### Small Communities Urged to Solve Their Own Problems

The problems of your community are not solved by you, they are solved by somebody—and the solution may or may not be the most pleasing to you," an annual development specialist from Hico Civic Club members today.

Sam F. Condon Jr., community development specialist with Power & Light Company, told members that so many communities have different ideas that "Our city has any problems which couldn't solve."

### SISTER OF LOCAL LADY DIES AT FORT WORTH

Mrs. Wasee Austin of Fort Worth, sister of Mrs. Jim Carmean of Hico, passed away early Wednesday. Services were pending at the time the message was received.

Four political races that command direct interest of local residents spice the ballot for the May 7 Democratic Primary election, following the Monday filing deadline.

Top drawing card in the election here is expected to be the race for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 3, where three candidates will be listed on the ballot. Candidates are incumbent P. W. Hamilton, Mrs. Lois Leeth, and Grover Renfro.

Two candidates are seeking the County Clerk's post with Mrs. Vada Williams asking for re-election, and Mrs. Genevieve Clark making her first race for a public office.

H. A. Leaverton, appointed only last week as County Attorney, is not contested for the unexpired term of that office, vacated by the resignation of John F. O'Neal.

The State Representative race drew two candidates, with Bob Elder of Alvarado and J. E. Ward of Glen Rose making active campaigns. Ward is incumbent.

In the State Senate race, Louis Crump of San Saba and J. P. Word of Meridian are both running for re-election in the enlarged 12th Senatorial District.

In other county elections, H. W. Standifer is unopposed for his first full term as County Judge; Mrs. Erma Maddox is also unopposed for a second term as District Clerk; as is Mrs. Shirley Freeman for her second term as County Treasurer.

Taking first things first, residents will go to the polls on Saturday, April 2, to elect two school trustees. Terms of Ralph Turner and E. V. Meador are expiring.

Following that election, people will vote Tuesday, April 5, in the annual City Election. Four seats are to be filled with terms of Mayor D. E. Bulloch and Aldermen Jim Jameson, G. M. Bullard, and W. C. Howard expiring.

## SCS Cites Need For Good Waterways

In the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Water Conservation District there are many natural or constructed waterways shaped and established to suitable vegetation as needed for safe disposal of runoff from a field.

field, diversion terrace, or other structures.

The purpose of a grassed waterway is to provide a safe disposal of excess water from terraces, diversions or from natural concentrations of water thus preventing damage by erosion or flooding.

Terraces and diversions often do not have a safe outlet in which to dispose excess water; therefore a grassed waterway may be used to safely carry the water from these structures.

An important fact to remember is to get the waterway established to grass before the terraces or diversions are constructed. If water is permitted to enter the waterway before the waterway is grassed, the concentration of water may cause gullies.

The Soil Conservation Service recommends that a waterway be shaped and closed at the top so that upstream water will run on the outside of the waterway. The area outside the waterway can be drilled to small grain during the cool season, or sudan or some other warm season crop during the summer. Inside the waterway common or coastal bermuda grass can be planted and protected from erosion while the grass is being established.

The width of a waterway depends on many factors such as the number of acres in the drainage area, the slope of the land, the type of soil, the type and amount of grass

cover in the drainage area, and the type of grass established in the waterway.

There are several species of grass that the SCS recommends to establish in waterways. They are primarily King Ranch Bluestem, Common and Coastal bermuda grass. These grasses are perennial and can carry a higher velocity of water than annual grasses. The seeding or sprigging rate

for grasses used in waterways is twice the regular rate. This helps to get a fast cover and prevents erosion.

Management of grasses in waterways is of key importance. Manage it so as to maintain a sufficient grass cover at all times. Fertilizer should be added according to a soil analysis and weeds should be controlled.

#### Texans Will Ballot on 16 Constitutional Amendments in 1966

Texans will have a heavier general election ballot next November than usual with the appearance of 16 proposed Constitutional Amendments on the voting agenda.

In a public drawing in Austin, Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin of Hillsboro drew numbers from a hat to determine the sequence in which the amendments will appear on the November 8 ballot.

At the top of the ballot, getting the Number One designation, is the amendment "to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Other proposed amendments are less confusing in their text.

