80th Homecoming Set To Begin Wednesday

Visitors From Far and Near Expected During 4-Day Run

Hico's Annual Old Settlers Reunion—this one the 80th—is all set to get underway Wednesday, July 27, with the traditional street parade kicking off the four-day celebration.

As a preliminary event to the Reunion, Manager Ray Keller has made arrangements for a big street dance to be held on Tuesday night, July 26, beginning at 8 p.m. The dance will be held on lower Main Street, and a lively band will furnish music.

All phases of programming have been completed, according to Keller, and most other details for kicking off the celebration have been taken care of.

The parade, scheduled at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, will form one street east of main, near the Rainwater residence. After formation, the parade entries will proceed down Main to Railroad Street, and back up Main to the Church of Christ, then west and turn in front of Hico Nursing Home. It will disband at the railroad.

Parade committee members Mrs. Fred Rainwater, Louise Blair and Billy Doty announced a prize list last week, totalling \$145.00 in cash, which should be sufficient to insure a large number of entries. The prize list includes:

Following the parade, first night activities will get underway at 8 p.m. at City Park. Booked to furnish opening night entertainment is

Fred Noland and the Westerners from Stephenville, who excel in both modern and western music. Noland is a former Hicoan, and the group comes here highly recommended.

Thursday Night

By popular request, Keller is returning "The Continentals" for the Thursday night program. The group of Fort Worth youngsters played here last year, and were highly praised, especially by the young people.

Friday Night

Friday night, a full evening of entertainment is assured when the ever-popular Miss Reunion Contest will be held. Twenty-nine contestants are entered in two divisions, eleven in the senior classification and 18 in the junior division. Miss Sandy Hickey of Dublin won the senior title last year, and Miss Linda Bruner copped the junior crown. Photographs of all contestants may be found in the second section of this issue.

Saturday Night

It wouldn't be a Reunion without the traditional Old Fiddlers contest, and this year is no exception. Keller expects a large number of fiddlers from the state. Eddie Rose of San Antonio has won the top prize for three consecutive years, and he is expected to be back to defend his title. The contest drew 13 entries last year, and Keller is expecting even more this year.

New Parking Facilities

With the new access road to City Park, parking facilities are expected to be adequate to handle the huge crowds. Keller and CPS personnel Ollie Davis and Frankie Williams were busy this week stringing lights in the parking area on this side of the river, and along the walkway to the park. People will not be allowed to drive their cars across the low-water crossing, but may park on the north side of the river and walk across. Those desiring to drive inside the park will have to take Highway 281 South to the Fairy road, and enter via that route.

Added Feature

An added feature during this year's celebration which is expected to swell the Saturday gathering is the "Mattie Segrest Day" which has been arranged to honor the long-time educator. A reception will be held at Bluebonnet Country Club from 2 until 4 p.m. that day.

All in all, the celebration shapes up as another successful run, with many, many people returning to the heart, and meet and greet old friends.

... Civic Leader Succumbs

Final Rites Held Thursday For Odis Petsick, Bank President

Odis Petsick, president of Hico National Bank, passed away Tuesday afternoon at 1:50 in Harland Hospital at Fort Worth where he had been confined since mid-morning Monday.

Mr. Petsick suffered a stroke Sunday afternoon, was hospitalized here Sunday night, and when his condition worsened early Monday, he was rushed by ambulance to the Fort Worth hospital.

Funeral services for the civic leader were held at 10:30 Thursday morning in First Methodist Church, Rev. Hubert Taylor, pastor, and Rev. R. E. Tatum, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Petsick was born in Hamilton County, and had been a resident of Hico since June of 1911, moving here from Gustine. He was the son of the late John Petsick and Winnie Ellis Stewart.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Corrine Petsick of Hico; a daughter, Mrs. Floyd Drake of Fort Worth; a grandson, Danny Drake of Fort Worth; four sisters, Mrs. H. L. Turney of Albuquerque, New Mex., Mrs. W. Nunn of Fort Worth, Mrs. Morris Couch of Stephenville, and Mrs. L. R. Rudd of Goldthwaite; two brothers, Otho Petsick and Otho Petsick of Gatesville, James Petsick of Comanche, and Wade Petsick of Fort Worth.

Co-bearers were Cleveland Williams of Gustine, Morse Ross of Howard, Ellis Randals, M. I. Hudson, E. V. Meador, D. E. Bullock, and J. B. Woodard, all of Hico.

Named Bank Cashier in 1947. Mr. Petsick came to Hico in 1911, and was named cashier of the First National on July 11 of that year. On January 13, 1948, directors named him president of the local bank, succeeding C. L. Woodward, who retired from active business at that time. In the same meeting, Ellis Randals Jr., was named cashier of the bank. Prior to coming to Hico, Mr. Petsick was associated with banks at Brownwood and Gustine for

several years.

