Dates of the sale are Feb. 17-26. The 1966 Council goal is to sell a total of 60,000 boxes of cookies.

Hico Navy Chief Participating In 'Exercise High Time'

USS Albany CG-10 (FHTNC)—Chief Electronics Technician Maynard Marshall, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Marshall of Hico, is participating in "Exercise High Time" as a member of this command.

The three-phase exercise is being conducted in the Atlantic and Caribbean through February 18 to test combat efficiency and improve the anti-submarine, anti-air, mine and amphibious warfare techniques of some 50 units of the U.S. Second Fleet, the Atlantic Flt. Amphibious Force, and Atlantic Fleet Marine Force.

Phase one of the exercise started with the loading of Fleet Marine Force elements aboard ships of the amphibious force at Morehead City, N.C., for transportation to Vieques, P.R. Enroute to Vieques, the group held an exercise with a fast carrier task force and submarine units.

Phase two, scheduled to end Feb. 11, is a Marine gunnery exercise involving artillery, aircraft and naval gunfire. It began with the off-loading of Marines on Vieques Jan. 30.

Phase three of Exercise High Time will be conducted as the units return to their home ports. It will include anti-air and anti-submarine warfare drills and other tactical exercises.

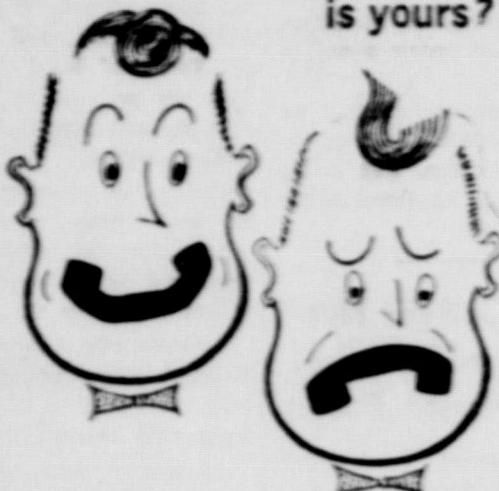

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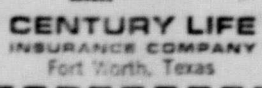

Cutting family food costs by skimping on milk is poor economy. Without enough milk, one can hardly provide meals that meet the family's calcium needs—and milk is also a good buy for high quality protein, the B-vitamins, riboflavin and other vitamins and minerals.

necessary for healthy growth. Save by comparing prices, checking to see if milk companies in your area offer discounts on large home deliveries, and pricing large containers, watching for specials on canned evaporated milk, and checking skim milk and non-fat milk prices.

Many people fail to realize the importance of getting a daily requirement of vitamin C. Vitamin C is a very necessary vitamin for the growth and well-being of young bodies as well as old. A moderate lack of vitamin C can cause stunted growth, restlessness and irritability in young children.

Other symptoms of vitamin C deficiencies which may be found in both children and adults are hemorrhages under the skin which are tiny burst blood vessels, stiffness and soreness of joint, swollen and bleeding gums and loose teeth. Sometimes hemorrhages under the skin show up among senior citizens who complain of poor appetites.

Since vitamin C is not stored by the body for future use, it should be included in the daily diet. Some vitamin C foods are oranges, grapefruit, tangerines, tomatoes, strawberries and bell peppers. Foods that contain lesser amounts of vitamin C are greens, cabbage, potatoes and sweet potatoes.

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WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C. — The ancient Chinese Calendar designates 1966 as the "Year of the Horse." It is too bad it could not be the "Year of Horse Sense."

It would have been horse sense had the North Vietnamese Communists been willing to engage in discussions following "Tet," the Chinese Lunar New Year, during a cessation of hostilities. But, unfortunately, the war, like that peculiar calendar, is made in Peking where any kind of sense appears to be sadly lacking.

Since there seems little hope for any sense to come out of Hanoi and Peking for settlement of their aggression in South Viet Nam, some common old horse sense is now called for on our side.

Every possible effort has been made to bring the situation to the conference table, even including

the submission of the matter to the United Nations—all to no avail. The bombing of North Viet Nam, recently resumed, is even more limited than before it was stopped at Christmas.

From pure old common sense, it seems there are a number of things to do towards winning this conflict. Aside from hitting targets in North Viet Nam, previously ruled out of bounds, such as oil storage depots, a large steel plant near Hanoi, and steam-generating plants we could effectively mine the coastal waters of that country. This would represent a "peaceful" blockade of the principal port of Haiphong, and lesser ports receiving military supplies from other countries. It would not have to be such a blockade as was imposed on Cuba at the height of the missile crisis. Western and Communist nations alike which trade with North Viet Nam could be warned that such was being done and that they would go into these ports at their own risk. It would cut Hanoi's line of supply, including oil necessary to their war-making operation. Considerable shipments other than petroleum products could be furnished from Red China, but it would

have to be done over one principal railroad, which could be destroyed faster than it could be rebuilt. Oil must be furnished by the Soviets from other sources along the Black Sea through the Suez Canal. China is short on oil itself and, therefore, not a dependable supply for Communist North Viet Nam.

The mining of the harbors in this area may have a thin standing in international maritime law, but there is no considerable amount of evidence that the Communists anywhere are particularly respectful of international obligations. Some may say that two wrongs never make a right, but there is also no obligation to be the victim of those violating law.

To mine the North Vietnamese harbors and to bomb vital installations necessary to cut Communist ability to wage offensives against South Viet Nam, would be a new and powerful evidence of the depth of the United States determination to stop Communist aggression.

There is, of course, reason to be concerned as to the reaction of the Soviet Union and Communist China. There is no question but that the Russians would face a dilemma. Thus far, this has been a major consideration on the part of our policy makers. Should Moscow accept this limitation on its assistance to an ally, her prestige would be damaged in the Communist world in rivalry with Peking. If she challenged the U.S., it would risk direct involvement and possible war.

Somewhere down that road we must come to hard grips with this question. Able strategists agree that to win in South Viet Nam, to stop Communist aggression here and discourage it elsewhere in the world, will require us to deal with supplies reaching North Viet Nam. Otherwise, the war will have to be fought in the jungles and the rice paddies with inestimable losses in American lives and with the outcome always in question.

The peaceful blockade may be essential, whatever the risk.

FFA in Texas Explained During Special Week

The Future Farmers of America organization is in its 37th year in Texas. There are 48,382 members studying vocational agriculture in 864 high schools in Texas. In these agriculture classes students are provided an opportunity to secure technical and scientific training in agriculture as well as to receive training in leadership, citizenship and cooperation.

Texas membership has grown

from 28,643 in 1950 to 48,382 in 1965. The largest growth came this year, partly as a result of total school integration. In a recent study conducted by Mr. George Hurt, State Director of Vocational Agriculture, it was found that over 60 percent of the vocational agriculture students who graduated from high school last year and were available for employment are now in full-time farming or in agricultural related occupations. Over 40 percent of this number are in full-time farming.

The theme this year for FFA is "Agriculture is more than farming," and dit certainly is. It involves those who process and distribute many agricultural goods. Many people are employed in agricultural occupations such as engineers, scientist, management personnel, sales and service personnel and educators. Also there are over 60,000 desirable openings each year for farm operators, farm engineers and full-time hired farm labor.

Vocational Agriculture and the FFA are striving to provide sound and continuing education to help produce the leaders and work force so direly needed in the nation's agriculture industry.
