The Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad Co. will ask for a postponement of its application to abandon a 220-mile branch railway between Waco and Stamford, the railway's board chairman said Tuesday night.

John W. Barriger, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the MKT, told the Parsons, Kansas Chamber of Commerce, "We have decided to take another look at these lines to see if it is not possible to retain them as profitable operations."
