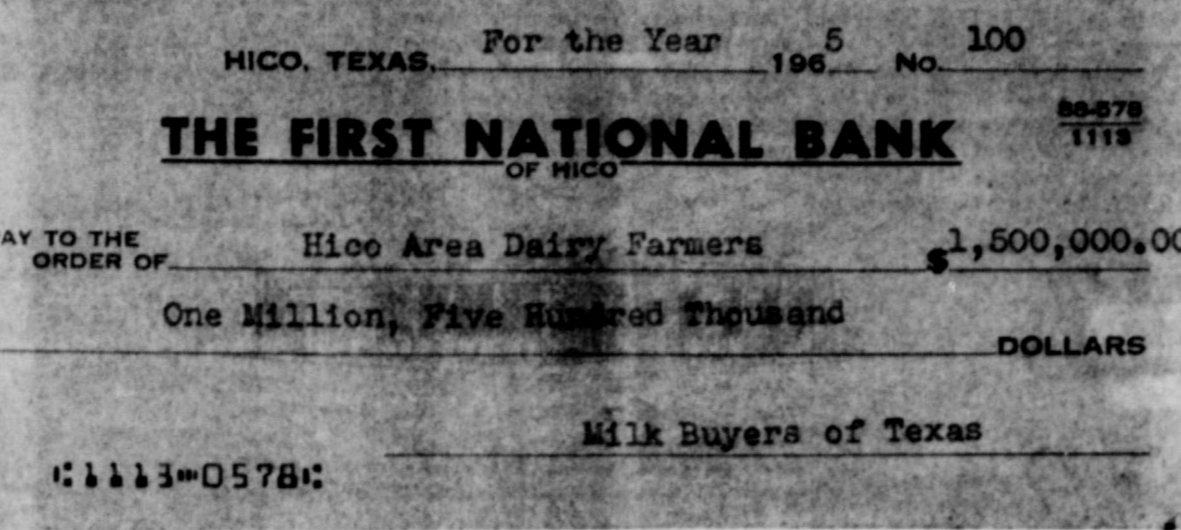

Believe it or not, the check replica above represents the approximate amount of cash money paid Hico area dairy farmers last year by milk associations and independent milk companies for their product.

It's easily seen that the dairy industry represents Hico's foremost cash producer and the News Review took the above method to illustrate just how big the industry is, and what it means to each and every business and service institution in Hico.

Thus, the News Review, along with other businesses, are appropriately recognizing our dairymen during June Dairy Month.

In this immediate area, there are approximately 24 dairies, each with an average 60-cow milking herd, for a total of 1,440 animals working daily to provide the many benefits derived from the industry.

And that is a lot of cows, producing a lot of milk for a lot of people. The end result to all the man hours by both the dairyman and the cows is the more than one million dollars annually that is poured back into our community.

Out of the million dollars, the dairyman pays for all of his feed, supplies and other essentials necessary for actual operation of his farm, plus food, clothing, and untold other things for his family, most of which is spent right in Hico.

No agricultural payroll in this area is more regular or consistent than the milk check, and it contributes a steady flow of cash into the community.

What we must all do is realize that these more than a million dollars do not just come to our area; they are the result of careful planning, good farm management, and a generous measure of hard work. It is not enough for our citizens to merely offer the traditional salute to the dairy farmer, well-deserved though it is. We should realize that only by buying and using dairy products are we helping to maintain the market which the area dairy farmers are called upon to help supply.

We must realize that it is only to our best interest to support the dairy farmer in his every effort to secure trade agreements and legislation to promote research into dairy product use, and to stimulate nation-wide increases in dairy food consumption—and thus make steadily more valuable this growing industry which benefits us all.

History of Hico Cemetery Compiled

Just one mile east of Hico, on Highway 6, is the Hico Cemetery. Its main entrance is on the south but the original entrance at the north-east corner is still marked by the beautiful old ornate gate, too narrow for present use, because it was designed during the days of horse-drawn hearses and buggies.

The trustees of the Hico Cemetery incorporated in 1886 chose Dr. Daniel Pingree as president, O. R. Morrison as secretary, and R. Y. Cox as treasurer. In 1887 they adopted their by-laws. In order to pay the expense of purchasing, establishing and improving the cemetery grounds, the trustees offered for sale lots at prices to be made known at the time and the place of sale. The secretary and the treasurer were vested with full power to convey and manage all deeds, et cetera.

On January 2, 1887, \$100.00 was paid to C. Garrett and his wife, U. M. Garrett for five acres of land, and on September 15, 1904, \$150.00 was paid to Mrs. Bettie E. Cox, widow of R. Y. Cox, for 15

Local Authorities Looking For Would-Be Curbing Assailant

A lone man in a light colored, late model car attempted to curb a Hico resident Sunday night, and the lady outran the would be assailant at speeds in excess of 90 miles an hour. The man turned off Highway 6 at the Hico Cemetery and the woman continued on into town and notified officers of the incident.

