## Rites Held For Former Pioneer Resident, J. J. Waldrep

Final rites for a former pioneer resident of this area, J. J. Waldrep were held recently in Tahoka. He was 88.

Mr. Waldrep was born Sept. 18, 1877 in Dallas County, Georgia. He was married to Susan Dollif Oct. 15, 1898 in Hamilton Co.

The couple farmed in Eastland County, spent two years in Howard County, moved back to Eastland County, and went to Lynn County in 1915. He had first visited the Plains in 1904 in a covered wagon.

Mr. Waldrep died one year and three hours after the passing of his wife, who died on Jan. 18, 1964. A son, C. E. (Zeke) also died in the same hospital two years ago.

## Girl Scout Cookie Sale Scheduled Here February 18 thru 27

Dates for the 12th Annual Cookie Sale of the Heart of Texas Council have been set for Feb. 18-27. Scout leaders have completed special training for the project and are now in the process of training girls in their troops the procedures to be followed.

Mrs. David Anderson is serving as Community Cookie chairman for Hico and will check cookies out to the local troops on Wednesday, Feb. 17. Mrs. Lennie Redden will supervise sales during the campaign.

The goal for Hico has been set at 32 cartons of cookies. Total council goal is 4,800 cartons.

Profits of the sale go, primarily, to develop and maintain the council-owned established camp at Lake Brownwood. Troops however retain five cents for each box sold by members. In addition, all girls in the 19-county council who sell 48 or more packages of cookies are awarded partial camperships to apply on their camp fee at Camp Wood Lake.

Camp Lake Wood, located on the shores of Lake Brownwood, has been developed almost entirely with cookie sale funds—money raised by the Scouts themselves.

We are proud of this record and feel those interested in the cemetery here should be also, as if graves without markers are lost, this will show just where they are located. Our cemetery map also gives most graves but we have noted several errors on the map.

While at the Hico bank last Friday completing funds for another endowment fund, we were handed \$5 by Robert Proffitt for the cemetery and while in Burdens, Luther Burden also handed us \$5 for the care of the J. W. Burden lot. We sincerely thank each for your donations and cooperation.

We now have \$2,315.00 in the endowment fund, which will be a great help in taking care of the lots of those who have taken out the plan. We hope to live to see this amount tripled and even more. Then we would not have to worry about funds to care for the cemetery. It could be done and hurt no one financially. The plan is reasonable and we help you by allowing this fund to be paid as you can. Your children or grandchildren or others left to see after your lot are not going to be as interested as you were, and many times neglect the care of the lots entirely. We have seen this right in our own cemetery as well as others. If you don't approve of the endowment fund, then leave some money with your banker for the care of your lot. This is also a very wise step in your lifetime.

We have been to so many cemeteries and see graves and lots grown up and are told no relatives

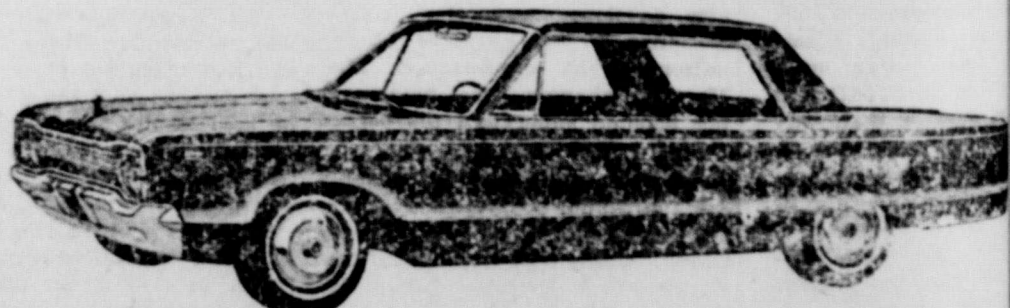
are left in the community, or maybe none at all. But that fund that was left at the bank or that endowment plan taken out will

its importance. We do all who have cooperated in sending in your lots on your lots.

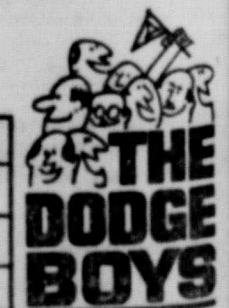

#### Hearing Test SET FOR HICO

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—One of the almost 100 proposals to the Congress by the Administration is the liberalization of our immigration laws.

Efforts to change the present Walter - McCarran Immigration Law have been made in every Congress for the last several years but have gotten no place. The effort now is given "top priority" and there is strong indication that the 40-year old principle of national origin may be junked. The national origins principle is the relationship of the number of immigrants from any foreign nation to those of the same nationality residing under citizenship in the United States as of 1920.

It is proposed that the present national origins quota system be replaced with a system based on a need for skills possessed by applicants for citizenship, and a preference for those with relatives already living in this country.

Although legislation has not been drafted in its details from the President's message, it appears that the change would result in:

immigration from friendly western European countries would be about 25 percent. Some would be cut as much as 60 percent, which would include such countries as Germany and Sweden.

Immigrants from Greece, Portugal and Spain would be increased considerably.

