Want to buy a stake in Hico's future for 1965? Every business and individual has an opportunity to do just that this the next few weeks, and a word response would certainly go long way towards injecting a more enthusiasm into the activities of our community.

Of course the stake we are referring to is dues payment in the club's only service organization—the Civic Club.

Money derived from dues and other fund-raising projects over the past few years has been used for so many different community-improvements that it is difficult to remember offhand just how much benefit the organization is to the town.

Foremost of the community improvements perhaps is the more than \$10,000 that has been invested in City Park on various projects for the benefit of each of us. Other good example of the club's generosity is the annual distribution of food and clothing to needy families in the area, and a program at school where the maintenance sees to it that no child goes without needed eye glasses who might otherwise be able to obtain them.

And then there are the many motions sponsored by the club adding incentive for area business and stimulate the economic of local business.

This past year the club purchased more than \$350.00 worth of new equipment for the City Hospital; spent approximately \$500 a much-needed scoreboard and clock for the school athletic plant; paid off indebtedness on the 20-acre industrial site purchased four years ago; sponsored the first shared and appreciation dinner for area and area dairymen; added over \$1,000 in improvements at City Park; paid the expenses for local student to attend an Americanism Seminar at Sam Houston State College; helped on every fund campaign that came up throughout the year; and in general, expended its funds for any worthwhile project for the betterment of individuals and businesses in Hico.

It's a worthy organization, doing worthy things for Hico. Make a point to pay your dues right now.

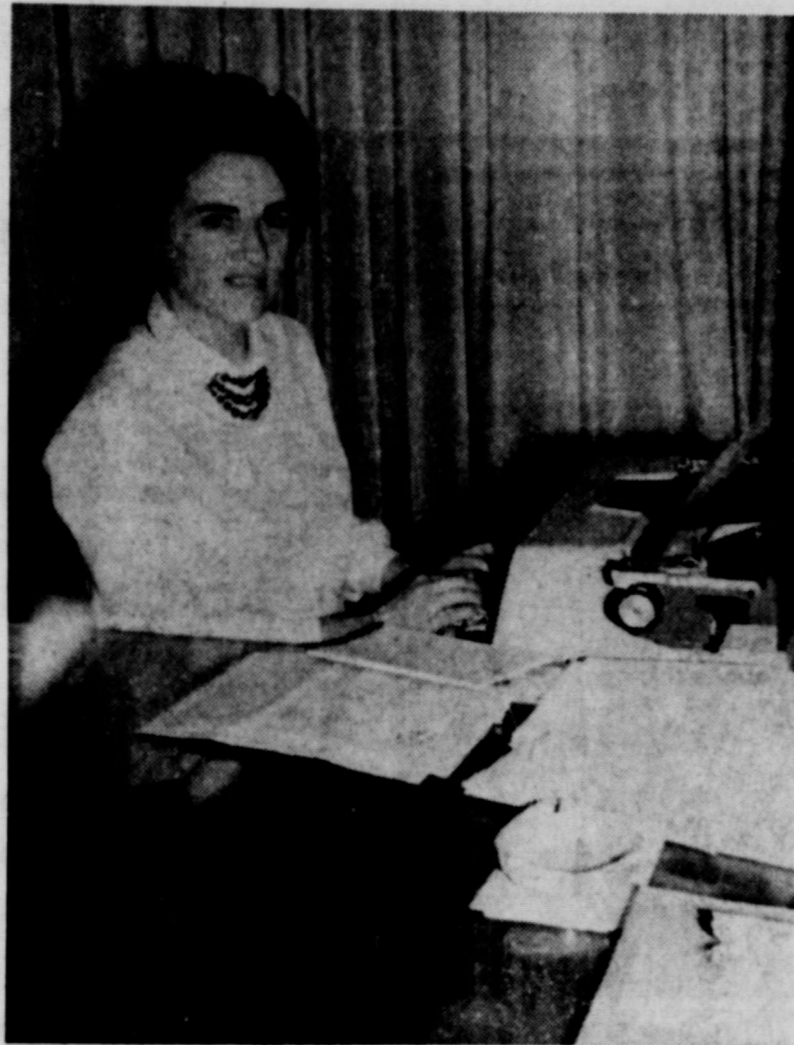

### Stephenville Lady Receives Blood Via Helicopter

Mrs. Clovis Russell of Stephenville received special attention last Friday from the Carter Blood Center, Fort Worth, before she was transferred from Hico Hospital to a Fort Worth hospital.

Suffering from aplastic anemia, Mrs. Russell was in critical need for freshly drawn blood components due to a brain hemorrhage. She needed platelets, which cause blood to clot, to stop the hemorrhage.

The platelets, which must be taken from fresh blood and infused within two hours, were brought to Hico Hospital by helicopter where specialists, using equipment brought from the Fort Worth center, administered the platelets.

