? You'll find good buys in beef, especially in short ribs, arm and blade pot roast.

Do you love the different seasons as I do, and like to serve the foods and do the things in keeping with them? November 15th is the expected date of first freeze in Hamilton County (average over the years.) Many people are utilizing their green tomatoes by making chow-chow and green tomato mince-meat before the frost takes its toll. Of course you may wrap your green tomatoes in newspaper and store in a cool dark place to ripen. Our publication "Pickles and Relishes" has several recipes using green tomatoes including chow-chow, mince-meat, and piccalilli. Call my office or write for one if you'd like. I've particularly enjoyed the pickled okra in this booklet and there is still some okra available from fall gardens.

This is also the season for home gardeners to start fall planting. Fall conditions in practically all areas of Texas are ideal for plant-

ing operations. Soil temperatures will be favorable for active, healthy root growth for almost three months. Actually, root growth on trees and shrubs will progress at the greatest rate of the year during the next three months.

Perennials too, planted in the fall become settled in the soil, develop a good root system and will produce larger, more abundant flowers during the following year. Roses planted from containers in the fall will produce a full flush of bloom during the late fall months, and will then be well established to withstand the rigors of winter weather.

Flowering trees and shrubs that bloom in late winter or early spring should be transplanted now, since their bloom will be gone for next season before the weather is suitable for spring transplanting.

Any plant transplanted now will be well established and will make vigorous growth during the next growing season. Planting now will not only give immediate results, but the rewards will be much greater next spring than if planting is delayed until then. Therefore, Hamilton County gardeners should give careful consideration to fall planting.

Game Warden Reports

Deer season will open Nov. 14 and run through Dec. 31 in Hamilton County this year. There will be a two buck limit per season. A legal buck is defined as a deer having a hardened antler protruding through the skin. A legal firearm for taking deer is defined as any rifle, shotgun or bow and arrow as specified. However it will not be lawful to hunt or attempt to hunt any wild deer with any rifle using .22 rim fire ammunition. This would include .22 short, long or long rifle and .22 magnum ammunition. Specifications for long bows and arrows may be obtained from any license dealer or game warden.

The season is open daily on the dates mentioned above from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset.

Wild turkey season will run concurrent with the deer season this year in Hamilton County. A bearded hen will also be legal this year for the first time, but be sure and remember the beard must be clearly visible protruding through the feathers of the breast.

All landowners are again reminded that if they lease their land for hunting they must buy a shooting preserve license which costs \$5.00.

There have been lots of questions asked as to doe permits in Hamilton County. At the present time we do not have any deer census lines set up in the county to count or check the deer herd. And before we issue any doe permits we will have to set up these lines, which we hope to get set up in 1965. So we hope by this time next year we will be able to tell more about your deer population.

Remember the fellow who is careless with his gun may not be around next season or might cause a friend not to be.

CPS Second Place Winner in National Fleet Safety Contest

Community Public Service Company has won second place in its division for the public utilities section of a national fleet safety contest conducted during 1963-64 by the National Safety Council.

The award was made at a luncheon held in Chicago on Oct. 29 as part of the National Safety Congress and Exposition.

Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District's 24th Annual Report

FORWARD

The twenty-fourth Annual Report is presented by the Board of Supervisors in order that all people in the District, both Urban and Rural, may be better informed on what is being done in our own area to conserve and improve our most essential natural resources—soil and water. Our expanding

population demands expanded conservation efforts if we expect to maintain the high standard of living reached in this country. Conservation is a job that requires the efforts and cooperation of all people.

THE DISTRICT

In an election held in Hamilton and Coryell Counties March 9, 1964, the people voted four to one in favor of creating a Soil Conservation District. Conservation accomplishments have fully justified their action. April 30, 1964, the Secretary of State of the State of Texas issued the District a Certificate of Organization, or Charter, and the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District was in business. The District covers all of Hamilton and Coryell Counties and a small area

of Comanche County, approximately 1,208,000 acres. The District has two S.C.S. Work Units, one at Hamilton and one at Gatesville.

The Board of Supervisors meet regularly once each month (on second Tuesdays) alternately at Hamilton and at Gatesville. The District maintains an office in the District-owned Headquarters Building in Gatesville where a clerk is on duty at all times.