Some of the others, and their number on the ballot, are:

Abolishment of the poll tax (No. 7), allowing members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote. No. 14, and \$200,000,000 in water development bonds, number 11.

All together the proposed amendments contain about 14,300 words.

To help Texans understand the proposed amendments, they will be published in Texas newspapers beginning in August.

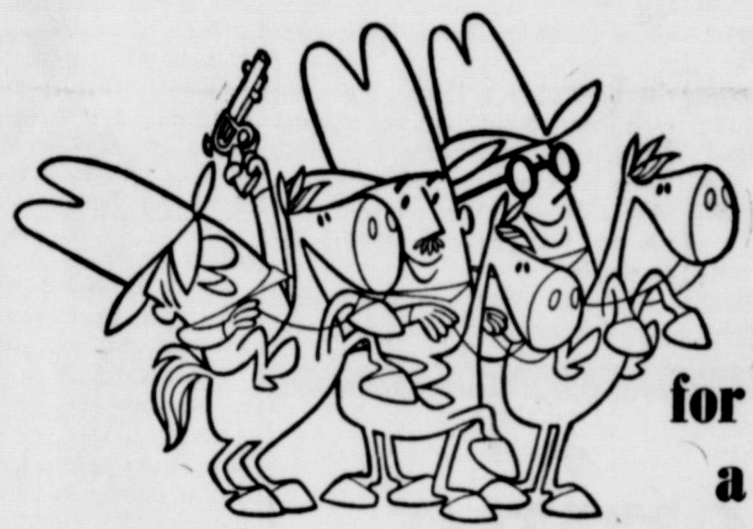

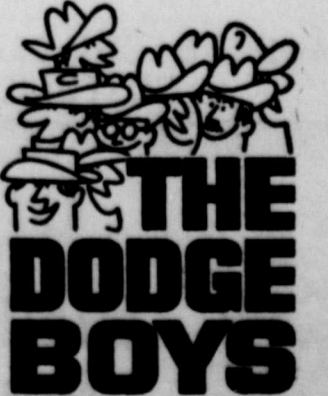

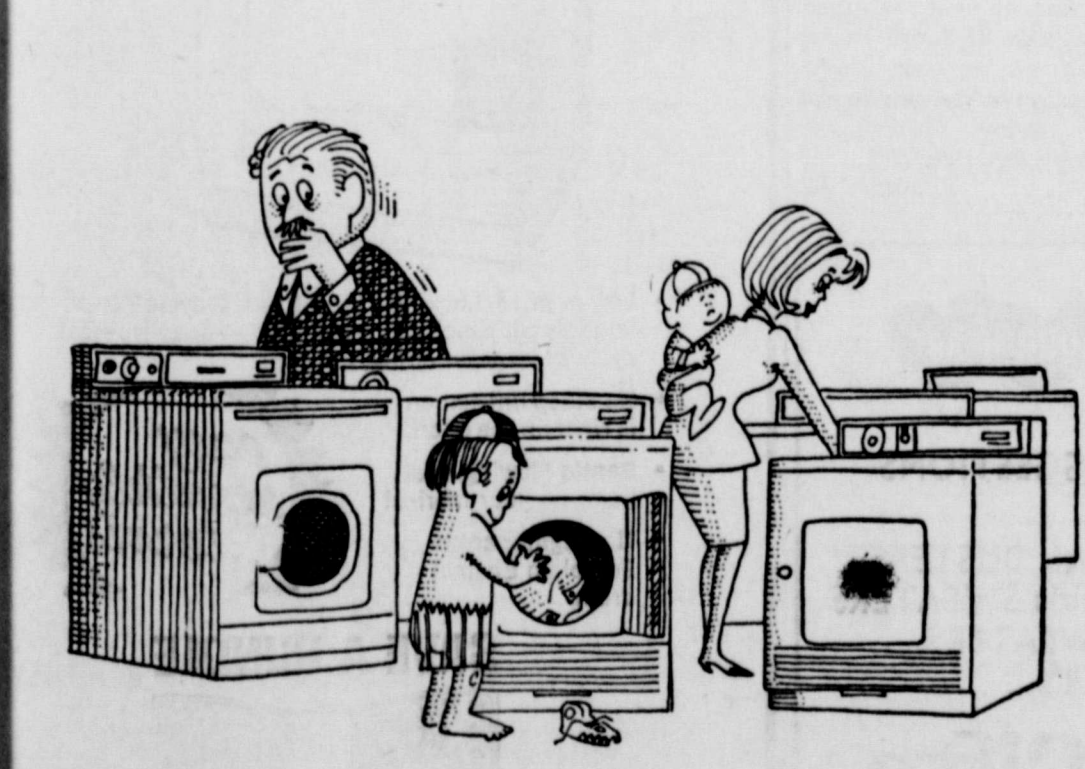

## On the Home Range

By SONDRRA KOONSEN

Home owners often become concerned about the loss of leaves from their favorite evergreens during the winter or early spring. In most instances, there's actually no cause for alarm.

As the old leaf matures and is no longer functioning due to shading or crowding by younger leaves, it will turn yellow or brown and drop off.

The live oak tree will lose all of its old leaves each spring as the new growth starts, and for a period of a week or two, will appear almost bare. The Southern Magnolia will shed many of its oldest leaves throughout the spring and early summer. As long as the new foliage is growing actively and free of diseases, there is no cause for alarm.

Most hollies also shed their leaves in the spring or early summer as the new foliage matures.

On most coniferous plants, the annual leaf or needle drop goes un-noticed because it occurs in the fall after the new foliage is mature. The needles yellow toward the center and usually drop in late fall or winter, and are obvious only when you notice the heavy cover of needles on the ground below the tree.

Unless there is an abnormal loss of leaves or there are noticeable spots or lesions on the fallen leaves there is usually little cause for

concern when the evergreen sheds a portion of its leaves.

The judging of swine will begin at 10 a.m. followed by goats, poultry, and sheep. At 1 p.m. beef cattle will be judged, followed by the dairy cattle. All livestock will be

on exhibit from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. 0 0 0

Any time between now and March 1 is an excellent time to top dress small grains with nitrogen. Because of the good growing season the small grain will need more nitrogen for grain production. Even if you applied fertilizer at planting time there will not be enough nitrogen left to help the grain yield. Usually one application of phosphorus at planting time is sufficient for the entire growing season.