The number of foreigners allowed to enter the United States from Communist countries in Eastern Europe would be almost doubled. Yugoslavians, Rumanians, Albanians, Poles and Hungarians would be increased from 30 percent to six-fold. None in these areas would be reduced.

Quotas from Asian nations will be increased from nine to ten-fold. India would have a boost of 18 to 20 times what it has today, and even Indonesia would have four times the present limit.

African immigration would be boosted to more than four times the present restriction.

The question is—Do we need this additional influx of immigrants, and if so, should it be left to some commission or bureaucrat to determine how many and from where?

Our first obligation in anything is to the United States of America and not to any foreign country. This is the answer to those who maintain that the present

origins system pictures America in a bad light, and that our relations with other countries would be improved if we repaid it. For years our Immigration Law has been considered one of the most liberal in the world. This system favors no one group over another, but fixes the quotas at one-sixth of one percent of the people in each national origin group in the United States as of 1920.

There is no simple duty or moral obligation for this Country to become the dumping ground for surplus people of the earth. Aside from the national security aspects, our domestic policy guards against unemployment, housing shortages, poverty, mounting crime and welfare costs. Would the importation of more people of doubtful character, no assurance of assimilation and who in too many instances contribute to the increase of the size of the city ghettos in America, contribute anything to the good of our Nation?

The fact is that the great ethnic groups in our big cities are organized to bring tremendous political pressures for the breakdown of our Immigration Laws. They are organized and know how to exert their influence on those they help elect to the Congress.

This is not an anti-foreigner attitude by any means. Certainly it is meritorious contention that immigrants have contributed great values to America. In fact, could it not be said that we are all of immigrant stock, unless we are Indians? But this is 1965, and self-preservation of this Nation is a first duty.

Our immigrant forebears came here to build and develop as Americans and not as predators on an established system.

Game Warden Reports

Fishing season will be here soon and I hope some of you sportsmen have already put away your gun and oiled your reels.

White bass have already begun to bite up the Brazos River. Although most of them are small male fish sometimes you do run into the larger female. I believe the white bass run will be better this year than it was last year because of all this good rain we are having. If you remember this time last year the river was very low and we did not have much of a white bass run as compared to some of the past years.

The fishermen I have talked to are having good luck on jigs and the bait called gay-blade. Most of you white bass fishermen know what this bait looks like. Most of the fellows are using the shaded-colored one for whites. As for the favorite colored jigs I think it depends upon who is using it, since I have seen whites caught on about any color.

Again this year there is no limit on white bass in the Brazos or lake Whitney. This is also true on crappie, however there is still a limit on black bass and catfish. The daily bag limit on black bass is 15 with no size limit. Daily bag limit on catfish is 25 with no size limit. Possession limit on black bass is 30 and on catfish is 50.

No more than 100 hooks in any combination of pole and line, rod and reel, artificial and natural baits, hand line, set line or throw line, and not more than two trotlines with not more than 50 hooks each. Hooks on trotlines and throw lines must be at least 3 horizontal feet apart. Trotlines may not be set in the vicinity of public boat docks, public bathing piers, public bathing beaches, or any public place commonly used as a swimming or bathing area. Minnows, bream, perch or rough fish may be taken with a minnow seine not to exceed 20 feet in length.

Please remember the fishing license law is still in effect. The only exception to the law is if you are under 17 years of age or over 65. No person or member of such persons immediate family shall be required to hold a license when fishing upon property he owns or resides. No person shall be required to hold a license when fishing with trotline, throw line, or pole and line having no reel or winding device attached when fishing in his county of residence. The exceptions above are the only ones in the law, so save yourself embarrassment and buy your license before you go, because this may be the year the game warden checks your license.

On the Home Range

Is there a way to brighten dingy mortar around bathtubs and sinks?

Try scrubbing the tiled area with very hot soap or detergent suds. Next apply a dilute solution of chlorine bleach and repeat this in order to keep the tiling wet for five minutes. An old tooth

brush may be used to scrub the grout. Finish up by rinsing with clean hot water and wipe dry. This method lightens and cleans mortar between tiles as well as around plumbing fixtures.

How often should the filter in a range hood be washed?

It needs to be washed at least once a month, and more often if you do a lot of frying. Here's how. Remove the filter from the hood, douse it up and down in hot suds, then rinse it under running hot water or with a dishwasher spray. When filter mesh becomes clogged, greasy air is prevented from flowing outside. Instead, it then becomes dispersed in the air and settles on kitchen walls, curtains, and cabinets. P.S. Don't forget to turn on the blower when you're cooking; better to clean the filter than the walls.

If sheets are dryer-dried, take them out just slightly damp. Then enlist the help of an extra pair of hands to fold each sheet in half across the width, with edges and corners matched. Next, fold again and pull just enough to "snap" the edges and folds in place. Finish up by folding in quarters the other way. If sheets are line-dried, drape each one over the line with the double them hanging over about 6 to 8 inches. This prevents the sway-back dip that occurs when sheets are hung by their corners and the hems dry in a straight line which requires only a once-over with an iron. Careful drying and folding makes sheets acceptable to homemakers without doing any pressing at all. A fussier woman may want to iron just the top third of each sheet—the part which folds back over the blanket.
