unusual, to say the least, to have two incumbents seeking re-election to the same office in the same year, but that is exactly what is expected to happen in the 12th Senatorial District.

Senator Louis Crump of San Saba is seeking re-election this week, and Senator J. P. Word of Meridian is seeking to make it two incumbents in the race.

All came about after the legislature's re-districting last year, and in short, the new districts forced two capable men to run against each other.

Perhaps there was no other way to split up the districts without having two senators against each other, but deep down, we personally feel that Crump and Word were "whipping boys" in the move.

Both are highly regarded in their circles, but one of them is bound to lose his job. People must sympathize with Crump for having been placed as one of the largest districts in the state, when it would, in our opinion, have been better if everyone concerned if the district had been made one of the larger instead of larger of the re-mapped. As it is, the dates not only have to travel an area which encompasses 350,000 constituents, an impossible task within itself.

Later in the spring when the heat is bearing down hot, if a man with a political look introduces himself as Senator Crump or Senator Word, take a few minutes of time to hear his story. Being men such as they are, they appreciate your courtesies—they can't take up too much of your time. After all, they must not see 350,000 people just yourself during the course of election.

While on the subject of re-districting, Hico and Hamilton County is also in a new Senatorial District. The county was split from the 53rd to the 54th; Travis McClinton of Oglesby and J. E. Ward of Glen Rose. The 54th district is made up of Hamilton, Bosque, Somervell and San Saba counties, giving it a "city-county" look with Cleburne the lead-populous in the area.

The old 53rd district, which was composed of Hamilton, Erath and Bell counties, also got "city-county" with the addition of part of McClennan County.

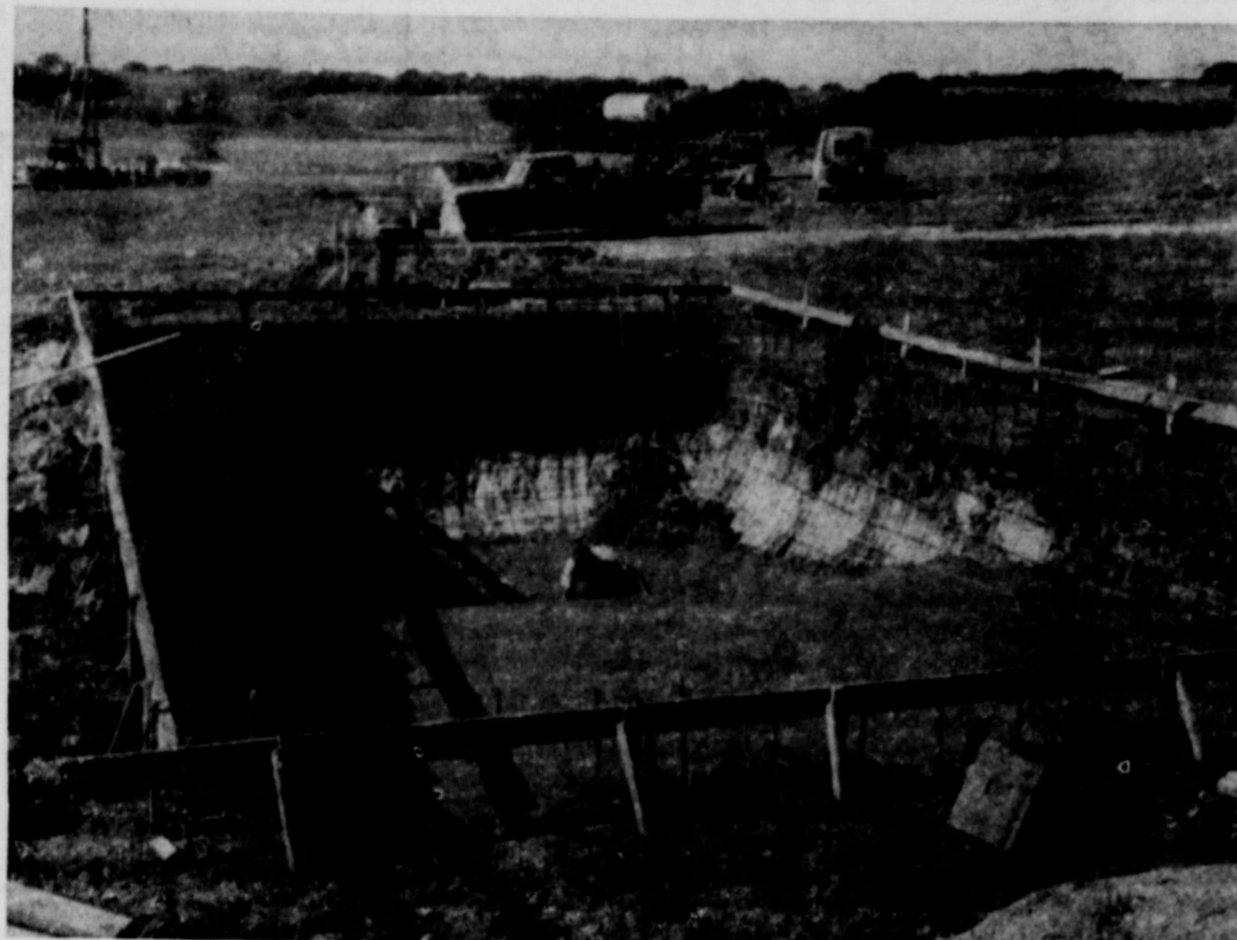
Crump said in part: "As a result of legislative re-districting, it is longer possible for me to be State Representative. SENATOR CRUMP

