UIL Re-Districting Puts Hico in 17-B

University Interscholastic League re-districting alignment for Class B schools for the years 1966-67 was released this week and new football districts were also released by State Athletic Director Rhea H. Williams.

Under the new set-up, tentative at this time, Hico goes west, leaving old District 19-B and assigned to District 17-B. Schools in the new district are Bangs, Blanket, Gorman, Hico and May.

Valley Mills and Meridian move up to District 19A, while fourth member Evant enters District 18B. Supt. M. E. Petross of Bangs was appointed temporary district chair-

man. The district must be organized and the state chairman notified by December 15, 1965.

The 1966-67 and 1967-68 football assignments are based on the "average" of the average membership in the last four grades for the 1963-64 and 1964-65 school years as found on the Superintendent's Annual Report in the Office of the Texas Education Agency.

All schools with an enrollment of 115 and under have been placed in the most accessible Conference B district. Meridian and Valley Mills were moved up to Class A because enrollment in the two high schools exceeded the 115 student maximum for two consecutive years.

Tigers to Battle Boyd 'Jackets

Hico travels to Boyd this Friday night for an 8 o'clock game with the Yellowjackets, the contest being the first between the two schools since 1959.

Only two games have been played previously by the two teams, with Boyd winning the first game in 1958 by a 40-0 score. The Tigers turned the table the following year and were victorious by a 16-12 margin.

Boyd reportedly has another good team this year, owning a 4-2 season record. They are members of Class A competition, competing in the district with state power Keller, Springtown, and several Fort Worth area schools.

This will be the first of three, consecutive road trips for the Tigers, traveling the next week to Evant for the district opener, and then going to Meridian the following week, before closing the season at Hico with Valley Mills on Nov. 12. All remaining games except Boyd will be at 7:30. The Boyd game is at 8.

The Tigers came out of the Comanche game last week in good shape, and everyone including Aodis Land will be available for duty.

Captains for the Boyd game will be Edmund Horton, Dwain Fail and Ronnie Hefner.

Best route to Boyd from Hico is through Weatherford, Springtown and on to Boyd.

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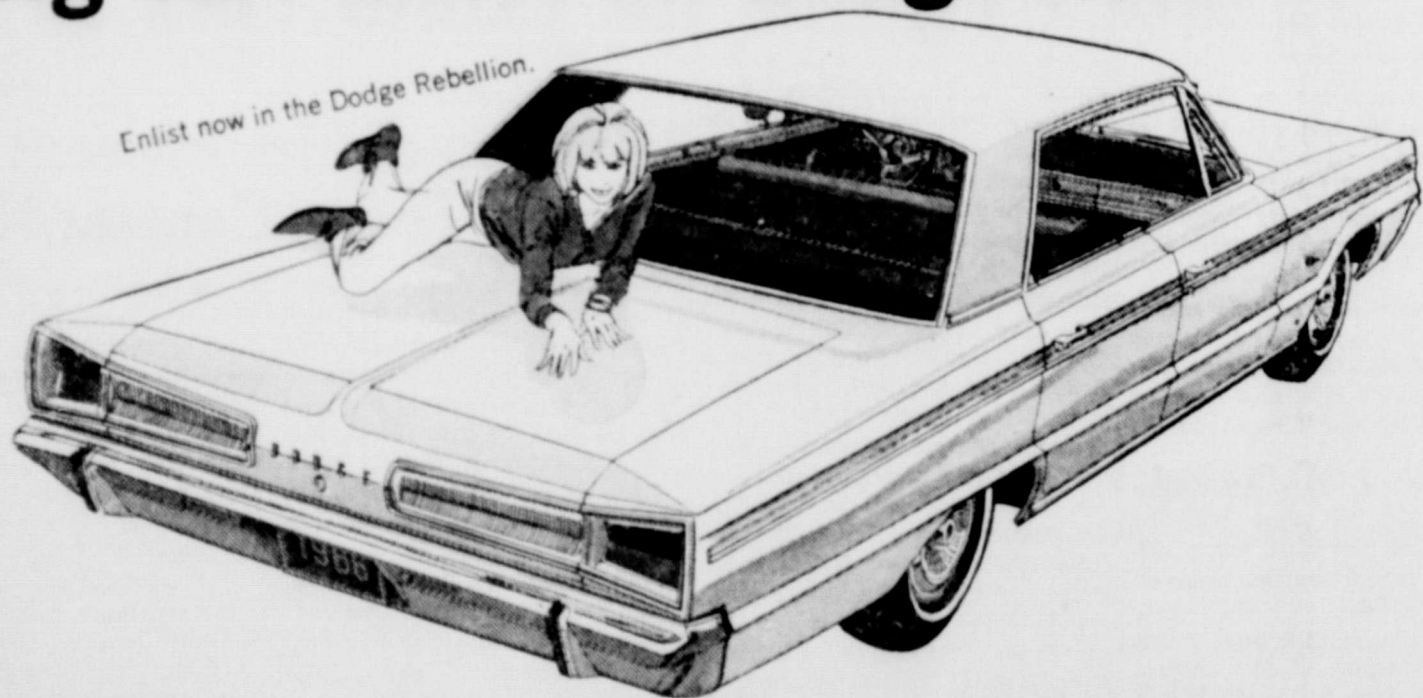

