## FINAL RITES CONDUCTED FOR LOUIS ABEL, 47

Friends and acquaintances here of Louis Abel of Grand Prairie were very sorry to learn of his passing about 8:30 p.m. in the Veterans Hospital in Dallas Tuesday, April 27. Although his death was not unexpected, it was hoped that major surgery he had undergone about 9 days prior to his death would be beneficial to his health and prolong his life.

Louis was held prisoner for over three years during World War II by the Japanese, and due to the starvation, malnutrition and all he endured he never regained his

health. Although for a time he did seem to be doing fairly well, but the blood stream of his body was affected and this grew worse as the years passed and brought about a condition that was impossible to cure or even help in restoring his health. I'm sure many feel as this scribe that we could never have repayed him for all he had gone through for our freedom, and despite all that our dear ones have gone through it seems we still do not have the freedom they fought for.

Johnnie Louis Abel was born at Carlton on July 29, 1917 to John T. and Mellie Arrant Abel, being

47 years, 9 months and 10 days of age. He spent most of his boyhood days in the Fairy community.

He was married to Miss Mary Alice Jackson of Fairy in January of 1948. They had been residing in Grand Prairie for a number of years.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 April 29 at the Baptist Church in Hico, with Rev. Ernest Duncan, pastor of First Baptist Church of Arlington and Bro. Stanley Singleton of Burbank Garden Church of Christ in Grand Prairie officiating. Louis was a member of the Grand Prairie Baptist Church. Burial was in the Fairy Cemetery.

The beautiful floral offering bore tribute of love and respect for the deceased. A very large crowd attended the services and most every family in this and all surrounding communities attended. Pallbearers were V. A. Kreuger, Ernest Hoard, Ray Graves, Loye Murrell, addresses unknown, Carl King of Fairy and Cecil Parks of Dallas. Some of the pallbearers were in prison camp with Louis.

He is survived by his wife, one sister, Mrs. O. J. (Beatrice) Clark Sr. of Fairy; two nephews, Milton and O. J. Clark Jr. of Fort Worth, and a niece, Mrs. Dean Barnett of Amarillo; also many other relatives who deeply mourn his passing. Our deepest sympathy is extended to the bereaved wife and other relatives at this time of sorrow.

We were also sorry to learn of the passing of John Ellington of Glen Rose. The writer, along with a number of others from this community attended the funeral service. Mr. Ellington was a former resident of Fairy. We extend sympathy to his family.

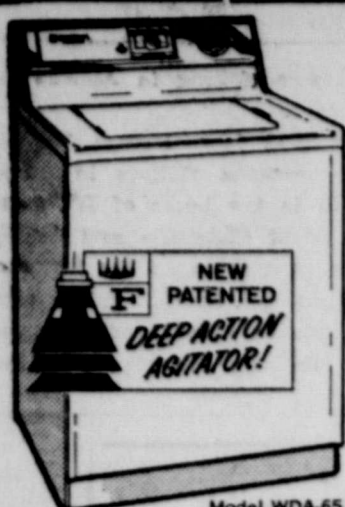

Typical nuts are about the same size as those of the Mahan variety grown under the same conditions. They are more blocky in shape similar to nuts of the Stuart variety, but are slightly more elongated with the ends more rounded than those of the Stuart. The shell color and markings resemble those of Success. The flinty shell is thin, with relatively little soft inner shell. The kernel surface is fairly smooth and the parallel grooves are shallow and open. When grown in a favorable environment nuts of this variety may average 35 nuts per pound or less, and the kernel may exceed 60 percent of the weight of nut.

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Sixty people attended the Hamilton County Pecan Management School last Wednesday. Most of these were county residents, but several came from out of the county.

The three speakers gave a very interesting program during the morning session at the court house. After lunch we had planned to use about 30 minutes demonstrating the technique of inlay grafting and patch-budding, but there was so much interest that we used one and a half hours in this demonstration. Some experienced pecan men told me that Blueford Hancock was the best teacher of grafting and budding they had ever seen. He explained every move of the hands and knife so that anyone could understand.