Louis Crump of San Saba is Candidate for Texas Senate

Senator Louis Crump of San Saba has announced his candidacy for re-election to the Texas State Senate. He has paid his filing fee for a place on the Democratic Primary ballot in the newly re-aligned 12th Senatorial District which now includes Hamilton County and 26 other counties.

"I am grateful for the experience gained in representing 15 counties of the new district in the Senate," Crump said, "and welcome the opportunity and responsibility to give the people of the enlarged district the effective and diligent representation they deserve and ask their support."

"My record of eight years in the Senate is one of consistent and firm support of the farmers, ranchers and small businessmen and their families," Crump said. "They can count on me to do my best in their interest for economical, efficient and responsive state government. To me, they are the backbone of this country."

The San Saba senator said he has visited each county in the new 12th District which encompasses 24,000 square miles with a population of more than 322,000 persons. The new district, re-apportioned by the last Legislature as result of the U.S. Supreme Court's "1 man, 1 vote" decision, consists of the following counties:

Congressman Omar Burleson Pleased With Re-Districting

Washington, D.C.—(Spl.) — The Federal Court has finally ruled on the proposed Congressional re-districting in Texas, and the new 17th District now includes 24 counties with a total population of approximately 376,000 people. The Congressman for the 17th District is Omar Burleson of Anson, who is about to begin his 20th year of service to the 17th District in the Congress.

In a statement prepared for the announcement, Congressman Burleson had this to say: "I am very

pleased to have the new counties which have been added to the 17th District, and to have been able to retain so many of the counties which have been a part of this fine district for many years. The geographical area is much larger, (larger in square miles than the combined area of the states of Delaware, Maryland and Connecticut), but I hope to be able to get around and get acquainted with the new people and renew old acquaintances in the new counties as quickly as possible. I have already been able to visit, at least briefly, in all of the new counties during the limited time left this fall following a rather lengthy session of the Congress. I want the people in the entire new 17th District to know that I feel it a great honor and privilege to be able to serve as your Representative in the Congress, and would be pleased to hear from each of you from time to time."

Congressman Burleson stated further, "The new counties which have been added to the old 17th District have many interests in common with the present District and I feel they will lend much to the creation of a fine new community of agricultural, livestock, oil and urban progress. I look forward to representing this district in the U.S. Congress and shall continue my best efforts in the interest of economy and good government."

Country Club Work In Full Swing This Week

Construction of facilities at Bluebonnet Country Club was in full swing this week, with various phases of work getting attention.

In progress was completion of the swimming pool, with only finishing touches to be added. Also underway was work on the 3-bedroom caretaker's lodge, drilling of the water well, and dirt work.

Contractors for the water well started last Thursday, and the well was nearing completion at mid-week.

Swimming pool contractors also started last Thursday, and most concrete work was completed by Saturday. Laying of tile and other finishing work was expected to be completed by the end of the week.

Contractor for the caretaker's quarters was on the job Monday of this week.

Dirt work has moved along at a rapid pace, with old golf greens bulldozed, some creeks filled, and other leveling work finished.

Actual construction of greens, digging of the reservoir, and laying the irrigation system is expected to begin shortly.

The project, planning for which started last February, calls for an expenditure of \$52,000 for all phases of work. The Corporation secured an FHA guaranteed loan for the amount, and all work is directly under the supervision of that government agency. First National Bank of Hico was lending agency.

