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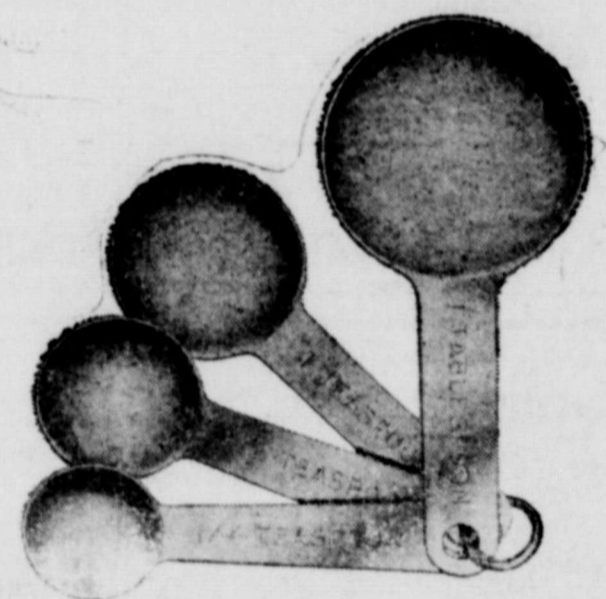
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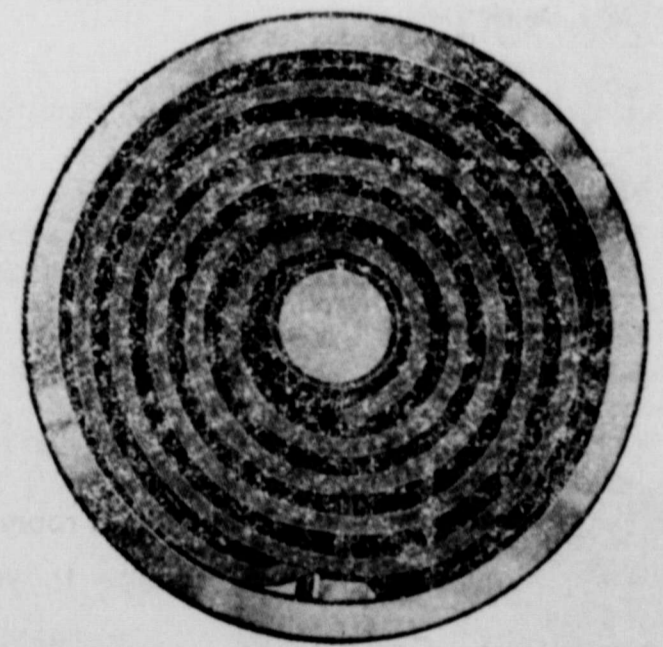

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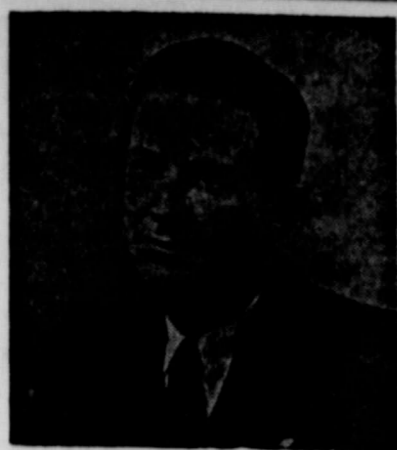

It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—In the last few months, we hear and read of the proliferation of nuclear weapons. More and more will be heard about it in the future.

The nuclear test ban and the creation of the Control and Disarmament Commission as the fear that more nations, and particularly those who have exhibited no responsibility, will develop the ability of producing the bomb.

Back as 1960 there was indication that the Red would be able to explode a device. They did so at 9 months before it was except for only a few before it happened.

op and detonate a nuclear bomb, indeed they will in time be able to develop a missile, booster or a manned bomber capable of offense against others.

In a speech soon after the first of the year, Free Chinese President Chiang Kai-shek had this to say, "The Chinese Communists have been given a chance to grow strong enough to test a nuclear device. There is still the belief that compromise in the U.N. or empty gestures such as disarmament and adherence to the partial nuclear test ban can relax aggression, prevent Communist infiltration and subversion and forestall the disaster of a nuclear war. Such ideas have come about because the wicked purpose of the Chinese Communists in conducting an atomic test at any cost has not been fully realized. In their attempt to communize the world, the Chinese Communists are prepared to destroy more than half of mankind. Under such circumstances it must be clear to everyone that if we fail to take action, there would ensue a situation in which no force, not even retaliation with nuclear arms, would be able to stop mas massacres."

The Chinese Communists are at the point of exercising blackmail against all mankind. They have already told us that in less than a decade the free world, and particularly the United States, will be looking down the barrel of their atomic cannon and that the loss of lives is meaningless. If we believe them, and why shouldn't we, are we going to wait until that day and then attempt to compromise the situation?

Remember the "leashing" and "unleashing" of the forces of Chiang Kai-shek on Formosa back in the Eisenhower and John Foster Dulles days? Maybe this is "unleashing" time for these forces against Red China's nuclear installation.

