## Danger of Kite-Flying Reviewed By Local CPS Manager

Kite-flying can be fun, as all kids (and some grown-ups) know, but it also can be dangerous if basic safety rules are not observed.

An appeal to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires has been made by O. L. Davis, Community Public Service Company local manager.

"The windy season brings kite-flying time and this traditional activity is great sport, but youngsters are apt to forget that this innocent pastime can lead to grief if safety rules are not followed," Mr. Davis said.

"The most important rule is never to fly kites where there is a possibility of their getting tangled in electric wires."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite-flying include using metal string or wire for kite string, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite if it becomes entangled in electric wires.

"Locally we've had no mishaps in recent years, but every year over the nation there are many cases of injury to kite flyers," Mr. Davis said. "If kites are made right and flown safely, kite-flying is an enjoyable and wholesome sport."

To help convince kite flyers that safety rules are all-important, Community Public Service is providing posters for school bulletin boards.

## Congressman Burleson Presents Volume to Hico School Library

Congressman Omar Burleson announced this week that he is presenting to the Hico High School library a copy of the beautifully bound volume, "Compilation of Works of Art and Other Objects in the United States Capitol."

It contains illustrations and descriptions of the accumulation of the works of art in the United States Capitol. More than 400 illustrations, executed with great skill and craftsmanship, make this volume a potential treasure for art lovers and historians alike.

The work was prepared by the Architect of the Capitol under the direction of Congressman Burleson, as Chairman of the Joint Committee on the Library of Congress and also Chairman of the House Administration Committee. In presenting the compilation, Burleson said "This volume catalogs the works of art reposing in our best loved National shrine, the United States Capitol, and adds both luster and dimension to the rich heritage of America."

Copies of the impressive volume are available for public sale from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402, at \$4.50 per copy.

## Medicare Forms Available Here At Post Office

Postmaster Robert Jackson announced this week that application blanks for supplement Medicare benefits are available at the post office window here.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month and provides doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two-year delay if they do not sign up by March 31.

## Officials Hopeful of Good Weather For Stock Show

Hico Stock Show officials were keeping their fingers crossed at mid-week hoping that the spring weather would hold on until at least Friday, date of the 19th annual show.

Harold Walker FFA Chapter Advisor, sponsors of the show, said that if the weather didn't play tricks again this year, an all-time high record number of entries was expected. More than 225 animals from out of town had been entered

through Wednesday morning. People will recall that the past two years, weather conditions have been all but pleasant, yet near record number of entries were received both years. Last year, the temperature never rose higher than 25 degrees, and the year before, temperatures of around 30 degrees was high for the day, with a strong north wind blowing throughout the event.

Judging of events will get under-

way at 9 a.m., with the swine division going off first.

Goat division judging will follow at 10 o'clock, with sheep going into the ring at 11 a.m.

After a break for lunch, dairy cattle will be judged beginning at 1:30 p.m., with beef cattle to follow at 3 o'clock. Dogs will also be judged at 3.

Bill Oliver of the Animal Husbandry Department, Texas A and M University, will judge livestock, and Dr. Murray Brown, Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville will place dairy animals. Both have judged here before.

Trophies, sponsored by Hico Drug, J. B. Woodard, Community Public Service, Erath Electric Co. and Vernon Chew, will be awarded to junior exhibitors in each division for fitting and showmanship.

Most Hico businesses will close up shop from 2 p.m. until the final judging event, in order that employees may attend the show.

Hico FFA Chapter members will operate a concession stand on the show grounds throughout the day, and will serve a barbecue plate at noon. People are invited to eat lunch at City Park Friday.

## Former Hico Student Commended For Academic Achievement

Mr. O. C. Cook, superintendent of Hico Schools, recently received a letter from Mr. Allen J. Herndon, Assistant Dean of Arts and Science at Arlington State College, informing him that Don Jernigan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernell Jernigan, enrolled as a chemistry major at ASC, had earned a straight A record for the 1965-66 fall semester.

Mr. Herndon said "The total enrollment at Arlington State College for the fall semester was 11,849. Only 54 students in the entire school earned a straight A record. The very small percentage of students is considered to be a very special group on campus. They are highly regarded for their outstanding academic achievement. It has been my pleasure to write a personal letter of commendation to each of the persons."

