Hico Schools Set To Open Aug. 30

Hico Schools will open Monday, August 30, with a general assembly at 9 o'clock in the auditorium. Parents and friends are invited to attend the opening program.

Classes will meet on a 40-minute schedule the first day, with dismissal at 2:45 p.m. Buses will run the same routes and at the same time as they did last year.

Lunch will be served the first day of school. Prices will remain the same as last year, 25c for grades one through five, 30c for grades six through 12, and 35c for adults. The same policy will be in effect concerning lunches as in past years. Students may eat in the lunch room, bring their lunch, or go to their homes.

Pre-Registration
Pre-registration for high school students will start at 8 a.m. Fri-

day, August 27. Teachers will hold their first faculty meeting Saturday, August 28 at 8 a.m. in the auditorium.

Birth Certificates
All first year students are required to have a birth certificate to present the first day of school as proof of their age.

Students who don't have a certificate may obtain a copy by sending \$1.50 plus the name of the child, date and place of birth, and both father and mother's names to the Records and Statistics Section, Texas State Health Department, 410 East Fifth Street, Austin, Texas.

Required School Attendance
House Bill 51 raised the required school attendance of students from 16 to 17 years of age.

House Bill 51 says, in part: "Ev-

ery child in this state who is 7 years of age and not more than 17 years of age, other than a high school graduate, shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of his residence, or in some other district to which he may be transferred as provided by law, a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term of the district in which said child attends school."

Economic Opportunity Act.

Application has been made for advantages offered by the Elementary Secondary Education Act of 1965. If the application is approved special help will be given in remedial reading and pre-school work. Also application has been made under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. This will give help to economically deprived high school age youth. Students will be allowed to work and participate in a counseling program for as much as 12 hours per week. Purpose of this program is to encourage students to stay in high school until they have finished.