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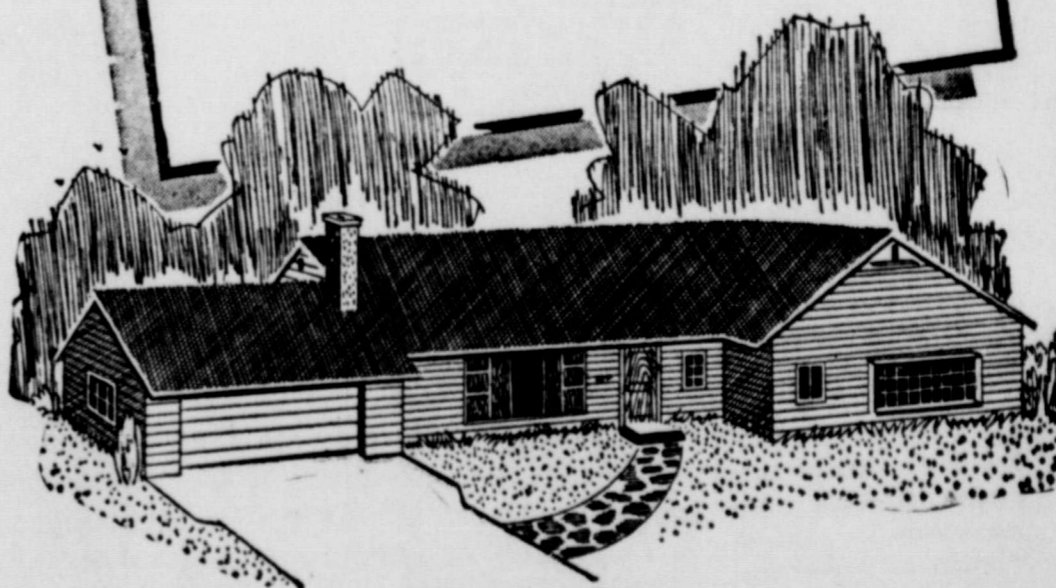

On the Home Range

I will be out of my office all of next week attending a family life education conference at Texas A&M University being held Mar. 8-12.

Homemakers who have less than five loads of laundry to do each week may find it more economical to go to the nearest self-service laundry than to own their equipment. However the final answer may depend on transportation costs.

According to research conducted by family economists with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, it's cheaper for homemakers who have five or more loads of laundry each week to do it at home. For those with less, it may be another story providing the transportation cost to the nearest self-service laundry are not too great. The study showed that costs

for home laundry are about 73 cents a load if the homemaker does three loads a week; 55 cents a load if they do five loads; and 45 cents each if they do eight loads. Cost in a self-service laundry is about 57 cents a load, but to get the final comparison, transportation costs must be added.

Other considerations, however, are convenience, the amount of clothing owned, the kind and amount of water, and time available for doing the wash.

Here's how to determine the approximate number of calories used daily by a moderately active adult: Multiply one's ideal weight by 18 for a woman, or 21 for a man.

INCLUSION OF FIRE SAFETY, NURSING CARE REGULATIONS IN MEDICARE LEGISLATION URGED

Stiffer fire safety and nursing care regulations for nursing homes receiving patients under the proposed Medicare Legislation were urged today by the Texas Nursing Home Association and the American Nursing Home Association, according to Mrs. W. R. Payne, operator of Hico Nursing Home.

Phyl E. Drake, president of the TNHA, and Roy J. McDonald, president of the ANHA, issued a joint statement saying the Medicare Bill fails to establish sufficient standards to assure the safety, good care and comfort of nursing home patients.

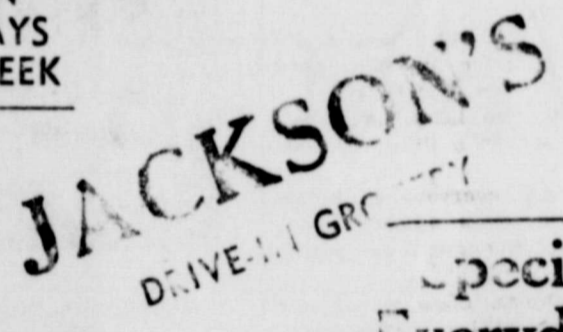
"Our Association leaders have outlined a series of amendments to the proposed bill and one of the biggest flaws in it is the simple requirement that the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare can determine what services are to be provided the elderly merely by consultant procedures with state agencies, and we feel that this is not enough," Mrs. Payne said.

"The amendment we are proposing would require participating nursing homes under the bill to be accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Nursing Homes sponsored by the ANHA and the AMA, or meet other high standards," Mrs. Payne explained.

The amendments also would require participating nursing homes to be built of fire resistant materials or be protected by automatic sprinklers and where available, automatic fire detection systems, according to the report given.

Mrs. Payne pointed out that standards for accredited nursing homes are generally higher than those required in the Medicare Bill now in the Congressional hopper.

