HICO A GO GO GO GO!

Recreation Center Assured As Member Minimum Reached

Bluebonnet Country Club, Inc., a recreational center for Hico and this area, was a step nearer reality this week when membership reached the minimum requirement for obtaining a loan in a sufficient amount to construct the facilities.

Other preparatory details are currently being taken care of, and members are optimistic about the chances of a September opening date.

Memberships are still being accepted, and will continue for an indefinite period. Current fee is \$10.00, with a \$10.00 per month dues fee, beginning with the month of June. Committee members pointed out that people desiring to pay memberships at a later date would be assessed a minimum fee in an amount equal to that paid in by the original members prior to completion. In other words, if a person waits until August, his fee will be \$30.00, plus \$10.00 per month. They point out that this is the only fair way that the membership can be handled. No initiation fee, other than the \$10.00, has been charged.

On the planning board for Bluebonnet Country Club is a revamped club house, caretakers

quarters, swimming pool, nine-hole grass green golf course, and other facilities later.

An architect-engineering firm from Bryan has been employed, subject to loan approval, and representatives of the firm have already started work.

Golf Course Staked

Location of golf green and tee boxes were staked this week. Other planning is also underway in order that construction can be started immediately upon final approval of loan.

At present the steering committee has almost completed every step necessary in compliance with loan regulations, and anticipate no problems in getting the actual money. They are working through George Krupala, Co. Supervisor for Farmers Home Administration. The loan sought is styled Rural

Community Improvement Loan, and is available only to towns of under 2,500 population.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Cool temperatures have slowed the development of the pecan nut casebearer. I have been checking pecan trees every day for over a week and did not find any case- bearer eggs until last Monday. Very few were found then. This indicates that May 24 through 28 will be the time to spray the trees.

The most ideal day to spray, providing the weather is favorable was Wednesday, May 26. Ordinarily, only one application of spray is required to control the casebearer. If heavy rains occur shortly after treatment part of the bene- fit will be lost.

Some people owning a few yard trees prefer to make two applica- tions of spray. If you plan to do this, spray on May 24 and 28.

Malathion is one of the best casebearer killers if you spray twice. It has a very short residual and is not preferred when only one application is made. I recommend sevin if you are going to spray only one time. It has a long resi- dual and is one of the best case-

bearer insecticides. Livestock do not have to be removed from an area where sevin is used. Other recommended insecticides for casebearer control is toxaphene, DDT, thiodan, parathion and gu- thion. It is also a good idea to add two pounds of zinc sulfate to 100 gallons of spray solution to con- trol rosette.

Many of you have probably noticed that the grasshoppers have hatched out and some areas are rather heavily infested.

Now is the time when the grass- hoppers can be effectively control- led. Several insecticides are effec- tive in controlling the young hop- pers. Only malathion and sevin can be used on pastures where dairy cows will be grazed. Toxa- phene, dieldrin, aldrin, and hep- tachlor will kill the grasshoppers, but there are certain limitations for grazing livestock on areas treated with these insecticides. Livestock should be removed

during treatment for 7 to 10 days

afterward when aldrin, heptachlor and toxaphene are used. Dieldrin should not be used on ranges and pastures to be grazed by livestock. However it is very effective to use on ditch banks, roadsides, wastelands, and non-crop areas. Livestock should be removed for 5 days after applying malathion. There are no restrictions for live- stock grazing on areas treated

with sevin.

Meeting will be in the vocational agricul- ture building and will start at 8 p.m. Mr. Meekma will speak on "Balancing the Dairy Ration."
