Somewhere near 19 milion persons who are 65 years old and more will become eligible for medicare on this date. What will it mean to them? We don't know.

Perhaps it will not mean too much at the beginning. "Why not?" you ask? Well, in the first place we suspect that the job is going to be too big because there are not enough doctors, nurses, beds, and other needed facilities to accomodate all who will need and will apply for medical and surgical services at the beginning of the services. Of course eventually all of these can and will be worked out if the services get the prospective patient's cooperation.

What we mean by the prospective patients' cooperation is that if you are eligible for service but that you are not in a state of emergency wait until the fellow who is in a critical condition get needs attended to, and then you can get your needs attended to. It would be better for you and everyone else concerned. In other words, wait gracefully and get better services.

Our local situation is already in a state of crisis and by all means available to us, we should do all that we can to prevent what could be a bad, bad situation right here at home. Remember, doctors and nurses are like you and I-they can do only so much and no more in a given time. If you can give them time, they will make the goal. They must get our cooperation.
