Hico Contests Meridian Friday Night

Hico and Meridian will hook up Friday night in a grid battle which will determine the lead in the district chase, and a real game is expected from the two old rivals. Game will be played at Meridian, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Hico will carry a 4-3-1 season record into the game, while the Jack-ets are 5-2 for the year. Meridian holds wins over Glen Rose, Whitney, Joshua, China Springs and Lake Dallas, and have lost to Centex powers Clifton and Crawford.

The Tigers own wins over Stephenville and Comanche B teams, Blanket and Evant. They have lost to Lometa, Godley and Boyd, and the tie was with Gorman.

This will be the last meeting of the two teams for at least two years, as Hico moves to another district, and Meridian advances to Class A competition.

Hico Coaches Robert Lee and Jack Barnett said this week that the Tigers would be at near full strength for the contest, and they are expecting a good effort from the squad.

A large crowd of local fans is expected to follow the Tigers to Meridian.

Martin's Gap Monument to be Dedicated

Dedication and unveiling ceremonies will be held Sunday afternoon, Nov. 7 at 2 o'clock at the Martin Monument at Fairy.

Frank Hanes, former school superintendent at Fairy, will serve as master of ceremonies.

H. B. Gordon of Hamilton is speaker at the service.

Brents Witty of Hamilton, president of the County Historical Association will also be present.

The marker is dedicated to Mr. Martin, who was killed by Indians in the 1860's, and who is buried near the site of the monu-

ment. The community was known as Martin's Gap until the birth of Little Fairy Fort, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Fort. The name was changed to Fairy in honor of the little lady whose height reached more than 3 feet.

Country Club Gets Final Approval

Loan application for Bluebonnet Country Club, Inc., was approved this week, and with only a few minor details standing in the way, construction of the facilities should be started within a three to four week period, according to George Krupala, County Farmers Home Administration office manager.

Final approval was given Tuesday when money was made available to the State FHA office at Temple for the project.

According to Krupala, next step before construction may start hinges on the time taken by the engineering firm in advertising for bids on various phases of the work. Bids should be let within three weeks time.

The program calls for renovation of the present club house, building a swimming pool, a caretaker's house, construction of a nine-hole grass green golf course, and other minor additions.

New Bridge Purchased For Bosque

Precinct 3 Commissioner Fred Rainwater, in a cooperative effort with the City of Hico, this week purchased an 82-ft. steel bridge span which will be moved and erected over the Bosque River replacing the bridge that collapsed in mid-August.

The structure was purchased from a Fort Worth Precinct, and is located on the old Fort Worth Highway on the Clear Fork of the Trinity River.

Mr. Rainwater said that no estimate of time could be given for moving the all-steel bridge, as additional pier holes would have to be dug before moving could get underway.

The Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District's 25th Annual Report

FORWARD
This, the 25th (Silver Anniversary) Annual Report by the Board of Supervisors is published in order that all people in the District may be more fully informed about what is being done to conserve and improve our most valuable assets, our farms, ranches, and all other natural resources. All people, both urban and rural, depend on the land for food and fiber, the essentials of life. The manner in which the land and other natural resources are conserved and improved will determine the standard of living people will enjoy.

THE DISTRICT
More than 25 years ago, March 9, 1940, the landowners of Hamilton and Coryell Counties voted four to one in favor of creating the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District. Enthusiasm was high and things were developing fast. Only fifty-two days after the election the charter was signed and the District was in business. The District covers approximately 1,208,000 acres. The Board of Supervisors meets once a month, on second Tuesdays. An office is maintained in the District Headquarters building in Gatesville where a clerk is on duty at all times.

DISTRICT COOPERATORS
District cooperators constitute the corner stone and the very foundation of any Soil Conservation District. They are the people who apply conservation practices on the land for its protection and improvement. Every farmer and rancher who has a conservation plan on his land is a cooperator. He has a folder containing maps showing classifications and capabilities of all the different types of soils on his farm or ranch. In the folder is also recorded his decisions on just how he proposes to use various parts of his land including conservation practices he proposes to apply. The farmer or rancher is assisted in his planning by Soil Conservation technicians working with the District. There are two SCS offices in the District, one at Hamilton and one at Gatesville. Technicians in each of these offices can and do assist farmers and ranchers in developing conservation plans on their land. However, the final decisions on how the land will be used and the conservation applied are made strictly by the landowner.

CONSERVATION APPLIED TO THE LAND
This year farmers constructed 378,125 feet of conventional terraces, an increase of eight per cent over last year. Farmers constructed 77,830 feet of parallel terraces which was an increase of 158 percent. Parallel terraces reduce the number of point rows and makes cultivation of crops much easier. Farmers converted 6593 acres of cropland to grass land. This is 56 percent more than was converted last year. Good progress was made in all other phases of conservation such as range deferred grazing, range proper use, pond construction, cover crops, contour farming, crop residue use, and many other practices too numerous to list here.