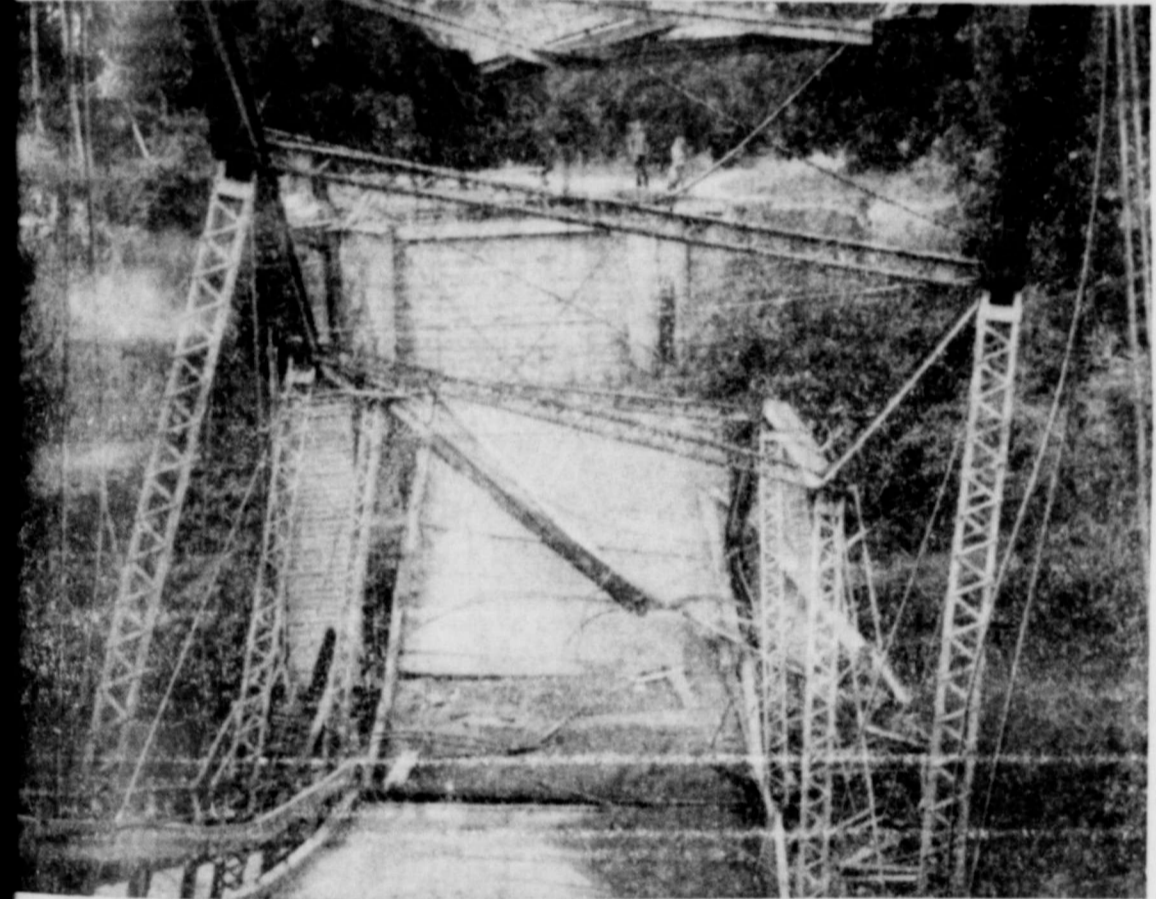
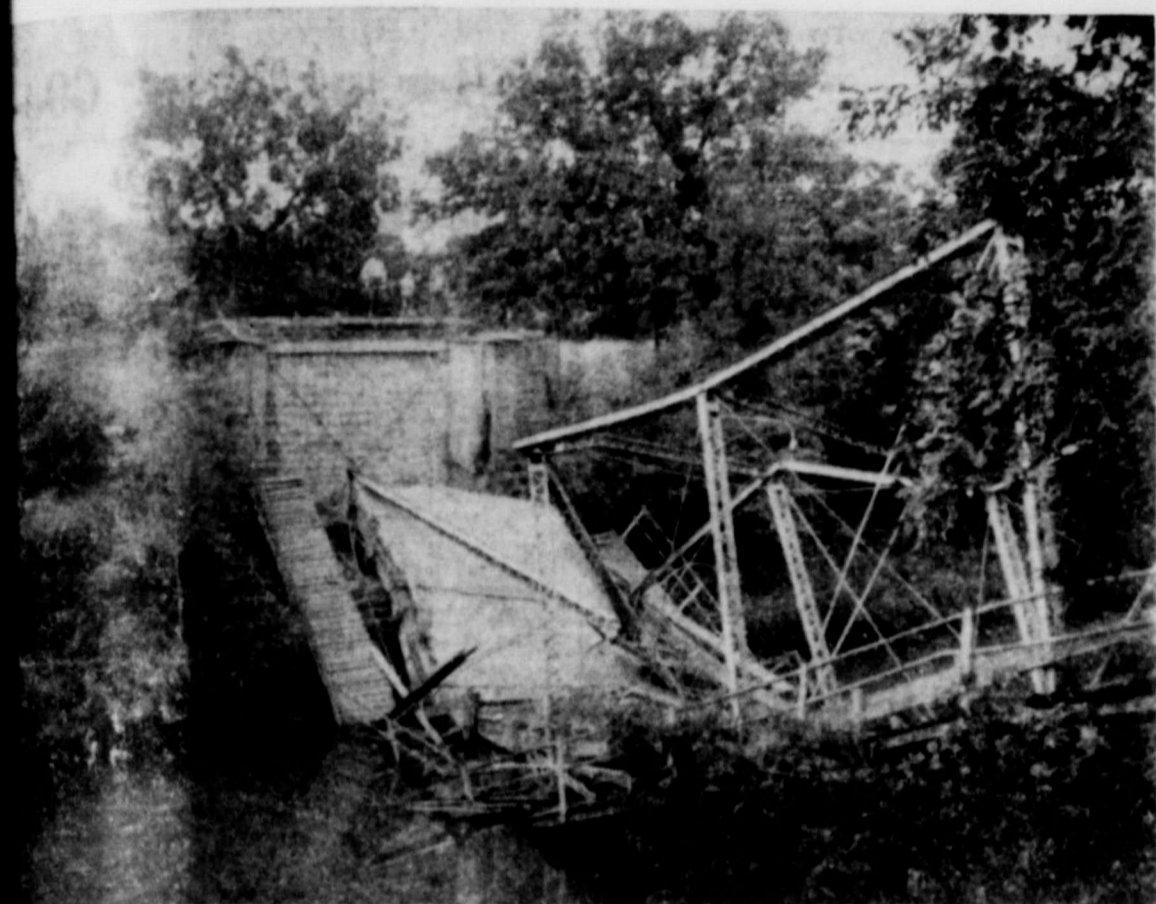

And the Bridge Came 'Tumbling' Down

Hico residents awoke Friday morning of last week to hear news circulating about the collapse of the old Bosque River Bridge, that is, those who didn't hear the 57 year old structure as it came tumbling down about 11:45 Thursday night.

The bridge apparently fell after being hit by a Chevrolet Corvette driven by John Ryan. The automobile barely made it across to the

south side before the bridge collapsed. Another car driven by Jimmy Herrington, was directly behind the car driven by Ryan, and Herrington managed to stop his vehicle in time to keep from tumbling into the bridge wreckage.