Monday afternoon of this week a Hico woman, traveling alone toward Hico from Stephenville, noticed a white late model car making a U-turn after she had passed his car, and followed her into the edge of town. Not knowing about the earlier attempted curbing at the time, she wasn't unduly alarmed, but the similar description of the man and car indicated that it could have been the same person still operating in this area.

These are the only two reported incidents, but should anyone in the vicinity have had a similar experience and can furnish a more detailed description of man and car, or give a license number, they are urged to contact local authorities.

People traveling alone at night, especially women and young girls, should keep their car doors locked at all times, the windows closed, and by no means stop along the roadway for anything. Should they be forced from the highway, leave the car motor running, and if an attempt is made to enter the car, you should speed away as fast as possible. Obtain car license number, and a description of the person, and report to the nearest authority.

Sound Business Practices Guides Dairy Farmers

Operating a dairy farm today is strictly a dollar and cents business. While living on a farm is a way of life which many people prefer, earning a living on today's modern farms requires that sound business methods be fully understood and practiced.

The dairy cow that produces the income for the dairyman is one of the most wonderful factories in the world, but, like any other factory, she must be rated for her efficiency.

When her services as a milk producer are finished, she becomes an important source of meat and leather and other by-products for man.

Throughout her life, she is performing other valuable services, providing a major part of the nation's veal supply and also restoring to the soil at least part of what she removes each day.

Just as a factory owner replaces inefficient help, the dairyman must replace inefficient cows. Production records determine which cows are "good investments" for the dairy farmer.

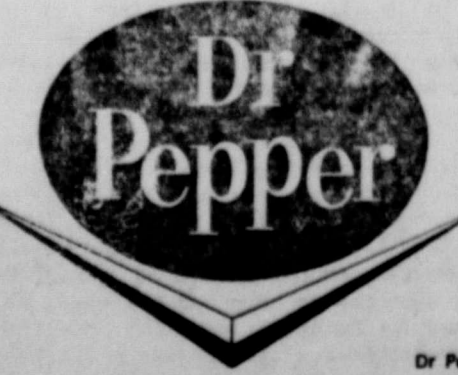

Milk Goes to Consumer Farm Fresh by Modern System

From the time milk leaves the dairy barn. This milk is promptly cooled to 60 degrees or below until it is transported by refrigerated truck to the processor.
 During production and delivery, the milk is under refrigeration. This assures the consumer of a quality dairy product and also enables dairies to transport milk great distances safely.
 The quality control of Grade A milk is greatly aided by refrigeration. In addition, however, the sanitary quality of milk depends

chiefly upon the effectiveness of a farm sanitation program. This program is effective only when a close working relationship exists between the field sanitarian and the milk producer.
 It is the function of the field sanitarian to see that the basic fundamentals of producing milk of superior quality are followed:
 The cows should be clean and healthy.
 They should be milked in clean surroundings.
 All utensils with which milk comes in contact must be of approved construction and properly cleaned and sanitized.
 It has been established that systematic routine laboratory testing is essential to the success of a quality-control program. The widespread use of refrigeration is a basic part of any quality-control program to assure consumers of the finest dairy products.
 Keeping a daily supply of dairy food in the nation's stores, restaurants and homes requires the services of more than two million people.


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Fairy Community News

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Each year more farm pesticides are being used to control plant diseases and insects, and although these chemicals increase crop production and protect produce from pests, many of them also needlessly take the lives of farm people every year.

The Hamilton County Program Building Committee is joining with the National Safety Committee and the National Planning Committee for Agricultural Chemical Safety to make farm families more aware of the dangers of accidental poisoning.

According to De Gordon, County Agent, accidental poisoning can be prevented if these four keys to pesticide safety are followed.

1. LABEL. Read everything on the label and follow instructions to the last word. Use common sense to bridge the gap between what is written on the label and the actual chemical application.

2. USE. Chemical users should thoroughly plan their application programs. Use the correct chemical at the right time for the job to be done. Use the appropriate respirator when required. Wear the prescribed type of clothing or skin covering as noted on the label or on special instructions. Keep children away from mixing, dusting, or spraying areas.

3. STORAGE. Agricultural chemicals should be stored in a cabinet, room, or building that can be clearly marked and locked, and where there is no chance of contact with human food or livestock feeds. Keep chemicals in their original containers—never in pop bottles, canning jars, or unmarked containers, especially those associated with food and drink.

4. DISPOSAL. Dispose of empty containers immediately. Never throw containers or small leftover amounts in garbage cans or dumps accessible to children. Crush or bury metal or glass containers whenever possible. When burning containers, avoid inhaling the fumes. Gasses released by the heat may be extremely poisonous.

If a person who has been using pesticides suddenly becomes ill or feels faint, the family doctor should be called immediately. Doctors, poison control centers, and hospitals have the equipment and information necessary to treat accidental poisoning cases effectively.