A good rain fell here Monday morning, the first for this area in a good while. It is fine for the grain fields and pastures, but not so good on some of the peanuts.

Our community was made sad and shocked to hear of the sudden death of Mrs. Lamoyne Head, 55. She passed away rather suddenly Friday afternoon. 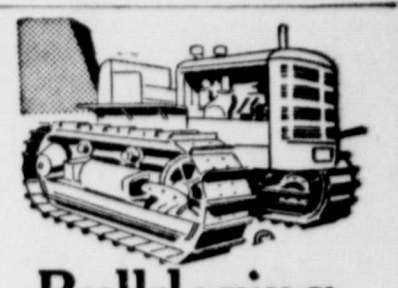

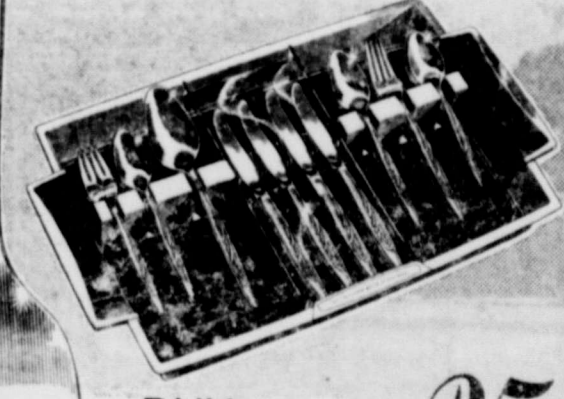

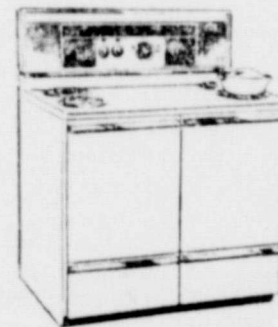

the equipment needed for hunting and handling your deer kill. Important items include a sharp hunting knife, some strong cord or a small rope, enough cheese cloth or canvas to wrap the carcass in camp and a box of salt if you want to keep the hide or cape for mounting.

The deer should be dressed immediately after the kill. Prop the deer on its back placing large rocks or logs beside each shoulder and each hip. Remove external sex organs with your knife.