DISTRICT ACKNOWLEDGEMENT
It was the cooperation of many people that made 1964-65 a good year in conservation. Technical assistance furnished by the Soil Conservation Service was excellent. ASCS managers, their staffs, and County and Community Committees have cooperated in every respect. Cost share through ACP, administered by ASCS, has been a major factor in getting conservation practices applied on the land. County Agents and Home Demonstration Agents have made major contributions toward District progress. The Farm Home Administration continues to cooperate in making loans to District cooperators needing funds for applying conservation practices. FHA's assistance through long term loans for the development of water supplies in rural communities continues. All Voc. Ag. Teachers and advisors have made invaluable contributions in the educational phase of the District. All newspapers in the District have been very cooperative in publishing conservation news. Some have carried excellent editorials on resources conservation. The radio station KCLW, with studios in Hamilton and Gatesville, has made

a major contribution to all people in the District, both urban and rural by carrying as a public service five programs weekly devoted to different phases of agriculture. Bankers, Merchants, Businessmen, Chambers of Commerce, Civic organizations and many others have cooperated in carrying out the District's program for the benefit of all the people in Hamilton and Coryell Counties.

The Supervisors deeply appreciate the cooperation and support of the people and will make an effort to conduct the affairs of the District for the benefit of all people.

PROGRAM AND WORK PLAN
When the District was organized in early 1940 participants in the organization, farmers, ranchers, and all agricultural agencies, cooperated in developing a Program and Work Plan. This Program and Work Plan was comprehensive and all inclusive. It served as a guide to operations for more than 20 years. However, changing conditions required the development of a new Program and Work Plan to meet the requirements of changing conditions and responsibilities. New techniques and improved procedures called for up-dated plans. The new Program and Work Plan was completed early in 1964 and an updated memorandum of understanding was signed with the USDA for technical assistance in carrying out conservation of all natural resources.

SOIL STEWARDSHIP
The Board of Supervisors recognizes that landowners are "Stewards of the Soil," holding it in trust for future generations. For this reason the Board sponsors a "Soil Stewardship Week" in the District every year. Pastors and Church leaders are encouraged to participate. Pastors and other church-minded people have cooperated wholeheartedly. Their response has been gratifying. Hundreds of church goers have sermons and see programs emphasizing man's responsibility for the protection and improvement of the soil. Soil Stewardship Week is observed nation-wide. The Board of Supervisors is deeply grateful for the enthusiastic participation of pastors and church leaders.

DISTRICT FARM EQUIPMENT
The District owns several pieces of farm equipment which is available to farmers and ranchers on a rental basis. The equipment consists of stalk shredders, grass drills, grass planters, and manure spreaders, and one grass sprigging machine. Custodians are Vocational Agriculture teachers at Carlton, Evant, Hamilton, Hico, Jonesboro, Pottsville and Oglesby. Other custodians are W. L. Graham, Harmon Community; Willie Turner, Fairy Community; H. A. Weiser, Copperas Cove; and the District office at Gatesville. Farmers are encouraged to use this equipment when they need it.