PROGRAM AND WORK PLAN—

This District was organized as the third such district in the State. It was one of the first to draw up a new Program and Work Plan revised to meet the demands of modern agriculture. When completed, the new plan was submitted to the USDA together with an up-dated "memorandum of understanding" with signatures of the Supervisors affixed. The Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman, is shown in the picture at left signing the new pact with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District while D. A. Williams, Administrator of the SCS looks on. Carl King, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, received a personal letter from Secretary Freeman among other things, "I want to commend your district for their progressive action in up-dating soil and water conservation programs and modernizing the memorandum of understanding with USDA."

The new pact was signed by the Secretary of the USDA April 22, 1964, after having been signed by the Board of Supervisors February 11, 1964.



DISTRICT COOPERATORS—

The District Board of Supervisors work diligently in their efforts to get conservation practices applied on the land. Through memorandums of understanding with the USDA agencies and others they have made available technical assistance for all phases of soil and water conservation. Through ACS, cost share is available. The Farm Home Administration offers low interest rate loans for application of conservation practices. All this means nothing if we do not have farmer and rancher District Cooperators. District Cooperators, the farmers and ranchers themselves, hold the key to success of applied conservation. They are the ones who make the plans and final decisions on conservation programs they want to carry out on their own land. Technical assistance is made available, but without District Cooperators there would be no real need for a Soil Conservation District.

CONSERVATION APPLIED ON THE LAND—

New standard soil surveys were made on 73,364 acres. This is the starting point for soil and water conservation planning and application. Active district cooperators applied the following major conservation practices:

Brush control, 26,642 acres; Conservation cropping system, 124,591 acres; Contour farming, 63,823 acres; Crop residue use, 121,503 acres; Range deferred grazing, 117,292 acres; Diversions, 102,710 feet; Farm ponds, 206; Range proper use, 247,629 acres; Terraces (gradient) 349,842 feet; Terraces (parallel) 30,115 feet. This is by no means all the conservation practices applied on the land during the 1963-64 fiscal year.

DISTRICT ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS—

The Supervisors are deeply grateful for the cooperation of all who have assisted in making 1963-64 a good year in conservation. The superior quality of technical assistance rendered by both Work Units of the SCS meant the difference between the District's ability to do a good job instead of just an ordinary job in getting conservation applied on the land. The ASCS officers and their staffs and the County Committees in both Hamilton and Coryell Counties have performed a substantial service through the ACP cost share programs. The Extension Service, through County Agents and Home Demonstration Agents in Hamilton and Gatesville have rendered invaluable service. The Farm Home Administration has cooperated fully in making loans to District cooperators needing funds for applying conservation practices. FHA has done an outstanding job in financing the development of dependable water supplies in rural communities. All Vo. Ag. teachers and advisors have cooperated wholeheartedly with the District in its educational phases of soil and water conservation. All newspapers in the District have been very cooperative in publishing conservation news items and in writing editorials of interest to agriculture. The District is especially grateful for the public interest shown by KCLW Radio Station. The weekly programs of interest to agriculture are very helpful.

For all of this the Board is forever grateful.

SOIL STEWARDSHIP—

In sponsoring Soil Stewardship Week eight newspaper items were printed, two radio programs broadcast, and two civic clubs had Soil Stewardship programs. The Board of Supervisors sponsored two breakfasts for pastors, one at Hamilton and one at Gatesville. Pastors generally cooperated wholeheartedly in observance of Soil Stewardship Week. One range tour was conducted for pastors.

DISTRICT FINANCES—

The District Headquarters Building was acquired in 1963. It was the first time any Soil Conservation District in the State of Texas ever occupied its own headquarters.

DISTRICT EQUIPMENT—

In order to encourage sound conservation practices the District has acquired certain pieces of equipment which is available to cooperators in the District. The equipment is conveniently located at various points in the District. FFA Chapters at schools having Vo. Ag. Departments are custodians of most of the equipment. They collect rentals and receive a percentage of collections for their services. This arrangement has resulted in benefits to cooperators, FFA Chapters and the District.

