## RECORD ASSETS LISTED AT FIRST NATIONAL BANK FOLLOWING DECEMBER 'CALL'

A bank call dated December 31, 1964, issued by the Comptroller's office in Washington, D.C., showed assets to be at an all-time record high at First National Bank.

Total assets at the local bank were nearly \$200,000 more than on Dec. 31, 1963. The Dec. 31 call showed \$2,501,333, as compared to \$2,313,270.22 a year ago.

Deposits, as revealed by the current call, were \$2,233,504.54.

The quarterly accounting at First National showed a steady increase each call month, as follows:

April 15, \$2,301,139.35.  
June 30, \$2,366,311.72.  
October 1, \$2,482,967.23.  
December 31, \$2,501,628.33.

He was a member of the Episcopal Church. Sgt. Haynes had been a resident of the Duffau community since 1940, and had made his home in Hico since 1965.

## Hico, Carlton Postmasters Make Appeal to Rural Patrons

Postmasters R. E. Jackson of Hico and L. W. Reeves of Carlton have appealed to postal customers on rural routes to help their rural carriers make mail deliveries during bad winter weather.

The Hico post office has four rural routes, covering areas as far south as to a few miles of Cranfills Gap, as far north as above Johnsville, as far east as to a few miles from Ireddell, and as far west as Carlton. The patrons in this area are served by four carriers who drive about 500 miles daily to serve them.

The Carlton office has one rural route.

The two officials said at the same time that they hope all authorities concerned with rural routes where snow and mud hampers the carriers will continue to cooperate to help the mailmen get through.

## New Credit Services Will Aid Low-Income Rural People

A new credit service to help low-income families in rural areas raise their incomes is now available in Texas, according to State Director L. J. Capplemann, Farmers Home Administration.

Mr. Capplemann said this week the new service opens up Farmers Home Administration credit aid for the first time to many low-income rural families who previously were unable to obtain either public or private loans to improve their earnings.

All county offices in Texas, Capplemann said, are accepting applications for loans up to \$2,500 to finance farming enterprises, small family businesses, trades and services. Rural cooperatives serving low-income families and providing services and facilities not otherwise available may also be eligible for credit under the program.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

The last session of the Hamilton County Poultry Clinic was held Tuesday night, Jan. 19 at 7:30 in the court room at Hamilton. Ben Wormell, Extension Poultry Husbandman from Texas A&M will discuss "Housing Egg Production Stock." Marshal Miller, Associate Extension Poultry Marketing Specialist will discuss "Egg Marketing."

Fifty men and women attended the first session on January 5 and heard Dr. Eldred Keahey discuss "Disease and Parasite Control." I was pleased to have such a good turnout for the first meeting. Hamilton County was represented by 30 people at the first meeting. Seventeen out of county people attended the poultry clinic. Some came as far away as Eastland, Tolar and Lipan.

Someone noticed that many local poultrymen did not attend while some people drove 80 miles to attend the clinic. A good answer was given by someone else who said "the farther you have to drive to a meeting, the more important it is." Much of the credit for the good attendance goes to the Gerald Co. who invited customers to come to dinner before the meeting.

The second session of the clinic was held Tuesday night, Jan. 12. Bill Cawley and Dr. J. H. Quisen-

berry were the speakers. I cannot give the attendance for that meeting since this column was written before the meeting.

Final tabulation on the 1964 screwworm cases shows that there were 223 cases reported in Texas during the year. This compares to 4,916 cases in 1963 or only 4.5 percent as many as in 1963. If we go back one more year to 1962 we find that there were 43,484 cases reported. This last year's total was only 4.5 percent as many as during 1962.

No statistics are available that accurately reflect the number of screwworm cases experienced in the Southwest before the eradication program began in February 1962. During that first year, however, more than 50,000 cases were reported in the Southwest, which many entomologists felt represented only about 10 percent of the total infestations that occurred. At the same time, ranchers and scientists, alike, opined that infestations had been reduced by 75 to 90 percent during the initial year. On that basis, screwworm cases could have numbered up to two million in previous years.

