Eight Members Will Represent Hico FFA Chapter at Convention

Eight members of the Hico Future Farmers of America Chapter will attend the State FFA Convention in Houston July 14-16, according to Dwain Gray, president of the chapter. The three day meeting of representatives of over 900 chapters throughout the state will include the awarding of advanced degrees, scholarships and awards to outstanding members of the organization.

Members of the Hico Chapter who will attend are Jim Lackey, Howard Strader, Joe Tooley and Mike Christian. Four other members, who will compete in the talent contest are Drewford Barnett, Alan Royal, James Mayfield and Morgan Leeth.

Jim Lackey has been selected by chapter members as delegate to the state convention. Joe Tooley will serve as alternate.

Among the important business to be transacted at the convention will be the election of a state president from the ten officer nominees, who have been elected by members in the ten areas of the state. Voting delegates to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City will also be elected.

The highest award of the Texas Association, the Lone Star Farmer Degree, will be presented to 785 members. The membership will confer Honorary Degrees on adults who have contributed in an outstanding way to the accomplishments of the organization.

Harold Walker, Vocational Agriculture Teacher, will accompany FFA members to the Houston convention.

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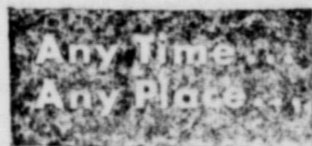
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Clairette Community News

\$100,000,000 Surplus State government will begin the new fiscal biennium with a surplus of nearly \$100,000,000. But it will wind up with a balance of only \$4,200,000, according to estimates of the Governor's budget office. In a recap of legislative spending, Gov. John Connally's staff tallied all appropriations at \$3,700,000,000, of which \$622,900,000 will come from general revenue. (Votes by the governor of \$2,600,000 from the spending bills are deducted). Figures put state cost of the average \$553 teacher pay raise at \$70,600,000,000 for the two-year period beginning September 1. Total new revenue provided by the 59th Legislature will come to \$82,506,000, according to revised figures. Biggest portion of this comes from the three-cents-a-pack increase in the cigarette tax. Auto Insurance Hikes Auto liability insurance rates will increase an average of 14.4 percent on August 1. Rates will vary widely in the 25 rating areas in the state. However, some coverages will go down in cost, by as much as 17 percent. These policies are for insurance against losses not connected with accidents—such as fire and theft. State Board of Insurance says it has carefully reviewed the loss data forming the basis of the rate changes and finds that the new rates will be "adequate and reasonable as required by law." In another area of insurance, Texas companies have had more than \$15,000,000 worth of claims from hail and storm damage. By this time last year, \$9,000,000 had been paid in such claims. Biggest blow came from the Wichita Falls storm of May 27.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Congratulations to Johnny Harris, Hamilton County rancher and pecan producer, for being elected president of the Texas Pecan Growers Association. Johnny was elected to this important job at the TPGA's 44th annual conference this week at A&M University.

Theme of the conference was "Texas Pecans, Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow." L. D. Romberg of the U.S. Pecan Field Station at Brownwood was honored at the conference. The researcher was cited for his development of such pecan varieties as Barton, Comanche, Wichita, Apache, Sioux, Choctaw and Mohawk.

There will be two important events of interest to Hamilton County farmers and ranchers during the next few days. An Angora goat field day will be held at Buster Adam's ranch south of Shive on Friday, July 9. The field day begins at 1:30 p.m. This will be of special interest to 4-H and FFA members, but adult goat producers will also benefit from the field day.

When the fish population in a pond becomes unbalanced with small stunted fish or rough, undesirable fish, it is best to remove all fish and start over with balanced stock. If the pond contains adult fish, pond owners should not stock the pond with fingerlings obtained from state or federal hatcheries. Certain fish are cannibals as well as predators, and a few adult fish can eliminate every fingerling in a short time.

The use of rotenone is an easy and practical way to remove most kinds of fish from private ponds. However, even if used as recommended, rotenone seldom gives a 100 percent kill of bullhead catfish. Other materials are available that will give a complete kill of bullheads.

Fish killed with rotenone are edible. Rotenone is not a poison in the true sense of the word since it kills fish by suffocation. People, cows, horses, sheep or any other vertebrate animals are not affected when they swim in or drink water treated with rotenone. It is unlawful to use rotenone in any public body of water.

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THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Austin, July 7.—Water remains very much in the spotlight over the state.

As June ended, cattle were in better than average condition, says the US Department of Agriculture. Pastures and ranges continued to furnish good grazing and rising cattle prices have resulted.

On the High Plains heavy showers boosted range prospects, but grass growth was slowing in many areas because of high temperatures which sapped soil moisture.

In the Trans-Pecos ranges some farmers and ranchers were forced to begin supplemental feeding. Some farmers have been combat-

ting the rain problem by irrigating their crops. A joint study by the USDA, the Texas Water Commission and the State Soil Conservation Board indicates that irrigation in Texas rose significantly from 1958 to 1964. Amount of water used increased nearly one-third, to 12,500 acre feet or an average of 18 inches per irrigated acre.

Amount of irrigated land increased by about 15 percent during the six-year period. Much of the gain occurred in the High Plains—in the upper parts of the Canadian, Colorado, Brazos and Red River Basins—but some of it also was in the basins of the Rio Grande and Nueces Rivers.

By next September studies to show how much water will be available in 2020 from Texas reservoirs and ground water strata already in use will be complete.

Then will come the job of finding additional sources to match yields to needs. This will involve searching for new surface water supplies as well as desalination of poor underground water.

When in-basin sources are checked out against the needs of each river basin, the planners expect to find some of the heavy rainfall regions will have more water than they will need, even to 2020, while others will not have enough.

Then, the question will be: where to take the surplus?

Tourist Attractions Praised University of Texas Bureau of Business Research credits tourist attractions with helping to keep the level of Texas' economy above last year's during the first five months of 1965.

However, business activity dipped 4.4 percent in May. January-May average index for 1965 was nearly 20 percentage points above the average for the same months in 1964. Bureau says there is "every indication" this will be a good year for the travel industry in Texas.

School Checks to be Made Texas Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar served notice on local school officials that the Texas education Agency will check complaints resulting from the Civil Rights Act.

Periodic reviews also will be made by TEA to ascertain whether or not districts receiving federal aid are abiding by non-discriminating rules.

Formal complaints will result in a hearing before Edgar, appealable to the State Board of Education and the courts.
