In a confusing election as ever witnessed here, Wayne Rutledge and Alvin Casey were returned to places on Hico City Council Tuesday of this week.

The confusion arose after the name of Casey was omitted from the ballot. He was an announced candidate for re-election to the alderman post, as was Rutledge, but failure to get his candidacy certified by the city secretary before the filing deadline caused the omission from the ballot. He had signed up in time, but his name was not certified until two days after the deadline.

Overall, 96 votes were cast in the election. Rutledge received 94, Casey 74, all write-ins, and the following also received write-in votes: Sherman Roerson 9, Jimmie Ramage 1, Jim Jameson (already a member of the council) 2, Ray Keller 3, Grady Hooper 1, and Horace Ross 1.

Lamar Johanson One Of 15 Graduate Students To Receive Traineeship

Lamar Johanson, resident of Hico, was one of 15 students in the graduate college of Texas A&M University to receive a National Aeronautics and Space Administration Predoctoral Traineeship for the coming school year. The Traineeship is awarded on the basis of merit, scholarship, and the ability to do independent research.

The recipient of a NASA Predoctoral Traineeship is allowed \$2,400 a year to apply to his research work as well as receiving a monthly stipend and dependent's allowance. All fees, tuition, and books are paid by the Graduate College under the NASA Grant.

Mr. Johanson holds both the B.S. and M.A. degrees in Biology from Southwest Texas State College, San Marcos. After completing a three-year tour of duty in the Air Force, of which he now holds rank of Captain in the reserves, he became a member of the staff of the Department of Biological Sciences, Tarleton State College. After two years of teaching, he took leave of absence and is currently working toward a Ph.D. degree in Plant Physiology at Texas A&M.

The recipient's wife, Marilyn, teaches Home Economics in the local schools. Mr. Johanson was quoted as saying that "Receiving of the NASA Traineeship is undoubtedly the most wonderful thing that has ever happened to me from an academic standpoint."

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

The screwworm fund drive is now in the second week. Goal for Hamilton County is to raise \$3,100 by April 12. Only about twenty percent of that amount came in during the first week. The screwworm fund drive treasurer, Jeff Perry, reported that \$638.60 had been contributed and in the account at the end of the first week. He expressed confidence that county livestockmen will reach their goal by next Monday. About 80 farmers and ranchers are collecting contributions and most of them are not expected to turn in their contributions until the end of the drive.

Dr. C. B. Cathey, county chairman, suggested that people owning livestock not wait until they are asked to contribute, but go to their bank and leave their contributions.

These donations may be left at Hamilton National Bank, Perry National, or Hico First National, also First National of Evant, and First Security at Cranfills Gap. The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation suggested that producers contribute on the basis of 19 cents per animal unit.

One of the major obstacles is that stockmen with small operations feel their share of the total is so insignificant that it isn't worth the bother. This is far from the truth. The success of the drive in this county depends on

contributions from small producers as well as the large ones.

If sufficient funds are not available the eradication program will have to stop operations for the next three months. Dr. F. J. Mulhern, director of USDA's Animal Disease Eradication Division, said that if the program was stopped, screwworm flies would start moving north from Mexico immediately and within a month one fertile female fly could be responsible for producing up to 15,000 fertile flies.

Sheep and goat producers in this area will have an opportunity to hear reports on current research and a discussion on mohair improvement and marketing at the annual sheep and goat field day to be held Thursday, April 15 at the Livestock and Forage Research Center near McGregor. The field day will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 3 p.m. with a barbecue served at noon.