ASCS OFFICE NEWS REPORT

Carryovers of feed grains and wheat combined will be down 3.2 percent from the 1960-61 marketing year at the end of 1964-65 marketing year, according to Dewey Sellers, Chairman of the Hamilton County Agricultural and Stabilization Committee.

Mr. Sellers said U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates show feed grain carryover will be only 58 million tons at the end of the present marketing year. The carry-over in 1961 was 84.7 million tons. Wheat carryover will be about 900 million acres as compared with 1.4 billion bushels in 1961. The reduction in wheat stocks will be 35.7 percent.

Corn carryover will be about 21.225 billion bushels at the end of the marketing year as compared to 2,008 billion bushels in 1961, a reduction of 39 percent. Grain sorghum carryover will be about 580 million bushels as compared with 702 million bushels, a reduction of about 17 percent.

Barley stocks will be 125 million bushels as compared with 153 million bushels, down 14 percent.

Mr. Sellers said the anticipated reduction in the grains is evidenced that the volunteer wheat and feed grain programs are effective

The voluntary grain programs include provisions for diverting acreage from production of grain to conserving uses. 1965 Feed Grain Signup The signup for the 1965 Feed Grain Program will start Feb. 8 and continue through March 26. Domestic Cotton Signup The signup period for the domestic cotton allotment will begin Feb. 8 and continue through Mar. 26. The 1965 Domestic Cotton allotment payment is 4.35 cents per lb. This compares with three and a half cents for 1964. In 1964, 96 producers who stayed with their domestic allotment received a total of \$5,798.00.

In 1964 the domestic allotments were based on 67 percent of the effective cotton allotment for that year. For 1965 the allotments will be based on 65 percent of the effective cotton allotments for this year. The final date for making application for a new grower cotton allotment is Jan. 22, 1965. Final date for release of, or request for additional cotton acreage is March 3, 1965. Those acres released will be re-appointed by March 18.

Wool and Lamb Incentive December 31, 1964 was the final date for which sale of wool or lambs could be made for purposes of the 1964 Wool incentive program. Producers have until January 31 to file sales documents for their incentive payment. As best as can be determined at this time payment on wool and unshorn lambs will be made in April.

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—Perhaps it was ever thus, but it seems increasingly difficult to debate issues before the American public and in the halls of Congress without imputing to those of differing views, either the blindest stupidity or the darkest motives.

As a result, every issue, whether of principle or practice, tends to become an all-or-nothing proposition. Policies or programs are treated as if they must be accepted in their entirety or totally rejected. The ancient distinction between what may be a bad policy and what may be a policy badly aimed, becomes all too easily lost.

In the few days of the 86th Congress there appears to be less gray between black and white than at any time in recent years. The self-styled liberals and conservatives take on more definite identity but remain under anyone's definition.

This situation, if viewed correctly, is doubtless a hang-over from the elections of last November. The cleavage in the Republican Party manifested itself early last year and came into full bloom at their convention. Democrats did not find it necessary to really debate many issues. It was enough to deal in generalities and pretty much let nature take its course. Now the Republicans, who seemingly feel that, since their principal representative was rejected, this makes it necessary for them to move in the other direction in order to establish a new image and to catch the popular fancy of the voters.

As example of the trend, a sizeable number of Republicans joined Democrats last week in approving the most far-reaching rate change in the House of Representatives that has occurred in five decades. These changes will greatly ease the passage of the Administration's "Great Society" legislative program.

From all indications, opposition to any single measure will be no more than tolerated. If one does not subscribe to and support the whole bag fall, he is opposed to it all in its entirety. If he advocates modifications and proposes to amend, his motive is to sabotage and destroy. To support one measure or parts of any one of all is not enough and will be forgotten—only opposition is well re-

membered. Perhaps it is too soon to expect objectively to view each legislative proposal as a tab to sit on as one's bottom—as to what is best for our Nation, our State and our immediate area of interest—but it is still America and American.

Time may tell and time may bring encouragement—it is a pity if it does not.