Later in the afternoon we removed the corrugated bands which had been placed on limbs April 8. We had hoped to find many pupae under the bands; but we found only two. This confused the specialists, but they finally decided that many of the casebearer larvae were killed when the pecan trees were sprayed for tent caterpillar control. We would like to believe that it is an indication of a light casebearer infestation this year, but this is probably not true.

Dr. George Madden, Research Horticulturist at the U.S. Pecan Field Station in Brownwood told how new varieties were developed and tested at the station. This experiment station has received world wide recognition for its pecan breeding work.

Dr. Madden talked about the most recent variety released, the Mohawk. This variety was released April 7, 1965. To give you an idea of the time it takes to develop a new variety, the Mohawk is a result of a cross made in 1964. It was a selection from a cross between Success and Mahan. The first nuts of this selection were produced in 1953. Since that time it has been evaluated in many areas.

The Mohawk is well adapted as a yard tree or commercial tree in Hamilton County. The leaves are large, are held late in autumn and appear resistant to disease. The nuts mature exceptionally early for a variety that produces large nuts.

## Game Warden Reports

Now that spring is here I know many of you sportsmen will turn to fishing. I would like to remind you about your license. Please be sure you have one in your possession before you go if you are fishing in the way you are required to have one.

Only persons that are not required to have a license are persons under 17 or over 65 years of age. These persons may fish in any matter that is legal by law without a license. However a person may fish on property which he owns or resides without a license. Or a person may fish in the county in which he resides with pole and

line or trotline or throw line so long as he does not use a winding device without purchasing a license.

So please check before you go and if you have to have a license, please get it. The game warden had rather check your license than to have to issue a ticket.

For all you folks that are interested in ordering fish to stock your ponds I would like to remind you that the application can not be accepted for black bass since the deadline was April 1. There will not be another bass delivery until next spring for you folks that don't already have your application in. However, for those of you who would like to order channel catfish you may still file an application with me until the first of August. Please try to have this application in by that date since that will be the deadline for

channel catfish. Again I would like to caution you folks about taking fawn deer from the wild and making pets out of them. This not only violates the law, but can also be very dan-

gerous to your family or friends. Some of these animals have been known to do very much bodily harm to people even after they have had them for long periods of time. So let's leave them where

God put them—in the wild. Don't think if you find a fawn deer that it has been abandoned by its mother. If you will just leave it alone the mother will return after you leave.

## THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

### Highlights and Sidelights

Austin, Texas—Texans will go to the polls of November 2 to vote on at least six, and perhaps 18, amendments.

Six proposals for Constitutional Amendments already have cleared the Legislature. Ten to 12 others appear to have a good chance of being approved before the end of the session. Senators and representatives introduced 128 proposals for amendments.

Major interest at the Nov. 2 election will be on the proposal to increase to four years the terms of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and other officials elected statewide.

Voters also will approve or defeat amendments to:

Extend the Veterans Land Program;

Let the Legislature set the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House (at whatever level the Legislature chooses) and raise its own per diem expense allowance from \$12 a day for 120 days to \$20 a day for 140 days;

Allow the state to issue bonds for loans to college students;

Exempt Hermann Hospital in Houston from payment of ad valorem taxes;

Permit the teacher retirement system to invest its money in corporation stocks, as well as in bonds.

A seventh Constitutional Amendment to go to the voters is a housekeeping item to clear up uncertainty about when members of the House of Representatives take office. If approved legislators will

take office on the date the Legislature convenes. This amendment proposal, however, will be on the regular general election ballot in November 1966.

**Repeal Poll Tax, But . . .**  
House has passed a constitutional amendment to repeal the poll tax, but it went to the Senate with an amendment requiring annual registration.

Proponents of the poll tax repeal bitterly fought the annual registration requirement. They contend that the states where fraud and political bosses reign are the states with annual registration requirements.

Resolution proposes a statewide vote in November, 1966.

**Drinkers' Rights Urged**  
Rep. Jake Johnson of San Antonio presented his bill to legalize sale of mixed drinks in Texas before the House Liquor Regulations Committee.

Johnson calls his bill a "drinker's bill of rights." He says it is needed to "bring some sense to the chaotic liquor laws in Texas."

Committee also heard bill to permit families to make up to 200 gallons of their own wine.

Both proposals were sent to subcommittees.