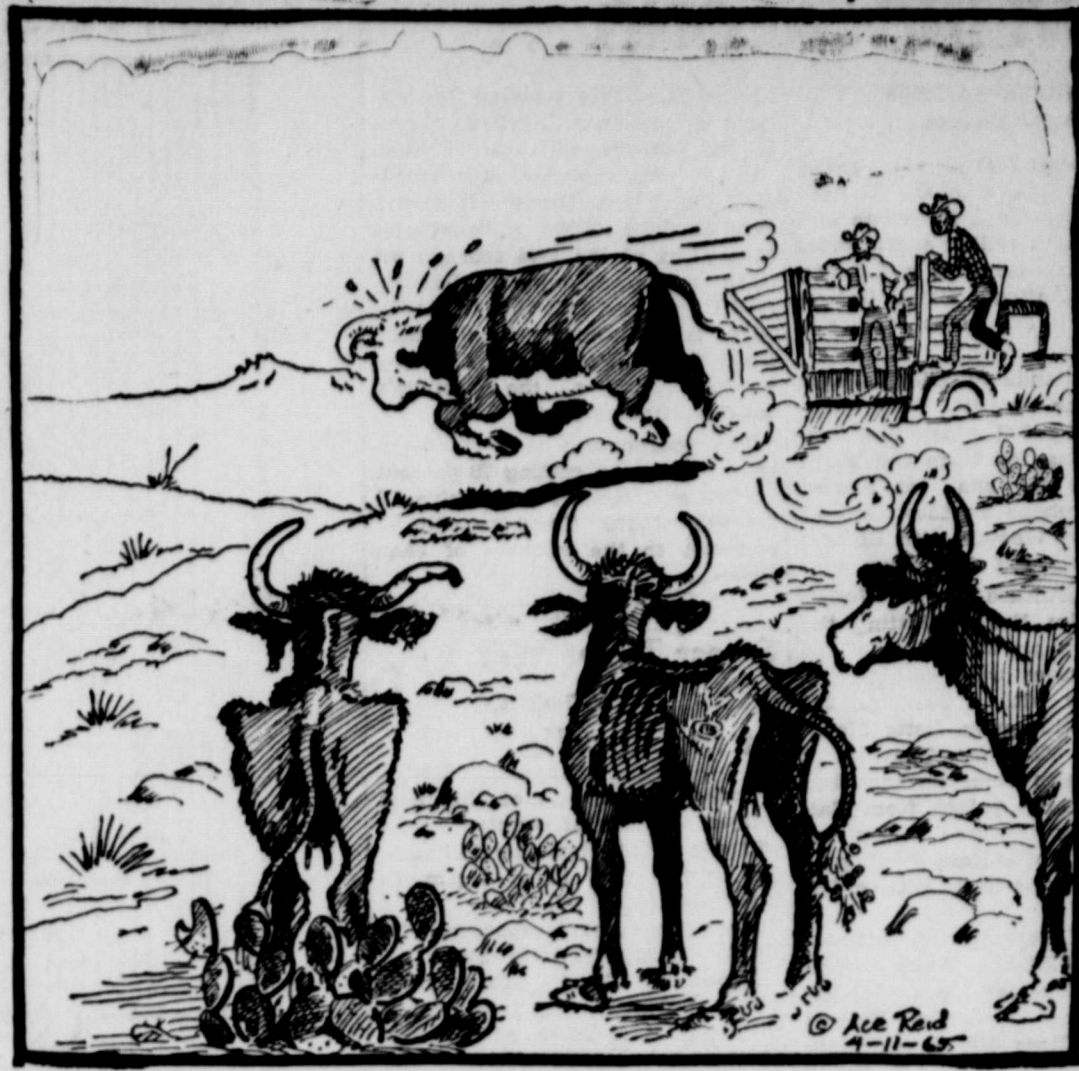
The Hamilton Young Farmers are having a pecan grafting field day at the Johnny Harris place Saturday. Dr. George Madden, Research Horticulturist at the USDA Pecan Experiment Station in Brownwood, will be on hand to demonstrate the art of pecan grafting.

There are reports from many parts of the county of greenbugs in small grain. Greenbugs develop to large numbers during a cool spring. These plant lice suck sap from plants of all small grain. Infested fields may have small "deadened" areas which may increase and spread throughout the field.

The necessity for applying insecticides for greenbug control depends on the number of greenbugs present. When you find as many as 300 bugs per linear foot insecticide is needed. The appearance of small deadened areas caused by greenbug feeding is also a good

indication that treatment is needed.

The insecticides recommended for greenbug control is Methyl parathion or Parathion at the rate of one to two pints per acre, or Malathion at the rate of one and a half to two pints per acre. Malathion is less effective on greenbugs than the other two but may be used where a less toxic material is preferred. Greenbugs are controlled more effectively when the temperature is above 50 degrees.

Enlarged Senate

Senators saw bugs in the plan they passed earlier to enlarge their membership from 31 to 39, guaranteeing all but five incumbents terms extended through next year's elections.

So, Sen. Louis Crump of San Saba introduced a new version that would require all Senators to run for re-election in 1966 if they want to keep their jobs. New measure quickly won committee approval.

Increasing terms from four to six years still is a feature of the "big senate" plan. If approved by the Legislature, it will go to voters July 24. Senators think it will be a relatively painless way out

of a re-districting for them.

A Senate bill to legalize variances of 15 percent over and under mathematical population average for House and Senate districts also received committee approval. This despite warnings that federal courts, which ordered districts of equal population, might disapprove.

Estimated \$89,000 to Be Spent on New County FM Road

Austin, April 5.—Revised plans for a newly designated Farm to Market Road in Hamilton County were approved last week by the Texas Highway Commission. Under the revised plans the new FM road will extend from U.S. Highway 281 in the City of Hamilton northeast approximately 5.9 miles. Originally the new FM road was to extend from State Highway 22 east of Hamilton northeastward approximately 5.3 miles.

The revision in plans was made at the request of the Commissioner's Court of Hamilton County.

