Precinct 3 Commissioner Fred Rainwater, in a cooperative effort with the City of Hico, this week purchased an 82-ft. steel bridge span which will be moved and erected over the Bosque River replacing the bridge that collapsed in mid-August.

The structure was purchased from a Fort Worth Precinct, and is located on the old Fort Worth Highway on the Clear Fork of the Trinity River.

Mr. Rainwater said that no estimate of time could be given for moving the all-steel bridge, as additional pier holes would have to be dug before moving could get underway.


### 3 of 10 Amendments Defeated in Hico Box

Gov., etc. was also defeated; and Amendment No. 10, to establish a four-year term of office for members of the Legislature, also lost.

Harper, the Walter Whitson, C. H. Richards and Henry J Davis homes were damaged by wind and hail. We well remember this storm and have pictures of the Richards home ( former home of the Roy Blakleys, which was carried over a nearby field and brought back and set down near its former location. One room was demolished. Mrs. Richards and one of the children were in the house and were dropped out in the field when they were sucked out at the open end of the house where the room was torn away. E. M. Hoover was at the place for some cotton seed and got to a large live oak tree and lay flat on the ground and held around the tree until the storm had subsided. This old tree and killed grown hens by the dozens with many other freak occurances. We wish we had the names, of parties whom we got in those pictures as some had their backs turned to camera. 