Thirteen donors contributed the blood in Fort Worth. Reports from Fort Worth showed that Mrs. Russell responded

to treatment satisfactorily.

A mobile unit from Carter Blood Center, Fort Worth, will be in Stephenville this Friday afternoon at 5 p.m., and a call has gone out to people in this area to respond to a plea for replacement blood for Mrs. Clovis Russell of Stephenville (see story above) and another patient in the area.

### Jonesboro Shoots Down Tigers to Remain Undefeated

As was expected, pre-season favorite Jonesboro shot down the Hico Tigers Tuesday night to clear the last serious obstacle enroute to the first half crown in district basketball action.

Only Hico and Valley Mills were expected to offer much resistance to the talent-heavy Eagles, and Jonesboro dispensed of these two in fairly easy fashion. They downed Valley Mills in the first game of the district chase, and really let loose Tuesday night in downing the Tigers 80-44.

Going into the game the Tigers owned the only other clean slate among district members, waiting by three opponents. Hico's latest victim was Turnersville who they bombed 67-20 last Friday night.

First half action comes to a halt this Friday night in the local gym when the Tigers and arch-rivals Valley Mills loop up. A girls game will precede the feature at 7:00 p.m.

MERIDIAN—Two men, one of whom told officers he "needed money for my baby," are being held in Bosque Co. jail at Meridian on complaints charging they robbed the Iredell State Bank of \$16,350 shortly after 10 a.m. Wednesday.

The suspects were arrested some 45 minutes after the robbery. They were first taken to Iredell, then to Meridian where they were questioned and jailed.

Bosque County Deputy Sheriff Charlie Buckingham filed armed robbery complaints before Justice of the Peace H. F. Butrow. Named in the complaints are William Dale Phillips, 35 of Houston, and Johnny Leo Hill, 22, of Ft. Worth.

The pair of youthful bandits, neither of whom made an attempt at disguise, boldly parked their car in front of the Iredell bank while they robbed it. Bank employees took the license number, got their description and alerted lawmen.

Texas Highway Patrolmen Billy Roe and Dale Cozart, both of Cleburne, spotted a beige 1962 Chevrolet near Granbury. They started after the car, chased it at speeds up to 110 miles per hour, then ran down the suspects on foot after the car skidded off the highway and smashed into a barbed wire fence.

The patrolmen said the suspects hurled money from the car as they chased them.

Texas Ranger Capt. Clint Peoples said one of the suspects was an ex-convict who previously had escaped from the Somervell County jail on three occasions.

There are two bank employees at the institution, T. L. Chapman, president, and Mrs. Murlene Smith cashier. Both were on duty when the bandits struck.

Also in the bank were two examiners, Alvin Roberts of Temple and James Lord of Arlington, and a customer, Mrs. Emmitt Walker of Iredell. A second customer, Mack Hicks of Hico walked in while the robbery was in progress and, at gunpoint, was forced to join a lineup along the wall.

Mrs. Smith said the bandits hit about 10 a.m. She said they came in separately, posing as customers, with the first man walking down an aisle and "just sort of waiting around" until the second arrived.

"They were bold, and quite calm," Mrs. Smith said. "The first man pulled a gun from his clothing, waved it around, and told us all to line up against the wall. We didn't argue with him — there wasn't anyone hurt, and it wasn't any time to play hero."

"One of them guarded us while the other marched Mr. Chapman back to the vault," Mrs. Smith continued. "They had paper sacks, and they told us to 'fill 'em up.'"

"They got the money, thanked us very kindly, and left," Mrs. Smith said. "They were calm and courteous, even though one of them did seem a bit wild-eyed."

No attempt was made to restrain the customers and bank employees as the hoodlums left.

Within minutes, bank officials notified Bosque County sheriff's office in Meridian and the sheriff in turn called Texas Department of Public Safety Dispatchers in Waco. An area-wide alert was issued with both description and license number furnished all Central Texas law enforcement agencies.

Numerous roadblocks, concentrated north of Iredell primarily, were set up by assorted highway patrolmen, deputy sheriffs and policemen.

The roadblocks paid off. At 10:30 a.m. a highway patrolman stationed at Granbury spotted the car along County Road 1192 near Bono, in southwest Johnson County.

Rangers, deputies, highway patrolmen and agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation all assisted in attempting to recover the scattered money. About \$500 was still missing Wednesday night.

## On the Home Range

By JEAN HENRY  
Home Demonstration Agent

Producers of food wonder why in 1963 they were getting 15 percent less for food products than they got in 1947-49. At the same time the consumers were paying 15 percent more.

