County Cancer Society Organized Last Week at Hamilton Meeting

Members of the American Cancer Society, Hamilton County Unit, met Thursday night, July 15 in the county courtroom for an organizational meeting.

John O'Neal, County Attorney, served as temporary chairman.

De Gordon, County Agent, chairman of the by-law committee, and nominator of the board of directors, presented a set of by-laws and a recommended list of directors. These were voted on and accepted.

The following officers were elected: Rev. Mac Hargrove, president; John O'Neal, vice president; Mrs. Bob Herndon; Service, Mrs. Grady Williams; Publicity, Mrs. Bob Miller; Campaign, Brad Corrigan.

The board of directors will meet the fourth Thursday in every month, except December, beginning in September.

Purposes of the Hamilton County Unit shall be:

1. To encourage, foster, and conduct programs for the continuing education of the public concerning cancer, its symptoms and detection.
2. To encourage, foster and conduct programs of service to cancer patients.
3. To conduct an annual fund-raising campaign in the time and manner prescribed by said division.
4. To encourage, foster and conduct programs for the continuing education and training of physicians, dentists, nurses, technicians, and others as to all matters concerned with the detection, diagnosis, treatment and prevention of cancer.
5. To meet and maintain the minimum organizational standards for units as established by said division.

Membership is open to all persons who want to join the local unit and make yearly contributions. All members shall have equal rights of memberships and each shall be entitled to vote at the annual meeting of the unit.

Mrs. Morris is survived by one daughter, Miss Thelma Morris of Fort Worth; one son, G. P. Morris Jr. of Fort Worth; and two brothers, Jim Lane and Lawrence Lane, both of Hico.

Ollie McDermitt, Pioneer, Looking Forward to Reunion

Ollie McDermitt, 83 years young and pioneer of this area, plans to be on hand when the annual Hico Reunion gets underway next week. Mr. McDermitt, now of Hamilton, attended school in Hico in 1903 and 1904. A great singer, he still attends gatherings over the county, and was in charge of the singing program during the recent Pioneer Homecoming at Hamilton.

The McDermitt family came to Hamilton County in 1885. They left Ferris, in Ellis County, headed for Hamilton to join friends who had settled near Fairy, which was known as Martin's Gap then.

On their way to Hamilton County in a covered wagon, they crossed the Brazos River at Kimble Bend, only crossing on the river for miles. The time of year was September. The water low and Mr. McDermitt remembers wading the small stream behind the wagon. When the river was full, traffic used a ferry boat.

After leaving Fairy the family went to Pecan Creek and visited a family by the name of Acres. The McDermitts lived there in a dug-out on the Will Doggett place for three months. In 1885 they moved down Pecan Creek to Snow Mill, later called Pulritte. In 1866 they moved to a larger home where two sisters, Mollie and Be-

sie were born. Leaving Pecan Creek Valley in 1888, they moved to the Gann community.

Mr. McDermitt gave the following biographical sketch:

"In 1890 we moved to a small tract of land known as the Baggett Land. My father settled this and that was the beginning of our home life and where my sister, Jimmie, was born. Since I was a little boy my five sisters and I were reared on the DeDurman Ranch four miles east of Hamilton. I well remember when we would be in the back yard and our mother would call out, 'Come to the house. It is time for supper.' We all gathered around the table where our father gave the blessing. We all knew what it took to manage a family life in frontier days. But we had a good time and all were happy. In the corner of our ranch, the community had built a brush arbor where old-time preaching and services were conducted by two brothers, Nolan and Dave White. We had a small school house moved to the corner of the ranch called Pecan School House which seated about 40 people. Dr. C. C. Baker of Hamilton was our first teacher. He rode horseback from Hamilton. Our next teacher was an old-timer, C. C. Powell of the Rock House community. Mrs. T. E. Cooper and Mrs. Pet Curry followed the first two as teachers. I managed later to get a pony and saddle and attended school at Hamilton. The next year I made a trade with the Ed Secrest family. I did chores for my board and room. The next year I made a trade with the Collier family."

Approximately 1500 homemakers are expected to attend the conference. The program is the direction of the Division of Home Economics Education, Department of Education. Miss Ruth Huey, division director. Teachers meet after the statewide conference for meetings for training in new developments and trends in making education.

