Of wood construction, the building features a reception area, business office, private office, laboratory, patient room, x-ray developing laboratory, and is equipped with central heat and air conditioning.

Equipment purchased by Dr. Blackstock is of the very latest type and design, colored in eye-pleasing blue. Color scheme inside the office is primarily beige, with built-ins done in blue, complementing the equipment.

About the Doctor
Dr. and Mrs. Blackstock moved to this area in December. They have owned a farm between Hico and Iredell for eight years, where they are making their residence.

Dr. Blackstock retired from dentistry late last year after practicing in Houston for 34 years, and after moving here decided to open a limited practice.

He is a graduate of Texas Dental College, now a branch of the University of Texas, and has taken a post graduate refresher course at the University in 1962 in keeping with the modern changes in dentistry.

The doctor is a member of Southwest Society of Dental Prosthesis.

Mrs. Blackstock, a qualified technician, will help her husband in his practice here.

Dr. Blackstock is a native of Weatherford, and the couple have two children, both married. A son, Arthur Thomas II, resides in Houston, and he and his wife are parents of two children. A daughter, Mrs. H. V. Moore Jr., resides in Arlington with her husband and two children.

Travis King, Former Olin Man Outwits Viet Cong Battalion

(Ed Note: The following is a reprint of an Associated Press wire story concerning Travis King, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus King of near Olin.)

SONG BE, South Viet Nam—An American aid official outwitted a Viet Cong battalion that occupied his neighborhood in Song Be for nearly 24 hours.

Travis King smilingly presented himself at the U. S. Special Forces camp at Song Be.

"We were sure they had caught you," said Capt. Robert E. Faugust of Jacksonville, Ill. He had found the body of King's Filipino assistant late the afternoon before outside Kings house.

King has been the U.S. aid mission representative in Song Be, capitol of Phuoc Long Province, since last November.

Five American military men were killed in the initial Viet Cong attack on the town. King, who lives in the center of the sprawling town, hurriedly left his house when the firing began and went to another he had just rented.

"I figured that if they were looking for me they wouldn't know where to look there," he said.

However, the Viet Cong were all around the house.

"I could hear them outside," King said. "They even built two bunkers for their machine guns outside my window but they didn't come in."

King's Filipino assistant apparently was shot when he rushed from his own house to King's during the initial stage of the attack.

Earlier in the week the Special Forces team at Song Be had given him a submachine gun for his personal protection but he didn't have it with him when he moved into hiding.

"And what could I do with that gun anyway against such big odds?" King said.

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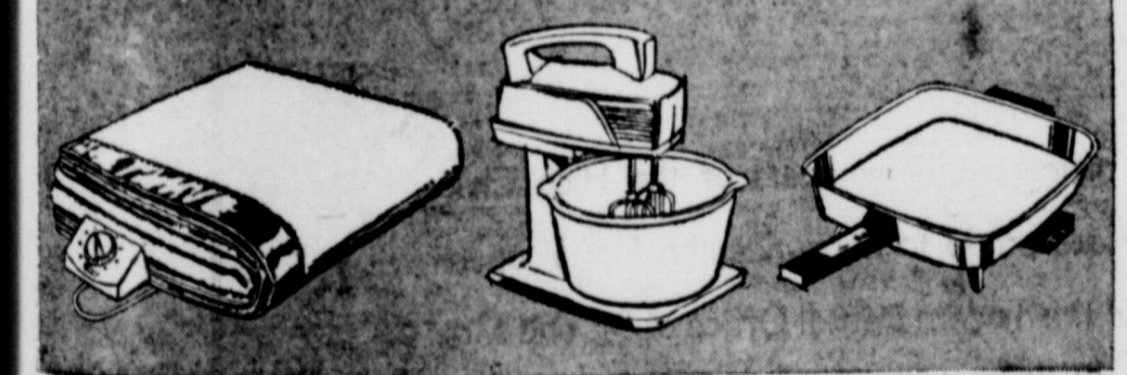

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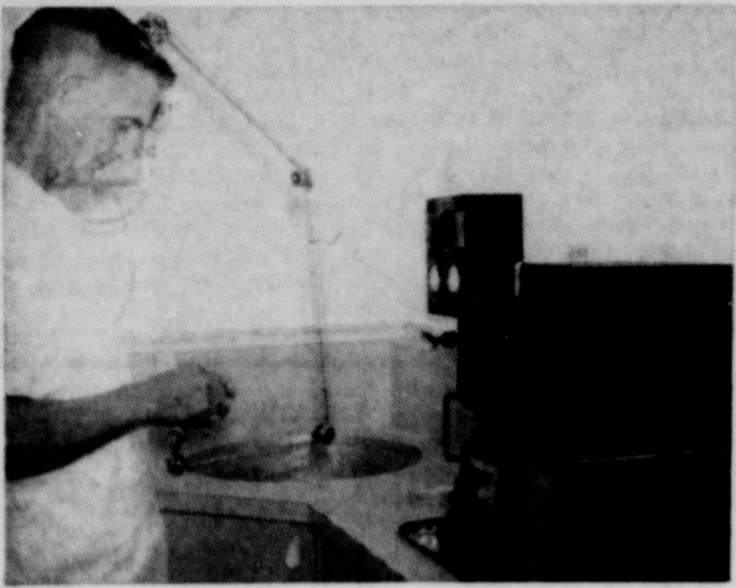
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The Road Runners

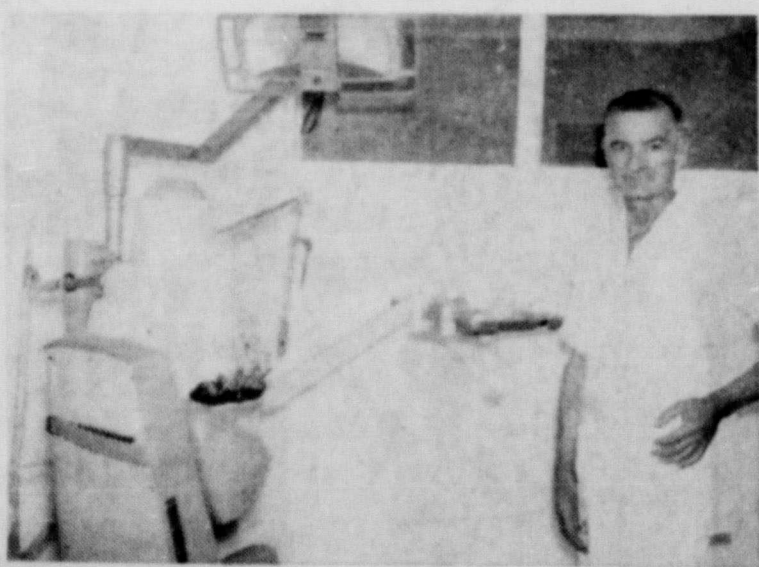

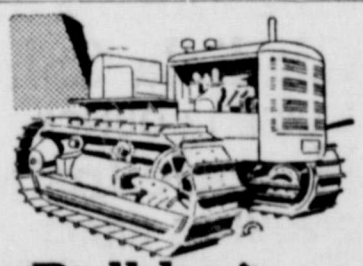