"You and the members of your staff at Hico High School have every reason to be proud of this graduate. You can be sure that within his academic experience there was a teacher, or several teachers, who contributed to his preparation for a successful college career. We are mindful of the efforts of so many excellent public school teachers."

The student is required to be 14 years old before taking the written examination. The student must have 30 hours of classroom work before taking the written exam for a beginner's license. After getting the beginner's license, the student must then have 6 hours observation and 6 hours of driving with a licensed instructor in the front seat before he can take the driving test for a regular license. Cost of the course is \$30 per student.

William Thomas Rodgers passed away at Hico City Hospital Wednesday, March 9 at the age of 84.

He was born December 2, 1881 in Bastrop County, and was the son of the late William and Elizabeth Ward Rodgers. He was an early settler in the Olin community, and on December 25, 1905 he was married to Mattie Virginia Campbell. To his union two daughters were born, one of which passed away in 1915, and Mrs. Rodgers preceded her husband in death in 1949.

A retired carpenter, Mr. Rodgers had been a resident of Hico since 1929, and was a member of First Baptist Church.

Funeral services were conducted last Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock in First Baptist Church, with Rev. R. E. Tatum officiating. Burial was made in Hico Cemetery.

Nephews served as pallbearers. Mr. Rodgers is survived by one daughter, Miss Ruby Rodgers of Hico; four sisters, Mrs. Dula Stephens of San Antonio, Mrs. Annie Smith of Fort Worth, Mrs. Ola Kauffman of Monterey Park, Calif., and Mrs. Myrtle Andrews of Clovis, New Mexico; two brothers, David Rodgers of Clovis and Lonnie Rodgers of Fort Worth; also a host of nieces and nephews.

Farmers in Hamilton County are now buying their grain sorghum seed. I have talked to several farmers in the last few days who are trying to make a decision on the variety of seed to plant.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station recently released the results of grain sorghum hybrid yields at the various sub-stations in 1965. The medium-late hybrids generally had the highest yield.

Test grown nearest Hamilton County were at Thrall, Temple and McGregor. Top yielders in those stations were NK 222, Horizon 61, top yielder year after year and seldom is the same hybrid the top yielder at more than one station.

Other hybrid grain sorghum that have performed well over the past three years include DeKalb C-44b, RS 626 and TE Grainmaster.

Factors to consider other than yield when selecting a hybrid grain sorghum are resistance to heat smut, resistance to lodging, and how rapidly the head dries.

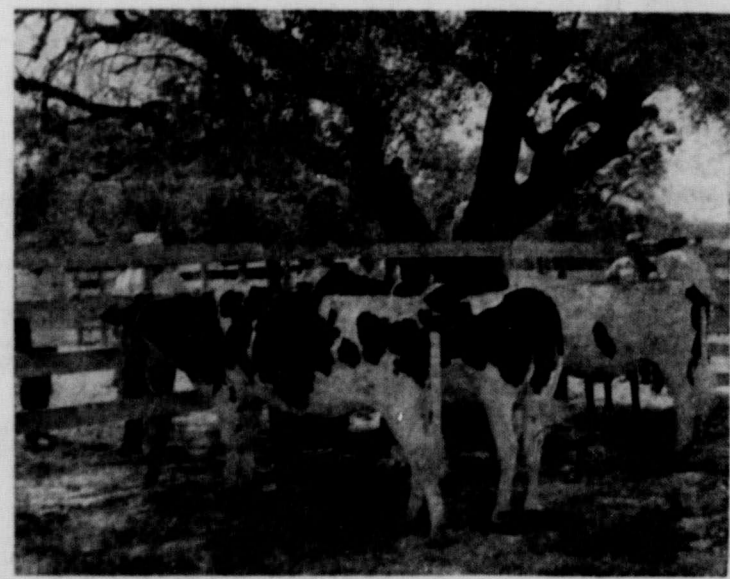

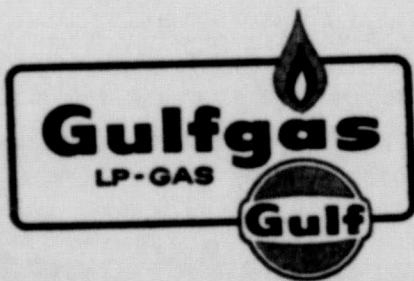