Action by the Commission was taken subject to the condition that officials of Hamilton County will furnish to the Texas Highway Department needed right of way clear of obstructions and free of cost to the state. The state's cost of the project was estimated at \$89,000.

Sheep-Goat Field Day Set April 15th At Research Center

McGregor, April 6.—Reports on current research and a discussion on mohair improvement and marketing are among the highlights of the sheep and Angora goat field day to be held April 15 at the Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor.

Geneticist Maurice Shelton, who is in charge of sheep and goat research at the Center, says sheep reports will concentrate on current work in a three-pronged program of intensified sheep production.

The sheep intensification system involves early weaning of lambs, use of high concentrate or high grain rations, and multiple lambing, according to Shelton.

Discussions on mohair marketing was scheduled at the suggestion of producers. In a planning meeting, one producer told Texas A&M officials that mills look to other regions for quality mohair and keep their employees busy during slack seasons sorting Texas mohair.

Three prominent Texans and a representative of Burlington Industry Mills will be featured in the mohair marketing discussion. Other research reports will cover such topics as fertility in Angora goats, fetal dwarfing in sheep due to effects of temperature, freeze losses in Angoras, and studies in wool and mohair.

Jack Groff of Kerrville, Extension Service sheep and goat specialist, will present a demonstration on preparing wool and mohair for marketing.

The field day will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 3 p.m. with a barbecue served at noon.

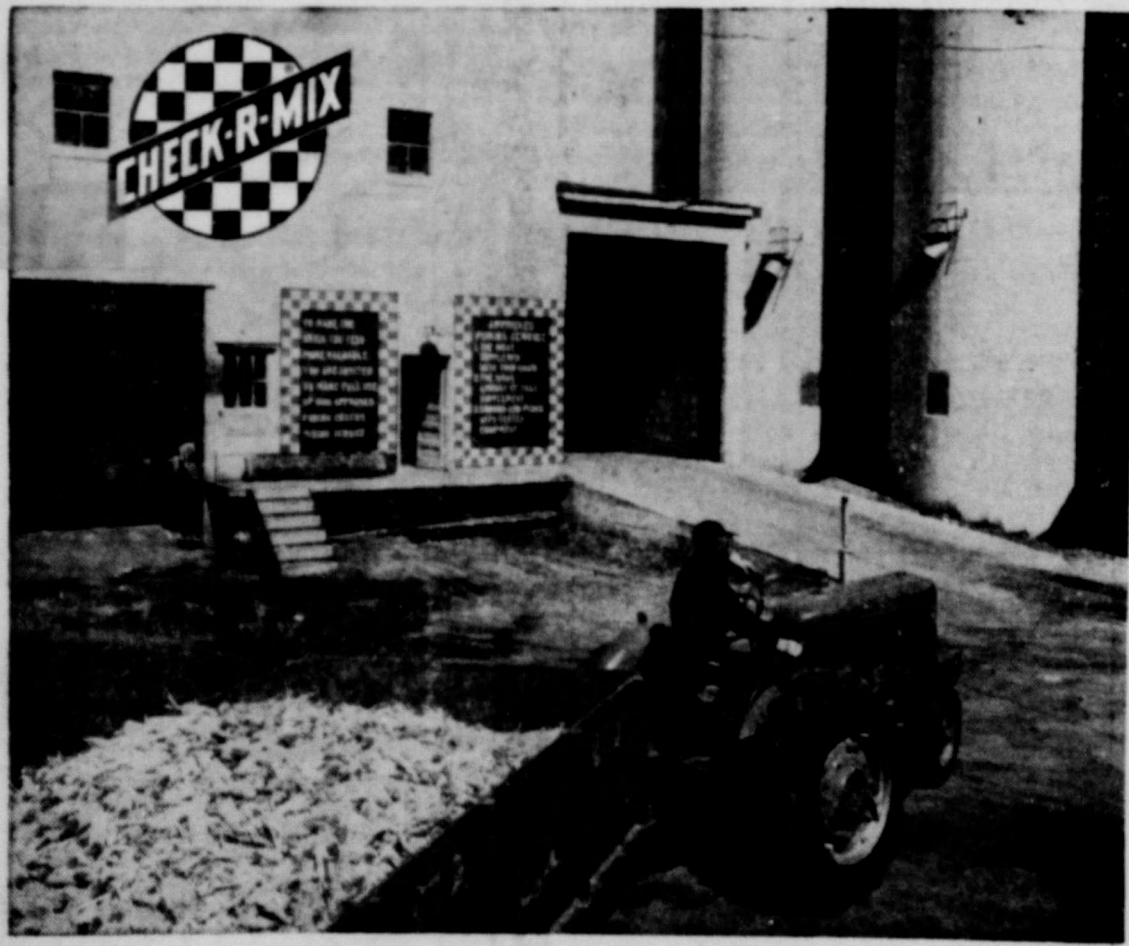
