The day's activities will begin at 10:30 a.m. with family activities which will include barrel racing, pole bending, rescue race, egg race, sack race, etc.


At noon a barbecue lunch will be served at \$1.25 a plate. The barbecue may also be bought to go. That afternoon at 4 o'clock, cut-