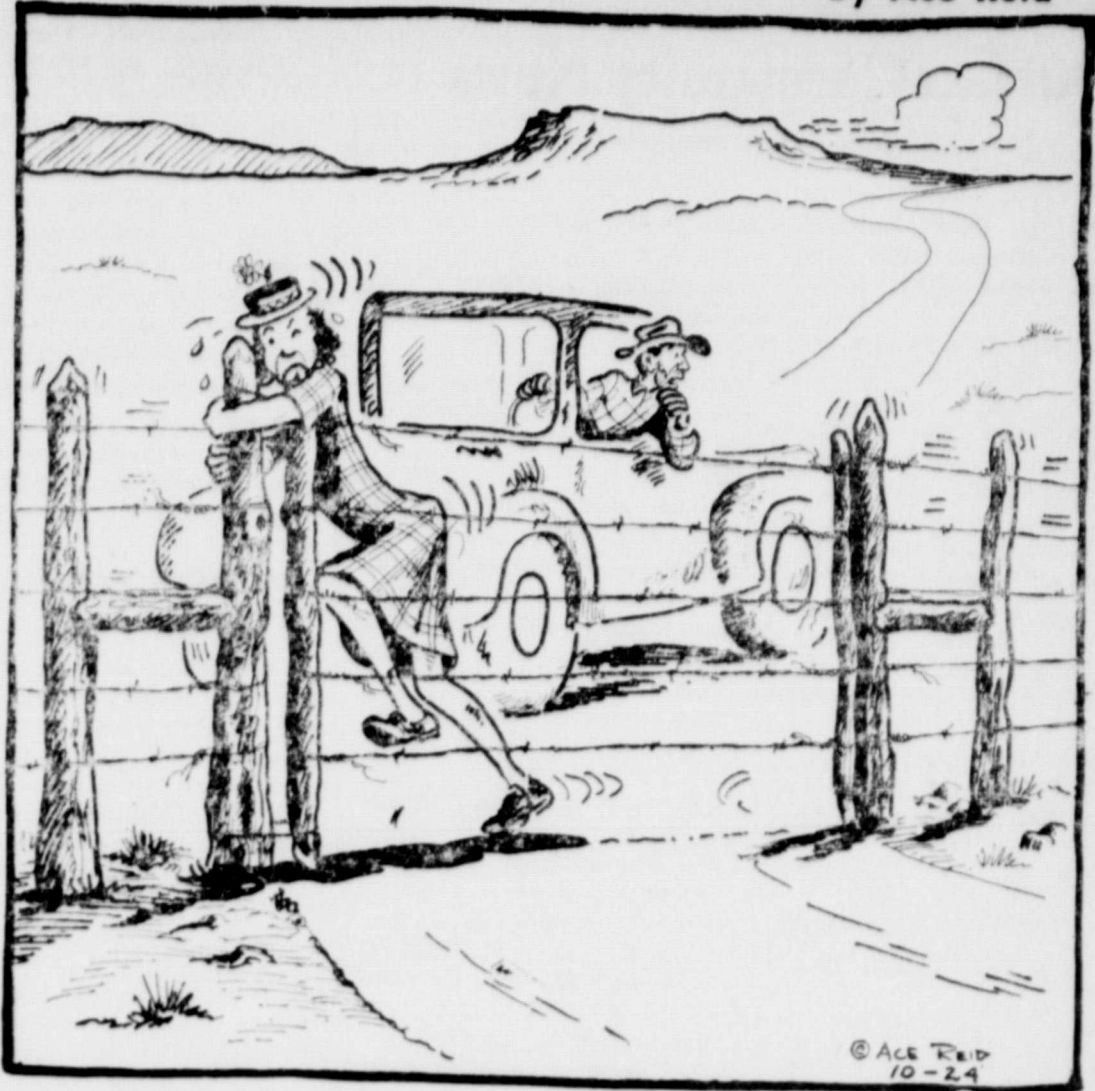
Beginning between the hind legs cut down to the pelvic bone. Then turn the knife blade up and cut up through the breastbone and up the neck as far as possible.

Now, grasp the windpipe and esophagus with both hands and pull down. The insides will come free down to the midsection. Remove the stones from under the deer and roll the carcass on its side. Cut the thin layer of muscle that holds the entrails to the ribs, on each side of the deer. Cut around the vent so the entire visceral mass can be removed without severing any part.

Using both hands, pull the entrails from the deer. To cut the pelvic, place knife against the middle of the pelvic bone to locate the

Through these agreements the cost-sharing assistance available under the program and other resources of the group—such as labor and resources may be combined in working toward the mutual goal.

basis. The County Committee has obtained commitments for more ACP funds. Producers who desire to carry out conservation practices should make application at once. Funds which will be available will be 1965 funds.