At present the Corporation lists 67 members, and an aggressive drive for additional members is expected to get underway in the near future.

One Contest On in County Politics

Genevieve M. Clark of Hamilton this week filed for a place on the May 7 Democratic Primary ballot for county clerk.

Previously, Mrs. Vada Williams had announced her candidacy for re-election to the post.

This is Mrs. Clark's first venture into politics, and her announcement may be found elsewhere in this issue.

WEATHER IN 1965 RANGES FROM 10 TO 101 DEGREES

Hico area temperatures ranged from a low of 10 degrees to a high of 101 during 1965, according to W. R. Hampton, local weather observer.

The low reading was recorded on February 24.

Thirteen days during the year the temperature rose to the 100-degree or above mark. The temperature rose to 101 on one day in July and two days in August.

Most precipitation in any 24-hour period was 2.77 inches on May 15. Total precipitation for the year was 32.40 inches, or 0.60 inches above normal.

Forty-one days were recorded with temperatures below freezing.

Bank Assets At All-Time Record High

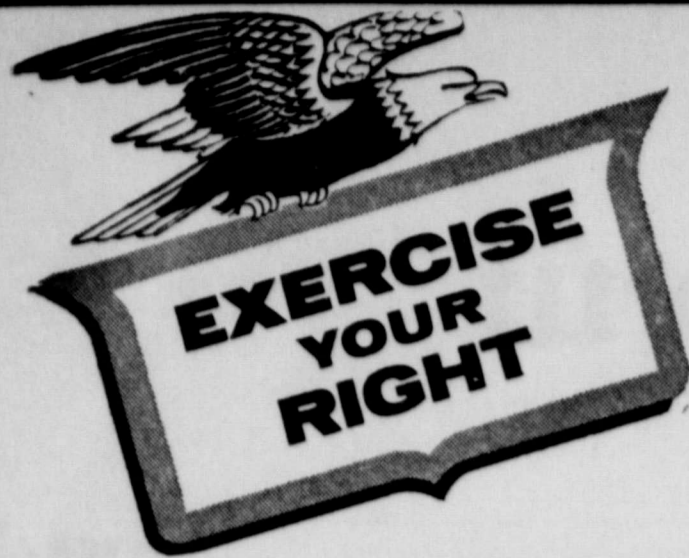

The helmet on her head is encircled with stars which indicate her heavenly origin and endless existence. The helmet is surmounted by a crest composed of an eagle's head and feathers, suggested by the costume of our American Indians. The medallion on the bodice bears the letters U.S.

The statue symbolizes the freedom all Americans hold so dear.

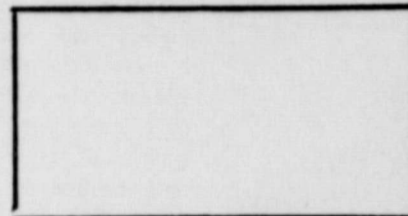

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

There have been several reports during the last few months of wolves and other predators killing livestock in the county. We may hear of several other such reports during the coming week. An official of the U.S. Wildlife and Fish Service told me this week that wolves will be drifting from place to place between now and March 1 since this is their mating season.

Fortunately, predators have not caused a great amount of damage in Hamilton County during the last few years. The damage has been controlled because a group of farmers and ranchers have cooperated with the government in hiring a professional trapper. All livestock owners in the county have received benefit from this program, but a relatively few have been paying the bill. About 50 men are members of the Wolf Club and contribute different amounts each year. The County Court also pays a portion of this cost.

You will find an announcement of Monday night's farmers income tax meeting at Carlton in this paper. Some farmers may not think they need information given at a tax meeting. This is not true. Even if you hire someone to figure your tax you still should know which expenses are deductible, and many other things before you turn your receipts over to the income tax agent.

Horehound is growing vigorously this time of year. Horehound is a noxious plant on sheep and goat ranches. The burs cling to wool and mohair—with the result of buyers paying a lower price for the product.

One of the most successful methods of control is repeated treatments using solutions of 2, 4-D or 2, 4-T applied with a hand gun or with a broadcast, boomless nozzle. Spraying should not be done when the day temperature is less than 40 degrees. A light frost will burn the terminal growth, but after a few warm days the plant will

Spraying needs to be done before the plants begin to mature seed. Several sprayings a year are necessary to keep horehound under control. Also, spraying will need to be continued for several years to keep the plant from maturing seed.

The chemical sprays react slowly during cool temperatures and some failures are possible. If poor kills result, re-treatment should be done when the plants are growing faster.
