## Local Baptist Church Collecting Clothing For Louisiana Victims

Through a telephone conversation with the New Orleans Baptist Seminary last Sunday, Rev. R. E. Tatum learned that the needs of the people in that area are still mounting. Total need is still mounting and more refugees are being up; people who have lost everything.

Baptists of New Orleans have one refuge center with between 8,000 and 9,000 people being housed in the Algiers sector of the city. "These people need food, they need food, they need food, because they have lost everything," Rev. Tatum said.

Baptists operate several good centers in the city of New Orleans, the oldest of which is the Daniel Sims Mission.

The First Baptist Church is collecting new or good used clothing and to the goodwill centers for distribution. Anyone who desires to donate these people may bring their things to the church this week.

## Requirements Given For Moving Cattle Into Certified Areas

Cattle entering Modified Counties or counties in the process of certification must be negative to the brucella agglutination test within 30 days prior to entry and be negative in not less than 30 more than 90 days after entry except those cattle exempt be-

steers, sprayed heifers, calves 8 months of age, and official brucella vaccinates under 30 days of age.

Cattle originating from Certified Brucellosis Free Herds when accompanied by an Official Health Certificate indicating status of origin.

Cattle, individually identified, originating from non-quarantined areas within Modified Certified Brucellosis areas accompanied by Official Health Certificate.

Cattle consigned directly to approved livestock market.

Cattle consigned and delivered to approved feedlot.

## Tigers Turn Back Bees From Stephenville 33-0

Hico's Tigers, playing before the home folks for the first time this year, put on a great offensive display in racking up touchdowns in each of the four quarters to wallace Stephenville Bees 33-0 last Thursday night. Dwain Gray scored two touchdowns, Leslie Royal got two, and Gary White added the other to notch Hico's points. Joe Tooley was successful on three of five conversion attempts.

Stephenville's only serious scoring threat came late in the first quarter when they worked to the Tiger four-yard line, only to have the opportunity snatched away by a stout defensive effort. The Tigers held a slim 6-point lead at the time, and the rebellious defense probably created the turning point in the game, as from that point on the Tigers scored almost at will in evening their record at 1-1.

Feature of the game was defense with the offense showing signs of jelling. There was some inconsistency, however, most of that coming when part of the first unit was out of the game. The starting backfield of Leslie Royal at quarterback, Barry Polk at full, and Dwain Gray and Gary White at the halves, could develop into a close-knit unit capable of scoring on any opponent. All four are good stout runners, and Gray and Royal add enough speed to offer a threat on long distance jaunts. Both White and Polk displayed some fine power running during the game.

Leslie Royal led the backs in total yardage for the night, rolling for 117 yards on 10 carries. Gary White picked up 44 yards on four attempts; Dwain Gray banged out 63 yards on 6 tries; Barry Polk got 26 yards on five carries; Howard Srader picked up five yards on his only carry; Jody Littleton made 9 yards on 2 carries; Mike Sutton made 3 yds. on 1 attempt; Dennis Polk lost three yards on one carry; and Jim Wolfe carried twice for a seven yard loss.

Defensively, the Tiger front wall must be recognized for their efforts. Barry Polk, Dwain Fail, Edmond Horton, Aodis Land, all were in the thick of the battle during the game, and freshman defensive back Dennis Polk came up with

his share of the tackles, once getting three in a row. Other defensive standouts were Jack Gilliland, Ronnie Hefner, Steve Knudson, Jody Littleton, Howard Srader, Lynn Malone and others.

Individual defense statistics compiled showed Barry Polk with 14 tackles, Edmond Horton with 11, and Dennis Polk, Aodis Land and Jack Gilliland, each with ten.

Fundamentally, the team appeared to be sound, with tackling and blocking especially good for a second game effort. One phase of the Tigers' overall play, which probably received a lot of work this week, was the kicking game. Gray did get off a couple of boomers with the aid of a stout wind, but on all attempts was rushed badly after receiving a bad center snap.

The Tigers set the pattern for the night by taking the opening kickoff and marching 65 yards for a six-pointer. They used nine plays, with Gray taking a pitchout and racing the last 26 yards around left end.

The second Tiger marker came early in the second quarter with only two plays required to traverse the 57 yards. A little trickery in the backfield sent Gray scooting 35 yards to the Bee's 28 on a well-executed reverse, and on the next play, White slipped over left guard, found running room in the secondary and rambled 28 yards to the double stripe. Joe Tooley made seven out of sixes and the Tigers were on their way with 13-0 lead. The TD was set up by a recovered Bee fumble.

Another recovered Bee fumble led to the third touchdown. This time

the Tigers gobbled up the ball at their own 44, and again used only two plays to cover the distance. Quarterback Royal called the reverse again to shake Gray loose for 33 yards to the Bee 33, and after a five yard delay of game penalty, Royal dialed his own number on a fake reverse, kept the ball and moved unmolested 38 yards for the touchdown. Tooley missed on the extra point kick, and the Tigers rested at intermission with a 19-0 lead.

The fourth Tiger TD must be credited to the defense, as Gray scooped up a Bee pass and set sail for 67 yards and the marker. Tooley's point try was good, making the score 26-0.

The remainder of the game was inconsistent as Coach Robert Lee elected to let as many reserves as possible see action. A recovered fumble at the Stephenville 34 produced the last marker. On the first play, Royal city-slicked the northern neighbors with a bit of fancy footwork when fans had already conceded a big loss to the quarterback. Appearing to be hopelessly trapped behind the line of scrimmage, Royal reversed his field, applied a burst of speed and raced into the end zone for the final tally. Tooley was again successful on the conversion kick and the game ended shortly with the Tigers tasting victory for the first time this year, coming out on the long end of a 33-0 score.

In summation, Hico fans were indeed proud of the Tigers for the convincing victory, and look forward to the remainder of the season.

It was way back in the 19th century in the town of Duffau. The country was wild according to our 20th century standard. So you must see, Walter didn't have access to the advantages that a young person today to succeed in life just almost must have; but despite the fact that his wife passed away while their children were young, he finished rearing them and in the meantime by industry he built a good business (the gin business) which was eventually ruined by the boll weevils (no fault of his.) Who under the conditions of his time and place could have done more and better? Many under more favorable conditions have done much less and worse.

Mr. Hollis, who has been one of our most respected citizens for these many years, died in the Hico City Hospital September 16.
