





NCLUSION OF FIRE SAFETY, NURSING CARE REGULATIONS IN MEDICARE LEGISLATION URGED

Stiffer fire safety and nursing care regulations for nursing omes receiving patients under the proposed Medicare Legislaon were urged today by the Texas Nursing Home Association nd the American Nursing Home Association, according to Irs. W. R. Payne, operator of Hico Nursing Home.

Payl E. Drake, president of the TNHA, and Roy J. McDond, president of the ANHA, issued a joint statement saying the Medicare Bill fails to establish sufficient standards to asare the safety, good care and comfort of nursing home patients.

"Our Association leaders have outlined a series of amendents to the proposed bill and one of the biggest flaws in it is simple requirement that the Secretary of Health, Education nd Welfare can determine what services are to be provided the derly merely by consultant procedures with state agencies, and we feel that this is not enough," Mrs. Payne said.

"The amendment we are proposing would require particiting nursing homes under the bill to be accredited by the Naonal Council for Accreditation of Nursing Homes sponsored the ANHA and the AMA, or meet other high standards," irs. Payne explained.

The amendments also would require participating nursing mes to be built of fire resistant materials or be protected by utomatic sprinklers and where available, automatic fire deection systems, according to the report given.

Mrs. Payne pointed out that standards for accredited ursing homes are generally higher than those required in the edicare Bill now in the Congressional hopper.



found beneath light gray, waxy coverings. There are several species including the San Jose scale, the White scale, and the Soft scale The first symptoms of scale infestation is a decline in the tree's vigor, characterized by sparse, yellow foliage. You can also see the waxy scales on the branches. A dormant oil spray is used to control the scales. It must be applied while the tree is dormant.

The guide for controlling cotton insects has been revised and is available in the Extension office. The guide, in addition to listing the recommended control measures, points out many other important factors involved in the overall problems of controlling cotton insects and the safe use of in-