Marketing costs take more of the retail food dollar. At the end of the war farmers got over half of every retail dollar. Today they receive just over one-third. Processing, packaging, transportation and distribution gets a large share of the increase.

Bakery and cereal products, fruits and vegetable prices have climbed about 40 percent while poultry, eggs, fats and oils cost less today than in 1947-49.

If you're one of those impatient souls who can't wait for springtime—though winter is just beginning—you can rush the season a bit by force-blooming shrubs inside your home.

Flowering quince, forsythia, pussywillow, and Thunberg spirea are easily forced into bloom in mid-winter. So are peach, apple, pear, plum and cherry branches.

Cuttings from most of these may be made any time after Jan. 1. For apples and pears, it's best to wait a little longer—probably until February.

Select branches which have many large flower buds. Cut the stems, remove bottom inch of bark and pound the base of the stem with a hammer to give good contact for water uptake. Place stems in a warm (110 degree) water bath and allow to cool naturally to room temperature and then remain in the water for 24 hours. Cover top with moistened burlap or with a plastic bag.

Place the branches in a vase of water and keep them in the sunlight at 65 to 75 degrees. (Branches forced in the dark develop very little color.)

Scrub base of branches often and replace water frequently. Use a flower preservative in the water. Expect blossoms in two or three weeks.

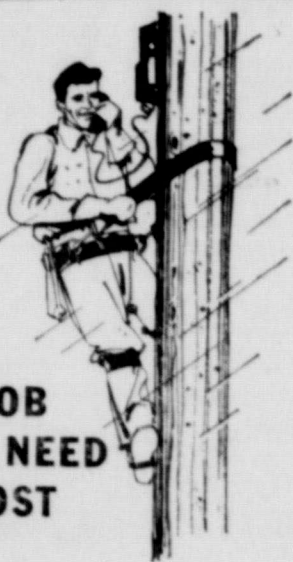

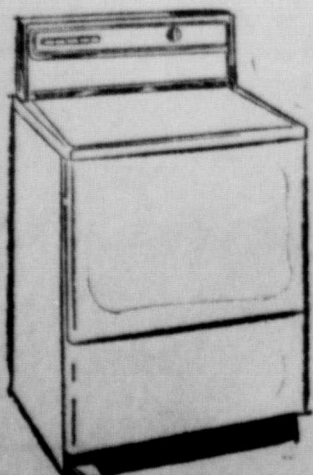

It was delayed this year so as not to conflict with other shows which some of the boys and girls plan to enter.

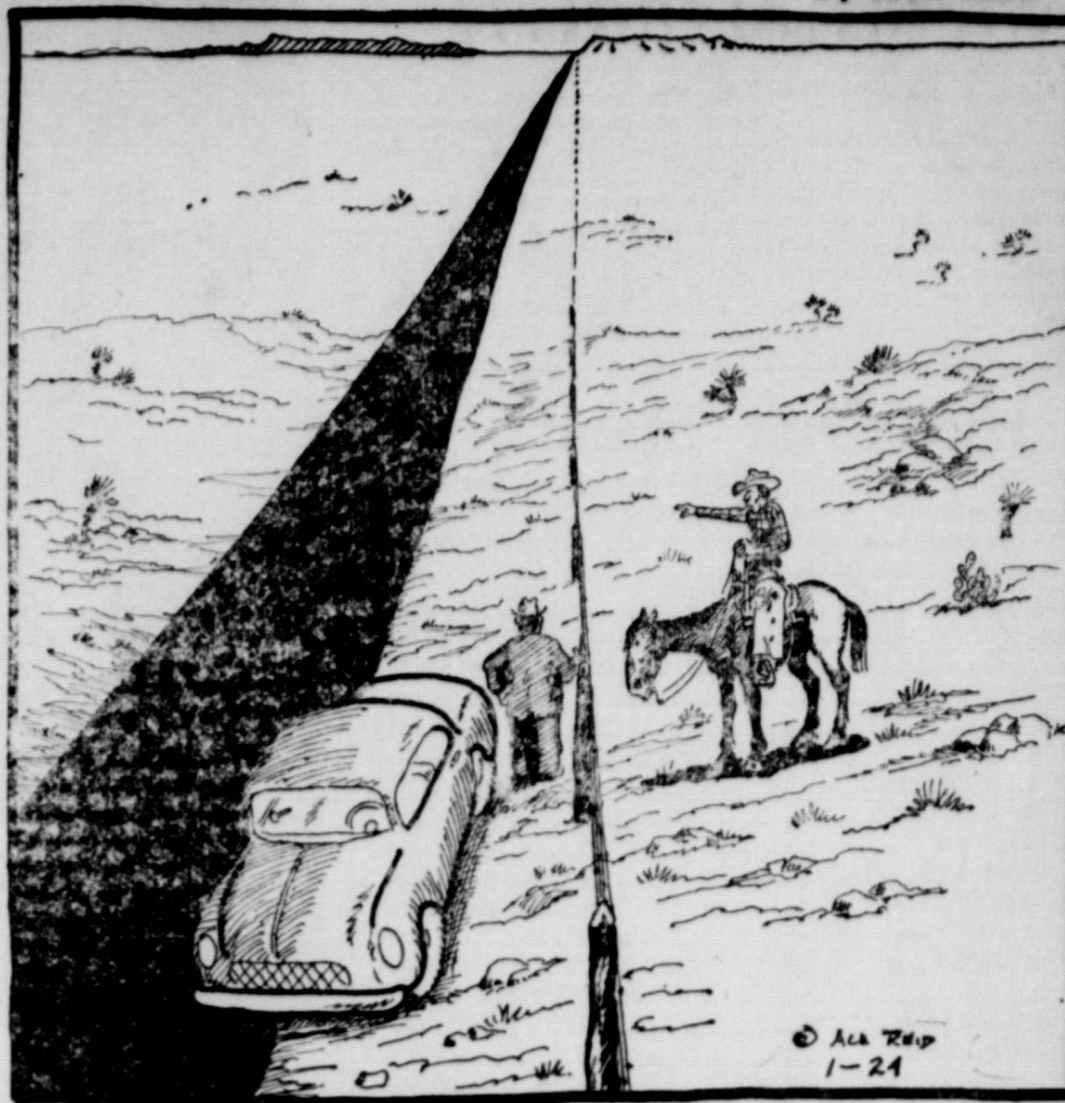
There will be very few changes from last year. Champion and reserve champion ribbons will be given. In the past reserve ribbons were not given.