School Trustees Look Over Budget, Raise Tax Rate 10¢

Regular meeting of the Hico Board Monday night, July 19, in time and discussion went over a preliminary budget for the 1965-66 year. Costs, like all others, had increased from year to year. One of the most unpleasant, but necessary functions of any school board is to figure out how to keep up to meet state requirements and at the same time to reduce the tax burden as low as possible on the taxpayer.

The school board has been unable to meet its obligations for the past three years. Next year, the State Legislature, an extension will be needed to pay the balance of the increase.

The board pays 80 percent of all salaries while the local district must assume the remainder. The state also sets the salaries which must be

paid. Insurance on all school property will be due in 1968. This amount is approximately \$4,500. In the past the board has been able to include in the budget a savings to meet the insurance obligation.

Property evaluations in the local district are about \$3,000,000.00. A ten-cent raises added to the present \$110 tax rate will provide about \$3,000.00 in additional revenue next year. The board is of the opinion that this will be a sufficient amount to take care of the two above mentioned obligations.

Hico school district has the lowest tax rate of any school in this area. The property evaluations are about average, lower than some districts but higher than some.

To meet the obligations of an accredited school, the local school could see no alternative than to make this small increase in the tax rate.

6 p.m. Parade Will Kick Off Four-Day Celebration

Everything is in readiness for start of the 79th Annual Old Settlers Reunion, scheduled to be kicked off next Wednesday, July 28, with a street parade beginning at 6 p. m.

Reunion mgr. Ray Keller has the program lined up for the four days, and other details are fast nearing completion.

The parade, which annually attracts a large crowd of people, will be kicked off with a horse race between Hico Riding Club and Hamilton Sheriffs Posse. Riders on horseback will start three miles this side of Olin and race to the Hilltop service station south of town. The race begins at 4 p. m.

Parade Route Changed

Route of the parade has been changed from that listed in last week's paper. The parade will form near the home of Fred Rainwater. Entries are asked to be in place by at least 5 p. m. so that parade positions may be drawn for.

After formation, the parade will progress down main street to the depot, then back up the same

route and turn at the Odis Petsick residence, passing by Hico Nursing Home, and will continue on to the park before disbanding.

A jet aircraft from General Dynamics in Fort Worth will officially kick off the parade, laying down a trail of smoke in a low pass over the city.

Thursday night, "The Continentals," a Beattie-type band from Ft. Worth will provide entertainment. The group has appeared on several radio and television programs, and come to Hico highly recommended.

Friday night will feature the annual Miss Reunion Contest. And a full evening of entertainment is in store, with a near-record 42 entries vying for the titles of Junior and Senior Miss Reunion. Pictures of all contestants appear throughout this issue of the News Review.

Saturday night has been set aside for the traditional Old Fiddlers Contest, and a large number of both old and young fiddlers is expected to be on hand.

Activities all four nights begin at 8 p. m.

Survey Reveals 12 Known Civil War Vets Buried Here

Mrs. V. H. Jenkins, chairman of Hico Cemetery Historical Survey Committee, with the assistance of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Spinks, has secured names of the American Civil War veterans buried here.

Those listed are Ben Randals, T. J. Woods, Thomas W. Pruitt, Abraham Rainwater, William J. H. McBeath, R. B. Segrest, A. C. Spaulding, W. G. Weldon, Thomas H. Green, W. M. H. McGormak, Captain Rufus Stinnett, Jesse Darnell Hellums, and Owen Slaughter.

These ancestors of local citizens fought in the savage four-year war 1861-1865, between two great geographic sections of the United States. One section was the North—23 Northern and Western states that supported the federal government. The other section was the South—11 Southern states that had withdrawn from the Union and formed an independent government called the Confederate States of America.

The war came as a climax of a long series of quarrels between the North and South over the interpretation of the United States Constitution.

The war paved the way for the adoption of the 13th Amendment, which forbade the use of slave labor in the United States.

Anyone having information on Littleton M. Sawyer, Alexander L. Maxwell, and James L. Huchingson, or any other Civil War veteran buried here and not listed above are urged to contact Mrs. Jenkins.