Farmers Asked to Send in Social Security Numbers

Here's an important message addressed to all producers who receive payments in connection with participation in ASCS programs. That includes the Agricultural Conservation Program, price-support loans, the feed grain and wheat diversion programs, the wool incentive payment program, and others administered by the ASCS County office.

Each of these farmers is being asked to let the County Office know what his Social Security number is, and such a request has been mailed to each known producer. The number is required by the Internal Revenue Code for identification purposes. It will appear on payment drafts, beginning next year and it will be used in reporting such payments to the Internal Revenue Service. Such identifying numbers are already being used in payment reports which banks and other paying agencies make to Internal Revenue.

If you want more information about this matter, you are asked to take it up with the people at the ASCS County office.

WASHINGTON

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—Who could be naive enough to suppose that Castro agrees to let certain Cubans come to the United States out of the goodness of his heart. Can anyone think he is making this move for the sake of the refugees; that he is doing this for the sake of uniting broken families? He is not known for his humanitarianism.

Obviously it is a propaganda move, and it looks as if we are falling for it.

This matter of refugees is swelling the immigration into this Country far beyond its legal limits. It is highly doubtful that there is Governmental authority for the admission of Cuban refugees, and less for the admission of the hordes of Hungarian refugees which came into this Country in 1957. The same is true of other so-called refugees from all over the world. Of course we all sympathize with the plight of Cubans who find themselves in Castro's Communist trap, but it is no lack of sympathy not to open our doors to a flood of people about whom we know nothing, and which is highly wrought with danger.

As yet, there is no arrangement to determine who these people are or why they are coming. There are already 270,000 of them, and

estimates now indicate that 45,000 more will be on their way. They will be those whom Castro chooses and not according to our own judgment. Castro either forces us to negotiate with him, which we have refused to do in all other matters, or else he calls the tune involving our own policy.

While our attention is focused on the racial situation in this Country and the incidents related thereto, seemingly no one is quite willing to point out the fact that organized crime in this Country is not perpetrated by the negro race, but rather by predominantly foreign elements. The negroes in this Country are not organized in the dope racket, white slavery, organized extortion and gambling. There are few incidents—very few—of negroes having been involved in subversive activities against our Government. And not the least is the pressure politics of the large city ethnic groups which are able to wield a total and a combined power.

Castro got us in a box when he offered to trade prisoners for machinery. We agreed to this deal which makes it appear we are willing to trade in flesh, but not in anything else.

Already it is requiring sizeable

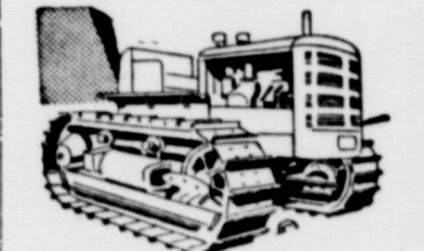
sums of money to care for the refugees already here, and the present prospects, there is no estimate as to what the eventual cost may be.

Many of the Cubans already here are said to be those not "suitable" for ordinary work available in this Country. It has been suggested that they be moved to agricultural areas to help harvest crops, but on inquiry the reply is that they are familiar with this type of work and therefore, not qualified. It is felt that work for which they are qualified will displace American labor and other employment.

Under the new liberalized immigration bill, approximately 600 persons per year will be admitted but this is only a part of the total. Under various gimmicks a greater number will be admitted as has been the case in the past. It is not a matter of being a foreigner, not a matter of not having compassion for fellow beings, but a matter of our own national interest that great caution should be applied before opening our doors to people about whom we know nothing as individuals.

As in the case of the Cuban refugees, what do we do with them if they are found to be dangerous if they are of the criminal element or sent as Castro's stooges? Can we put them in jail or send them to a concentration camp and let them indefinitely? They can be deported unless Castro should be willing to take them back. It is likely he would take them back if he permitted them to come the first place.

It is only common sense to assure ourselves that these people are any others admitted to this Country will assimilate economically, culturally, politically and otherwise.



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
