First the group visited the Valley School for smaller boys. There were two boys just past their 9th birthdays here. Next school was the Terrace school where older boys are quartered.

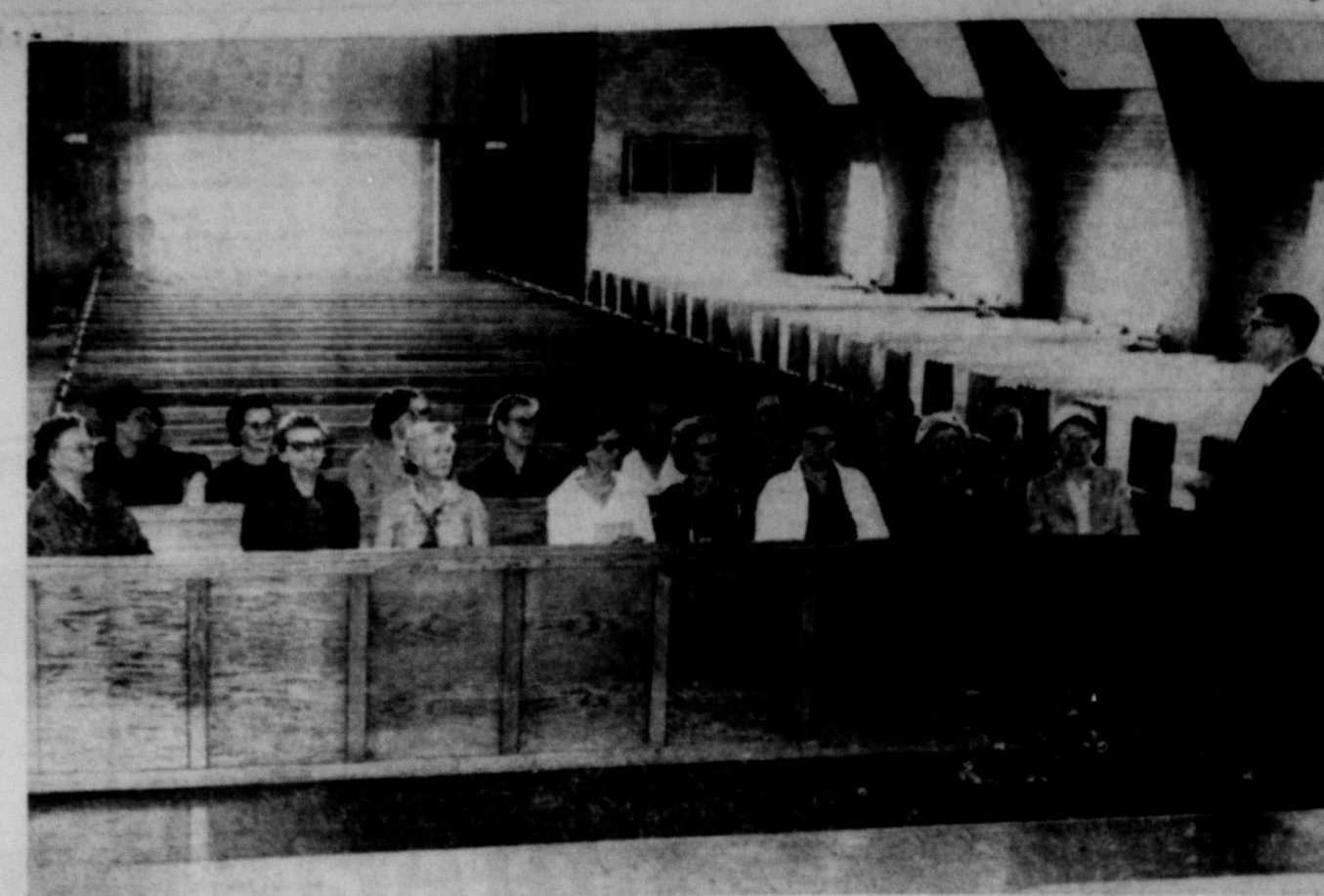

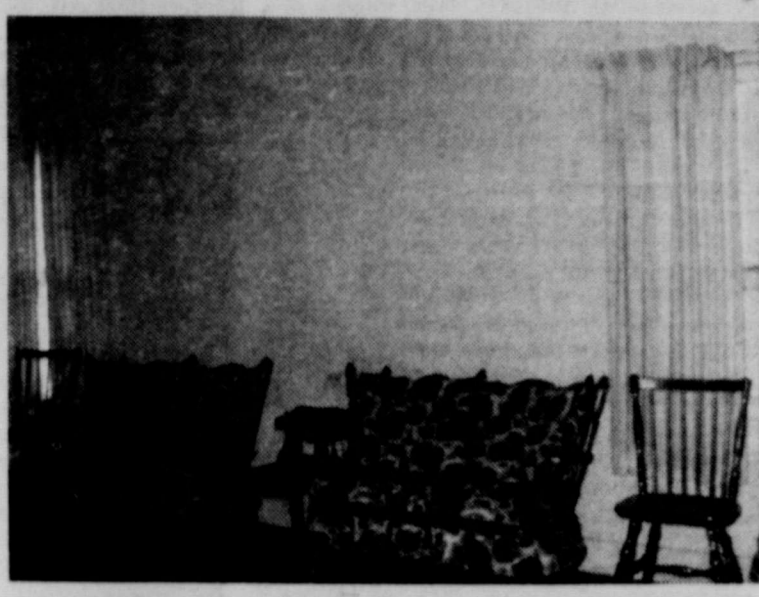