Now is the time to fight rats. With cold weather, rats move from out doors into houses and farm buildings in search of food and shelter.

Just 50 rats can eat enough grain annually to feed a dairy cow for a year. One rat can eat about two-thirds as much mash as a hen, but they waste and contaminate many times more food than they eat.

If you see one rat, you can be sure that there are others. In addition to destroying grain and feed, rats carry more than 35 known diseases to man and animals. They also gnaw on anything that comes between them and their food supply—grain bags, paper cartons,

and wooden containers. They also start fires by damaging wire insulation.

Poisoning is the most effective way to kill rats. Use a good bait, put it in a proper place and service the bait stations regularly. Always keep poisoned bait away from children and pets.

Most practical chemicals are anticoagulants which include products such as fumarin, pival and

warfarin. These chemicals are usually mixed with grains and can be purchased ready-mixed

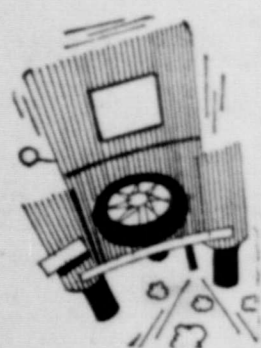

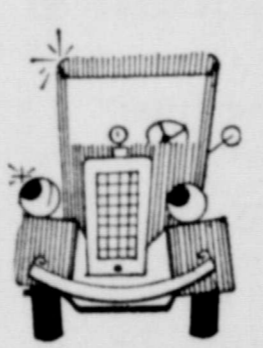

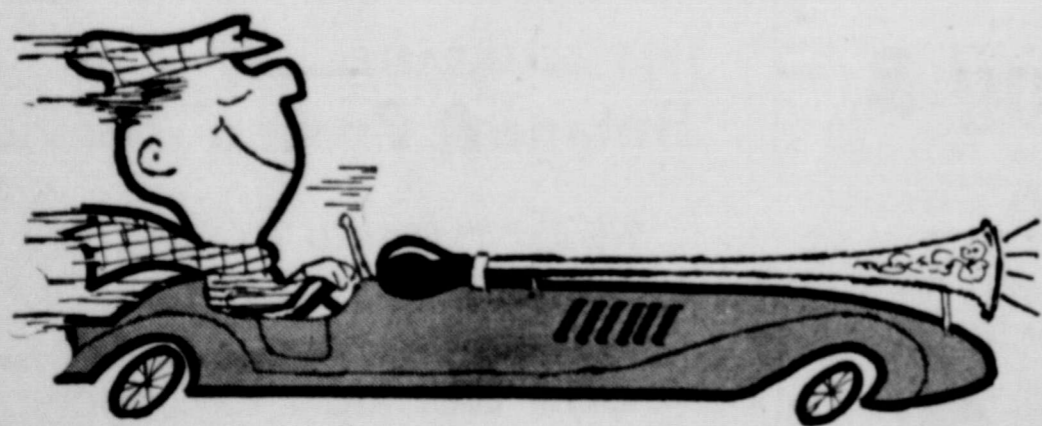