The late winter application of nitrogen should be applied before stalling or tilling takes place because one of the effects of nitrogen is to increase the number of panicle bearing tillers. Top dressing nitrogen after tilling will increase vegetative growth and increase the protein content of grain

but will not produce maximum grain yields.

There are a number of suitable nitrogen topdressing materials including solids and solutions. All have given good results when recommended amounts are applied and due consideration given to chemical properties of the material used.

Because of the long grazing period in Hamilton County, special attention should be given to the rates of nitrogen to topdress. After cattle are removed from small grain fields an application of from 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen will result in increased grain yields. 0 0 0

How do Hamilton County soils rate in phosphorus, potassium, and organic matter? A recent summary of soil tests made by the Extension Service Laboratories is a good indicator. This summary includes

results for 51 samples tested between January 1962 and June 1964.

Seventy-eight percent of the samples were low or very low in phosphorus, 16 percent below, need applications of phosphorus fertilizers under management geared to high production. An adequate supply of available phosphorus is of special importance in early growth, and for seed formation.

The potassium status of samples showed the following: 2 percent very low, 2 percent low, 6 percent medium, 18 percent high and 73 percent very high. Sand soils are generally lower in potassium.

The organic matter content of soils reflect their nitrogen status. Samples tested showed 6 percent low and 94 percent medium or above. There is not an exact level of organic matter required to grow crops but organic matter improves the physical condition of clay soils and adds to the capacity of sandy soils to hold plant nutrients and

moisture in addition to supplying some nitrogen.

Maintenance of good residue management practices is essential for high production for Hamilton County soils.

The ranges in fertility levels of soils in Hamilton County varies over a wide range and conditions in each field should be considered in deciding how to fertilize. Soil tests provide the best guide to profitable fertilization. If you haven't had your soil tested visit with me at the court house to obtain information about soil test and learn the fertility status of your soils.
