MRS. PAYNE ATTENDS NURSING HOME MEET

Mrs. W. R. Payne of Hico Nursing Home attended the 15th annual convention of the Texas Nursing Home Association, held at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin last weekend.

Among many of the outstanding speakers that addressed the more than 300 delegates from over the state was Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Mr. Ben Barnes of DeLeon.

Favorable weather conditions, plus a change in date of a neighboring show could bring out an all-time record number of entries for Hico's 18th Annual Livestock Show.

The popular event is set for Friday, March 19, at Hico City Park.

Local FFA Chapter Advisor Harold Walker is expecting a record number of entries if the show gets a break in weather.

Several improvements have been made at City Park since the last show, foremost being the concrete

flooring in the larger of the two exhibit barns.

An added feature of this year's show will be showmanship trophies to be given in each division to junior exhibitors. Trophies will be presented after each division is judged, and the donor will immediately make presentation.

Sponsors of trophies are Howard Drug Company, Community Public Service Company, J. E. Woodard Produce Co., Hico News Review, and Erath Co. Electric Cooperative. Howard Drug will also present a trophy in the dog division.

Judging Schedule

Judging of animals will get underway at 9 a.m. with the swine division.

Goat division will be judged at 10 a.m., followed by the sheep division at 11 a.m.

Dairy cattle judging starts at 1:30 p.m., and beef cattle and dogs will be judged beginning at 3 p.m.

As in past years, top-notch judges have been secured for this year's show. Mr. Bill Oliver of the Animal Husbandry Department, Texas A&M University, will place the livestock. Mr. J. Warren Nordyke, Central Ohio Breeders Association, Texas Representative, will place dairy entries. Both men are highly qualified and well respected in judging circles.

General rules of the show remain the same this year, as do entry fees.

Bids Being Sought For New PO Building

The Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids for a building to house its postal facilities at Hico. Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced this week.

Under the Department's Lease Construction Program, a contract will be awarded to the bidder who designates a building suitable to the Department's needs and agrees to improve it, or to provide a new building—either to be accorded to departmental specifications and then lease it to the Department for a basic period of ten years, with options to renew the lease for an additional twenty

years. The Department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

Bidding documents will be available on or about March 19, 1965, and may be obtained from Vernon E. Bell, Real Estate Officer, P.O. Box 1386, Lubbock, Texas. Mr. Bell will supply bidding forms, specifications, lease provisions and other information.

Bids must be received in the real estate officer's office not later than April 20, 1965.

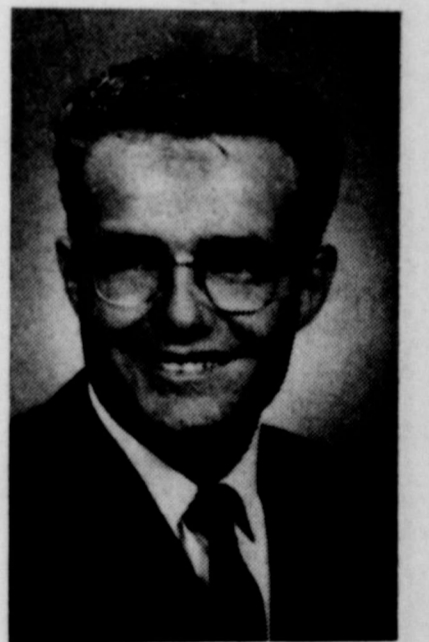

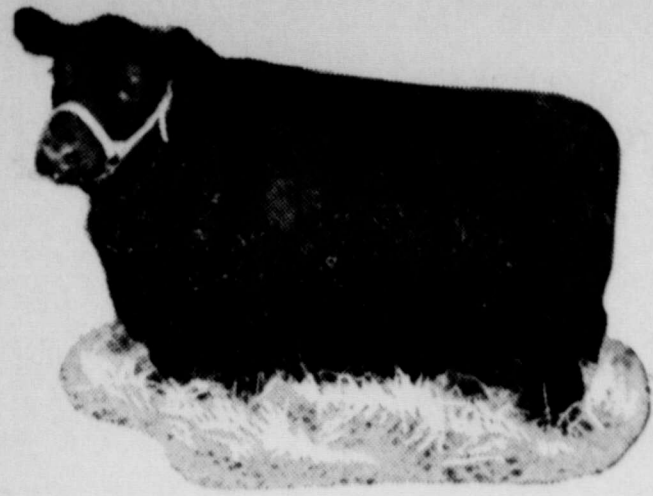
Former Resident Named President of Stephenville Jaycees

Friends and acquaintances here of Mr. William D. (Bill) Huggins of Brownwood were very sorry to learn of his passing at 4 a.m. Saturday in a Brownwood hospital. Mr. Huggins, a well known singer was well known over this county and many other parts of Texas. He was born Sept. 5, 1900 at Bethel, near Zepher. In early manhood he was married to Miss Ethel Head of Center City. His wife being a talented musician they spent much time together going from place to place worshipping God in song. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday at 3 p.m. at Center City Baptist Church, with Rev. W. T. Sparkman of Weatherford, and his son, Virgil Sparkman of Fort Worth officiating. A choir com-

posed of some 60 to 75 singer friends rendered a 30 minute song service prior to the funeral, using many of his favorite songs. Also two numbers were rendered by the 4-H Quartet, and four numbers were rendered by the Hamm Family, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Hamm and their three young sons. Mrs. Hamm rendered all of the music with the exception of the 4-H quartet.

Mr. Huggins is survived by his wife; two sisters, Mrs. Dunsby of Comanche and Mrs. Jessie Willeford of Priddy; three brothers, Jack of Caddo, Okla., John and Joe of Fort Worth, and a host of nieces and other relatives who mourn his passing. Mr. Huggins had been in ill health for several years due to a heart condition, and he was also a diabetic. They had resided at Brownwood for a number of years. His wife was an employee of the telephone co. and Mr. Huggins was an insurance adjuster.

The bountiful flower offering bore tribute to his memory, many being furnished by singing groups of different communities. Burial was in Center City Cemetery.