THIS AND THAT OF INTEREST—

The Hamilton Herald-News cooperated with the District in publishing a special conservation edition July 30, 1964. The District wrote letters of appreciation to all co-sponsors of the Fort Worth Press Conservation Awards contest. The District won a \$300.00 cash award in the contest in 1963. Chairman King attended the Area meeting of SCD Supervisors in San Antonio July 13, 14 and 15. Alfred Marwitz attended a training session for Supervisors in Temple June 18. O. C. King and Alfred Marwitz represented the District at the State Convention of Soil Conservation Supervisors in McAllen in October 1963. The District sponsored a grass judging contest in Gatesville March 14 and awarded banners and ribbons to winning contestants. Mr. Paul Walser, Assistant State Conservationist, on invitation from the District, was guest speaker at the Gatesville Lions Club June 10. Mr. Benn Gleason of Fairy was presented the Fort Worth Press Outstanding Farmer Award by the Hamilton Lions Club. The social event of the year was the cake and ice cream supper for all agricultural agency workers and their families in the District sponsored by the Board of Supervisors.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Congratulations to Willie Perry for being selected Hamilton County's most outstanding young farmer for the second consecutive year. The Outstanding Young Farmer program is sponsored by the Hamilton Jaycees. Willie's entry form has been sent to Houston where it will be entered in the state contest. On December 5 the Houston Jaycees will honor Willie and other contestants at a banquet. The state's outstanding young farmer will be announced at that time.

We are proud of two Carlton youth who were selected as the County's Gold Star 4-H members this year. They are Darwin Cox and Sallie Hays. Only one boy and one girl are selected to receive the Gold Star award each year. This 4-H award is the highest that can be given on a county level.

Darwin's projects during his 4 years of 4-H work include beef cattle, sheep, swine, corn and vegetable gardens.

Sallie has carried projects in foods and clothing. She represented the county at the District Dress Revue this year. She has been a member of 4-H for four years.

Unusual weather sometimes cause plants to respond in a strange way. Earlier this year we saw cotton put on a second crop following rains in August. The first crop was almost mature following dry, hot weather in June, July and August.

A number of late winter and early spring plants have been seen growing this fall. But clover is one example.

The latest odd plant behavior was pointed out by Oscar Lawrence. He had some volunteer barley to come up in late August after the rain. A few weeks of cool weather followed by a week of warm temperatures evidently fooled the barley because it is heading out now. The heads are large with well filled grain.

With deer hunting season just around the corner, hunters may be interested in a new leaflet "Field Dressing a Deer," now available at my office.

Since quality venison depends primarily on how the deer is handled from the time of the kill until it is placed in the freezer, field dressing is important.

Leaflet L-634 gives one method of field dressing and skinning a deer. However, any method resulting in a clean, well-bled carcass is satisfactory. Unpleasant experiences with venison usually result from lack of care before the meat reaches the kitchen.

Information in the leaflet has been provided by Wallace Klussman, Extension Wildlife Conservation Specialist, and by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

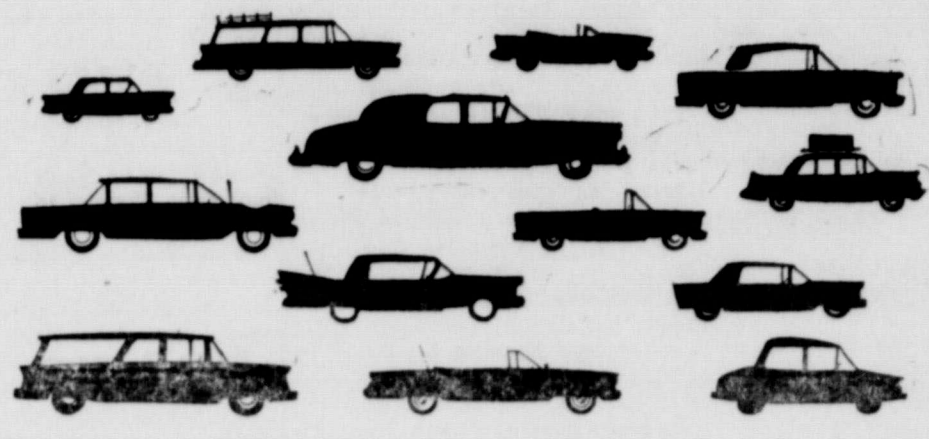

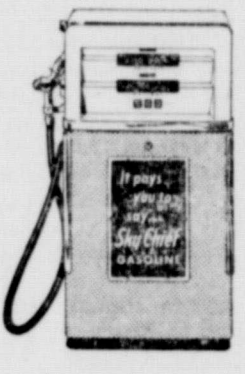