Ryan suffered severe head lacerations in the accident. He was hospitalized for the remainder of the night and released about noon the next day, Friday.

The structure was built in 1908 by Austis Bridge Company and had weathered 57 years of time, countless vehicle traffic, and some of the worst floods in history. It carried heavy traffic on old Highway 281 before construction of the new bridge and road about one-half mile upstream in the early 1940's.

Used primarily as an access road to City Park, and as a cut-off route linking farm road 1602 south the roadway and bridge was still a much-used artery carrying many automobiles and heavily loaded trucks.

The steel suspension bridge was constructed after the spring 1908 flood, reportedly the greatest single flood in the history of Hico. During the May 1952 Bosque rampage, the structure was completely covered by the high water, which was tabbed as the second most damaging flood here.

City Street Superintendent W. R. Hampton said that at present no action had been taken on removal of the wreckage, and there was no word, either, on the possibility of replacing the bridge.

A fall of sadness fell over this surrounding communities Sunday noon as news was passed that H. R. (Roy) Blakley had passed away at Hico Hospital at 11:30 a. m. Mr. Blakley had suffered a heart attack just after the noon hour on Friday, when Hollis Pear-

cy went by to get Mr. Blakley to go to Hico with him to drive his pickup back as Mr. Pearcy wanted to drive his tractor out. They had only got a short ways when he became ill. They returned to the Blakley home, as Mr. Blakley wanted to change clothing. They

then changed to the Blakley car and Mrs. Blakley accompanied them to the hospital. Mr. Pearcy, also a heart patient, had some medicine with him and gave Mr. Blakley a tablet which probably enabled him to live to reach medical aid. He couldn't seem to gain any ground, being bad from the start and passed away Sunday.

Mr. Blakley was born in Navarro County June 27, 1891 to the late Mr. and Mrs. Jim Blakley. In early manhood he was married to Miss Myrtle Elder of near Fairy. A son and daughter were born to them, namely J. W. Blakley of Rangely, Colo. and Mrs. Paul Hutton of Eunice, N.M. Roy had spent most of his life in the Agee community south of Fairy, until he purchased their present farm home northwest of Fairy. He was a member of the Fairy Baptist Church.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday at Fairy Baptist Church with Rev. Val Nance of Oklahoma officiating. Burial was in the Fairy Cemetery. The beautiful floral offering bore tribute of love and respect for the deceased. Virgil Parker had charge of the song service.

Mr. Blakley had been fortunate in that neither he or his wife had never been hospitalized. Pallbearers were Audie Clark of Stephenville, Oran Willeford, E. A. Gleason, T. R. Parks, Leslie New and Winfred Gardner.

Other than his widow and two children, Mr. Blakley is survived by three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Ada Laceywell of near Fairy and Mrs. W. N. 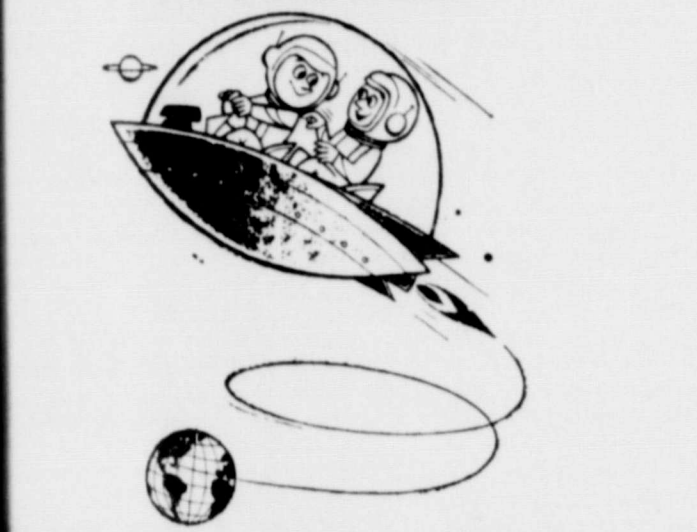
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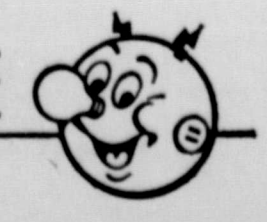

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 24, Article III and Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legislature. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amend-

ment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the General Appropriations Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session." Sec. 2. That Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall, while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature and the same mileage which shall be allowed to the Members of the Senate, and no more; and during the time he administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office." Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

They had never seen each other before the wedding. The parents investigate the grooms background, his ability to support a wife, and from every other angle. Some men have two to four wives if they are able to support them. plan to return there some time next year.
