## Official Release Confirms Post Office Building Contract

The Post Office Department announced that a contract has been awarded to Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Mann, 1311 N. Main Street, Temple, Texas to build the new post office building at Hico, Texas, and lease it to the Department for a basic term of ten years with four 5-year renewal options. The announcement of the award to the successful bidder advances the new building closer to the construction stage. When fully operational, the additional space and more modern equipment will, in the long run, more than offset the extra cost involved in producing more efficient handling of the mail, in accord with President Johnson's directive to provide the best possible postal service at the least possible cost.

There are about 45,000 postal locations in the United States handling approximately 72.2 billion pieces of mail a year. By 1970 it is expected to rise to 90 billion. With the mail volume expansion now and in the future, it is necessary that the Department constantly re-assess its construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or re-

modelled, or to build new buildings for postal operations only where they are urgently needed.

The new building at Hico, which will be located on the northwest intersection of First Street and Mesquite Street, represents the lowest responsive bid of five received by the Department on a competitive basis, and reflects what Departmental studies have determined to be a reasonable and economical rental for leased space in this area.

The new Hico Post Office will have an interior space of 2330 sq. feet, a 122 square foot platform and over 8000 square feet of outside area will be provided for parking and maneuvering.

The new postal facility at Hico is expected to be completed early next summer.

## Tax Officer Sets Visit For Hico, Carlton

Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, County Tax Assessor-Collector, has set dates for her annual visit to Hico and Carlton for the convenience of local taxpayers.

Mrs. Williams will be in Carlton Wednesday, October 20 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., and will be at Hico City Hall the following day, Thursday, October 21 from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m.

Tax statements have been mailed, and the tax official reminded residents of the three percent saving allowed on state and county taxes paid in October. A two percent discount is allowed for November payment, and one percent for December.

Mrs. Williams also reminded residents that they may pay one-half of their total taxes before November 30, and the remainder by June 30 without penalty.

## Tigers, Panthers Battle To 12-12 Standstill

Said the first battered cat, "Huh, you didn't whup me."

Replied the second cat, "Huh, you didn't whup me either!"

End of conversation between the battered Tiger-cats and the torn Panther-cats after their 12-12 standoff last Saturday night at Gorman, Texas, peanut capital of the world.

In other words, neither team could feel satisfied over the outcome, and quoting Abe Martin, TCU football philosopher, a tie game doesn't prove anything, and is "About like kissing your sister."

But from a spectator standpoint the Hico-Gorman traditional battle was a real humdinger, with lots of tough defense, and enough offense by both teams to keep fans standing most of the night.

If excuses were needed—which they aren't—local partisans could look back on the game and say, "if it wasn't for that touchdown that was called back, or those 120 yards in penalties, or if Barry Polk hadn't been hobbled, the Tigers would have won." But they aren't, for the most part, offering any alibis and are marking the game down as one which saw two evenly matched teams battle for 48 minutes, each getting their share of breaks, both good and bad, but neither claiming a victory.

A recovered fumble led to Gorman's first touchdown, in the first quarter, the Panthers moving 49

yards for the marker to take a 6-0 lead.

Hico bounced back in the second period, scoring one touchdown and seeing another effort killed by a 15-yard penalty at the Panther 20. The six-pointer came on a 10-play 80-yard drive, with Dwain Gray scooting across from two yard out for the score. A penalty forced the Tigers to go for the extra point from the 8-yard line instead of the three, and the attempted kick was blocked, leaving the score 6-6 at intermission.

The Panthers used an 8-play, 47-yard drive to score their second touchdown, with the payoff coming on a one-yard plunge.

Their lead was short-lived however, as a bit of nifty running and faking sent Dwain Gray 85 yards on the ensuing kickoff for the tying points. Leslie Royal fielded the kickoff at about the ten, Gray cut back to the center of the field, took the ball from Royal and set sail down the left sidelines for the score. The Tigers attempted a run for the conversion, but Gray was stopped short by a foot.

The fourth period was bitterly fought with both teams trying desperately to break out of the 12-12 tie. The Tigers penetrated to the Panther 25-yard line once, and had the 53-yard touchdown run by Gray called back. Gorman penetrated to the Tiger 35 in the final quarter.

Dwain Gray led the ball carriers for the night, getting his second consecutive 100-yard-plus effort. He carried 18 times for a total of 114 yards. Garry White worked seven times for 27 yards, Leslie Royal carried four times for 6 yards, and Howard Strader picked up four yards on one attempt.

Aodis Land led the defensive blitz, racking up an amazing 22 tackles. Barry Polk, even though injured, had 13 tackles; Dennis Polk pitched in 11; and Edmond Horton had 10.

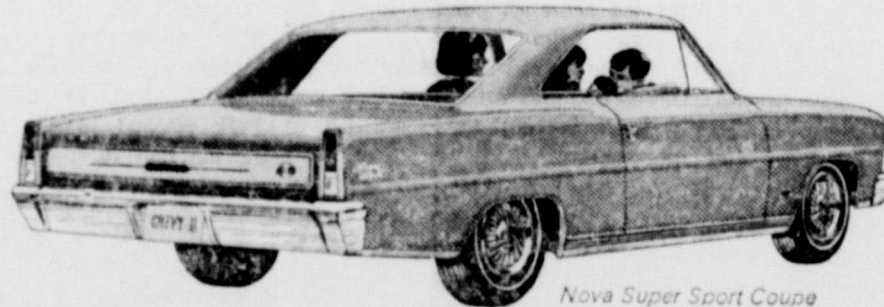

Mrs. Ed Holloway and Kenneth have recently from Fort Worth where Kenneth is the victim of muscular dystrophy, and is a member of the Greater Fort Worth Muscular Dystrophy Chapter. He has been a member for 14 years and meets once a month. Kenneth

has had muscular dystrophy longer than any other member because he has had it all his life. His mother says that he was born with it and symptoms appeared early in life as he seem to stumble and fall so much more than other children when learning to try to walk.

He led a normal life in his youth except he could not take part in active sports. In 1938 he raised a club calf and took it to El Paso and showed it and enjoyed this trip and experience very much. That same year he had surgery on his right foot at the Driver and Girard Clinic in Dallas. The doctors there thought he had had polio but after the operation discovered it was not polio but called it a muscular weakness. He was treated there for some time and at Baylor two years. His mother recalls that all those treatments and therapy proved to be very expensive and he

did not seem to improve.

Kenneth was born in Fort Worth and attended schools there. He only lacked a half term graduating from high school. In 1945 he completed a radio course at the State Vocation Rehabilitation Center and for a time in Fort Worth he had his own radio repair shop in their home. He is no longer able to work but enjoys television and likes to read. Mrs. Holloway says he eats well and sleeps good most of the time but she has to dress and feed him and tend to his every need.

The Chapter furnishes all special equipment, such as beds, chairs, lifts, etc. for their members. This Chapter includes members from 13 counties. R. D. Holland of Arlington is the president at this time. Kenneth served as telephone chairman for four years, keeping in touch with all members, reminding them of special parties, picnics and programs. When he moved he was presented a beautiful plaque for his faithfulness and work for the chapter.

The history on muscular dystrophy says that one rarely lives past his 17th birthday but Kenneth is nearly 41. He is the oldest of 7 children. The Holloways moved here five years ago from Fort Worth. Mr. Holloway operates his stock farm and rents additional acreage and is a welder by trade. Their church preference is Methodist.