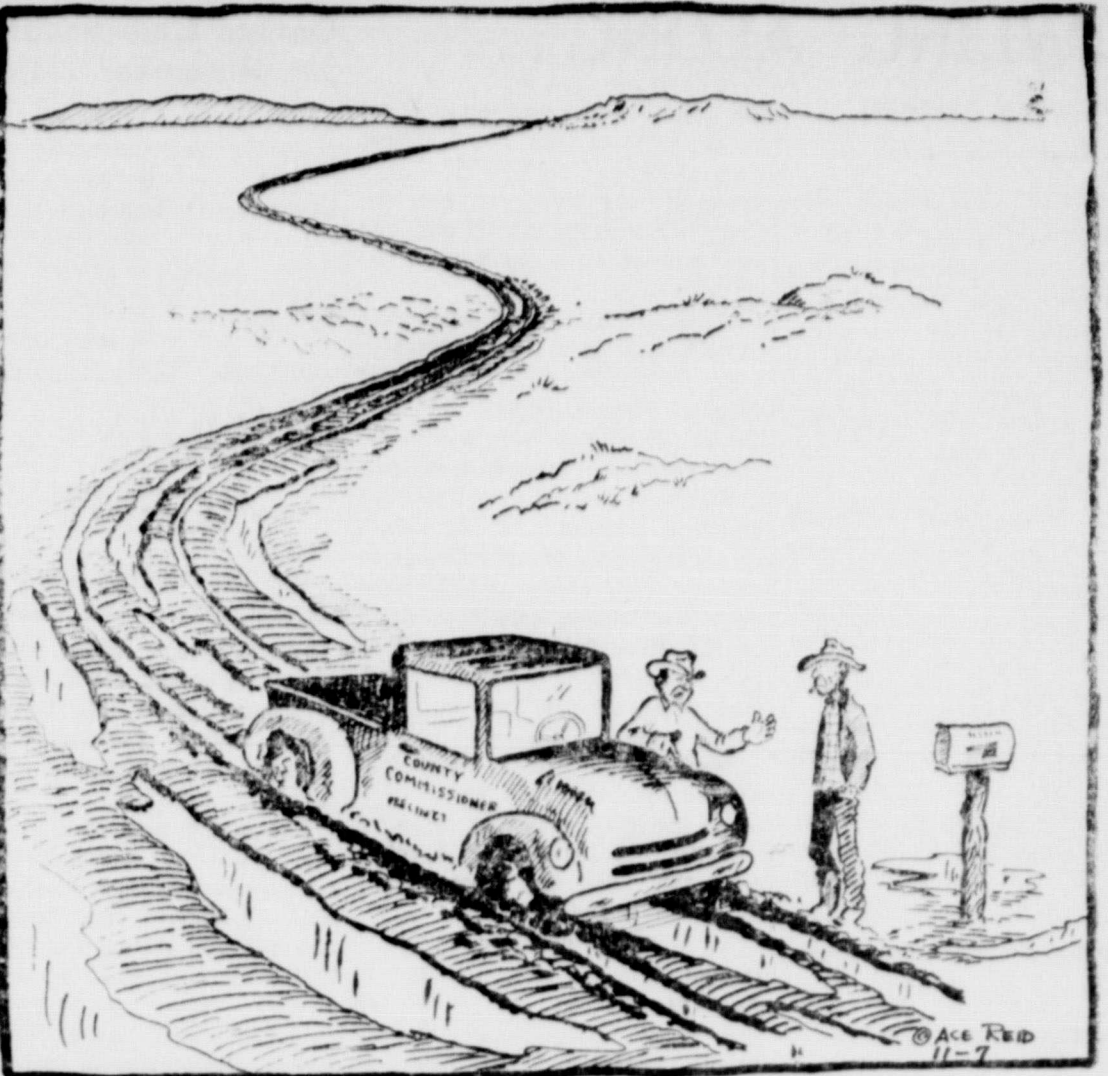

COUNTY AGENT

Several people have asked me when they should use PDB crystals to control peach tree borer. The PDB means paradichlorobenzene crystals. The crystals are also used to control moths.

This is the time of year to use the crystals to control peach borers. Trees should be treated before Nov. 15. Remove weeds and loosen and level soil about 1 foot from tree trunk. Place crystals in a narrow circular band, preferably in a groove about 2 inches from the trunk. Place several shovels of clean soil over the crystals and mound the earth into a cone-shaped pile about 6 inches high around the base of the tree. In placing the first few shovels of soil, avoid pushing any of the material against the tree, since crystals in contact with the tree cause injury. Compact the soil with the back of a shovel. Remove earth mounds in early spring. For two and 3 year old trees use half ounce of crystals; 4 to 5 year old, three-fourth ounce; mature trees, 1 ounce.

Peach tree borers can also be controlled by spraying the tree trunks with dieldrin in early June and mid-August.

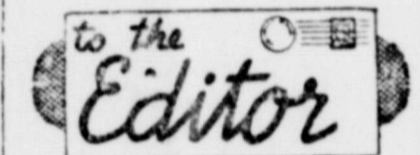

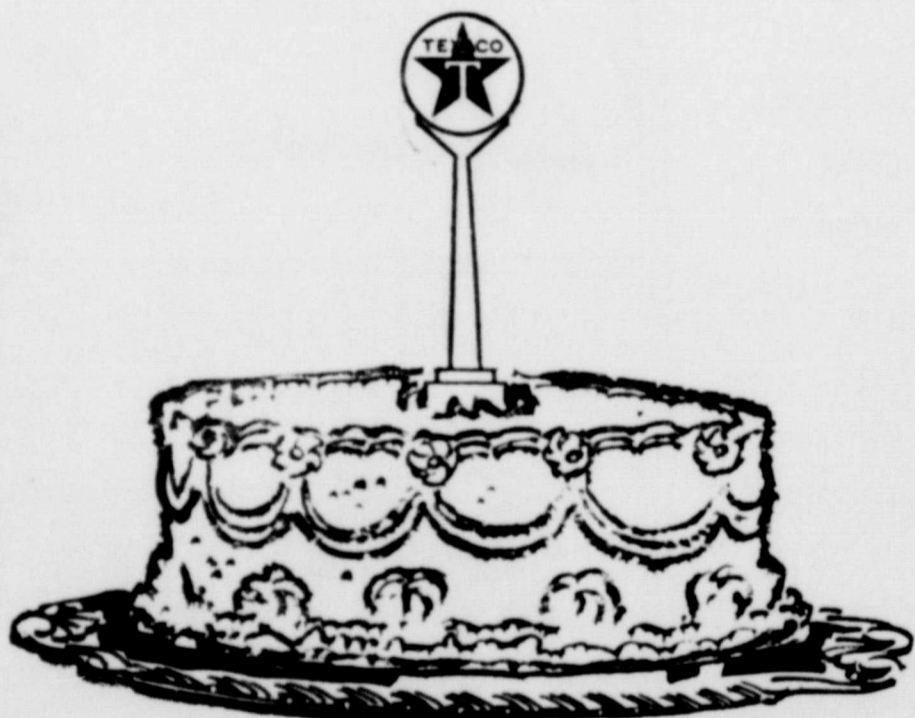