A number of Hamilton County youth are participants in the Houston Stock Show Calf Scramble this week. The calf scramble is one of the most popular events of the rodeo in Houston. Twenty boys are put in the arena with ten calves. After a starting signal, the 20 boys go after the calves with rope halters. The first ten boys who halter the calves and get them across a line in the arena receives certificates worth \$150.00 each. This certificate is used to purchase a registered beef heifer. The boy must agree to feed and keep accurate records on his calf. He must also agree to exhibit the calf in the 1966 Houston show. Businessmen in the Houston area sponsor this contest. This is where the \$150 come from for each calf that is caught. Each calf that is put in the arena is identified with a particular sponsor. After the calf scramble the sponsor meets the boy who caught his calf. The sponsor usually becomes very interested in his boy and wants to see him do a good job.

Highlights and Sidelights

to permit sale of two-ounce bottles of liquor by restaurants will get hearing before Senate jurisprudence committee on March 16.

San Antonio Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry has introduced a proposed constitutional amendment on its own to legalize horse racing on a local option basis in Bexar, Cameron, Hidalgo, Dallas, Harris, Galveston, Midland, Tarrant and Webb counties.

Only teacher pay raises attract more mail to lawmakers than parimutuel wagering and liquor by the drink legislation. This year, there's strong support on, as well as opposition to, both propositions.

Spending Rule Row Flares
Tightening of a joint House-

Governor John Connally's number one project of the session—creation of a powerful 18-member coordination board to supervise all aspects of higher education in Texas—swept through both houses of the Legislature with the speed of a blue norther.

Legislators who opposed it—and there were only a few—had a much chance of stopping it as they would of forestalling a gathering storm.

After being guided through the House by Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, the bill was picked up by Sen. Bill Moore of Bryan in the Senate, where it went through without an amendment and was passed on to the governor for signing.

Connally has until September 1 to choose the 18 members of the board. They will replace the Texas Commission on Higher Education and will take on the task of directing all higher education institutions from junior colleges thru the university systems.

Board will decide what courses are to be offered by each institution. It was given the most far-reaching authority granted by the Legislature since the Railroad Commission was authorized to grant railroad permits. Present college boards of regents will continue to serve. But they will be responsible to the new overall coordinating board.

Another of the governor's education plans, to replace 12 separate boards of regents which govern the 22 colleges and universities with three boards of university systems, had not yet been introduced when the coordinating board plan was adopted.

Some legislators feel that the system board plan may have served to lessen the opposition to the coordinating board particularly among representatives from the colleges whose board would be abolished.

Medical Aid Planned

Strategy designed to quickly pass a medical assistance bill as on old-age pensioners.

Wilson asked a House committee to report out his bill quickly so it could be passed on the floor and sent to the Senate. A Senate bill will not be considered until the federal legislation is enacted, he said. In this way, the Senate version can authorize participation in the new federal plans and the details can be worked out to the satisfaction of House members in a conference committee.

Old-age pensioners already are eligible for help on their medical bills through the federal-state program.

Liquor, Racing Bill Hearings Set
Horse racing and "small bottles" liquor bills are expected to turn out some of the biggest crowds at legislative hearings this month.

Bill by Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville to legalize parimutual betting on horse races will be heard by House State Affairs Committee on March 29.

soon as Congress passes it expected new legislation has been announced by Rep. Charles Wilson of Lufkin. He is sponsor of a House bill to extend Kerr-Mills payments to elderly persons not Senate rule banning consideration of a single-purpose spending measure ahead of the general appropriations bill may mean the difference in the type of pay raise teachers get this year.

Senators adopted 22-9 a "compromise" version making the provisions of a stricter House-passed Joint Rule 9-A effective only during the first 120 days of the session. The House is expected to agree.

Opponents say the rule still will prevent even a committee hearing of teacher pay bills until last 20 days of the session—or until the budget is adopted and certified by the comptroller.

Teachers fear the delay will be used to gain support for Connally's long-range, graduated pay bill which they claim gives them far less than their own \$45 a month across the board raise proposal.

Cities Ask Sales Tax

Spokesmen for cities urged a legislative committee to recommend that cities be given authority to levy local sales taxes up to one percent if citizens vote approval in special elections.

They said they have gone about as far as they can with raising property taxes and need additional sources of revenue to provide

necessary services. Union representatives argued there still is plenty of mileage left in property tax. Also a local sales tax would hit little people harder and lighten the load on those most able to pay.

In House revenue and tax committee hearing at the same time, tobacco industry spokesmen said a bill to raise the cigarette tax a penny a pack would be a serious blow to them. Both bills went to sub-committee.

Redistricting

Legislators got a sampling of public views on congressional and legislative redistricting during a four-hour public hearing before the House Districts Committee.

As expected, they didn't get much help since every plan advanced met opposition from some quarter.

House committee members heard lengthy testimony on four congressional re-apportionment proposals and two bills to realign the state house of Representatives.

Eight more measures remain to be heard. Chairman Gus Metzger of Irenham said he hopes to get all of them next week and get the job into the hands of sub-committees as the Senate districts committee already has done.

In the Senate, Sen. Ralph H. Rockwell is interviewing individual senators on how congressional lines should be redrawn. House sub-committees are meeting their second week of similar contacts with 150 representatives.