Civic Leader.

Active in all civic affairs of Hico, Mr. Petsick had served on the board of directors of Hico Civic Club, the Lions Club, and Chamber of Commerce.

He was also active in political circles, and for the past several years has been a delegate to State Democratic Conventions. He was to attend the state convention this year as a delegate from Hamilton County.

In other local affairs, Mr. Petsick was a leader in every movement that might benefit Hico and this area.

He served as president of Bluebonnet Country Club before its reorganization, and at present time was a member of the board of directors of the present club, and was serving as greens committee chairman. He was instrumental in securing the recreational facility for this area, working many hours on the project and offering encouragement to others working on the project. He had also served as a director in Texas Country Club at Stephenville.

Conservation Leader.

Mr. Petsick was perhaps the most able leader of good farm and ranch conservation practices in this area, and in 1951 his services were recognized when he was named as recipient of an award from Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District as the business or professional man rendering the most service to the district. His interest in the work of soil and water conservation was backed by loans to farmers and ranchers to carry out programs that otherwise might not have been accomplished.

In 1955, Mr. Petsick was named a charter director in the Upper Bosque Water Control and Flood Prevention District and had been elected to successive terms on the board.

Mr. Petsick also served on the Brazos River Water Authority, being appointed to the board in the early 1950's by former Governor Allan Shivers.

A strong conservationist, Mr. Petsick was a leader in re-

organization of the Hico FFA Livestock Show, and was instrumental in its promotion until it became one of the top events in this section of the state. He has served many years in an advisory capacity to the show and its leaders, and was recognized for his work by being named an honorary member of the local FFA Chapter.

Thus brings to a close the career of a man who has been responsible for much of the progress of Hico and this area, and who will be greatly missed for his ability, his leadership, and his guidance.

Iredell Man Married Recently at Saint Jo



COUNTY AGENT

We had a real large group to go on the farm tour last Saturday. We were able to add a few interesting stops that we had not planned to include. At one stop we saw cotton fertilizer tests. After looking at J. A. Edwards' good milo crop, W. P. Brummett allowed us to cut his fence and drive over to see his double row milo. Most people were very impressed with crops in that area.

We got to L. W. Little's on schedule and saw demonstrations given on brush control with equipment made by Hamilton Equipment Co. Mr. Little said he has cut about 50,000 mesquite trees on 500 acres during the past six years and less than one percent of the trees had regrowth. A real good barbecue chicken dinner was furnished by the equipment company.

We attended the Texas Pecan Growers Association's annual conference in Austin last week. This conference marked the end of Johnny Harris' year as president of the association. He was praised highly for his leadership during a year when an unusual number of problems faced the pecan growers.

Main purpose of this association is education. Helpful ideas are exchanged between members and information is passed on to the members from the experiment stations and universities. The association sponsors county, regional and state pecan shows. They also put up exhibits at major stock shows and fairs.

On the Home Range

Is it correct to call a cantaloupe a muskmelon? This question probably will be asked by many people during the summer season. One is not incorrect if they call a cantaloupe a muskmelon, but not all muskmelons are cantaloupes.

The fruit called cantaloupe is a variety of the muskmelon family. The characteristics of the muskmelons—and particularly the cantaloupe variety—have been changed by horticulturists over the past several decades to produce a firmer flesh with a tighter seed cavity.

You may have an opportunity this year to try a new variety that has had exceptional acceptance very early in the season. The fruit is oval shaped and the average size is five and one-half by six inches. It has no ribs, sutures or strips. The net is high and tight to protect the fruit against bruising.

The seed cavity of the new variety is small and tight, with flesh that is thick, firm and deep salmon in color. The fragrance is slightly different when cut than the popular varieties which have been on the market the past several seasons.

Fortunately, chicken can be prepared and re-prepared in so many different ways that it can always be used effectively. Fresh, uncooked chicken should be loosely wrapped in wax paper or other wrap, kept in the coldest part of the refrigerator and used within 3 days.

Frozen, uncooked chicken should be carefully wrapped in freezer paper and kept frozen until use. Cooked chicken should be served promptly after cooking. Left-over chicken and gravy should be refrigerated or frozen in covered containers as soon as possible. For a special treat, why not serve your family chicken.

Jaunty-hued carrots are a joy to serve in a number of menu-exciting ways. Nutritionally, carrots rank as a vitamin A rich food. One carrot 5½ inches long and an inch thick contains more than the adult daily vitamin A requirement. You diet watchers will be happy to know that this same carrot contains a mere 20 calories.

Another bonus feature of this root vegetable is its availability. It is in ample supply across the nation throughout the year. This is possible for two reasons—carrots are harvested somewhere in these United States every month of the year, and secondly, they can be held in controlled cold storage without loss of flavor or crispness.

Few people know that there are 389 known varieties of carrots, classified by the U.S. Department of

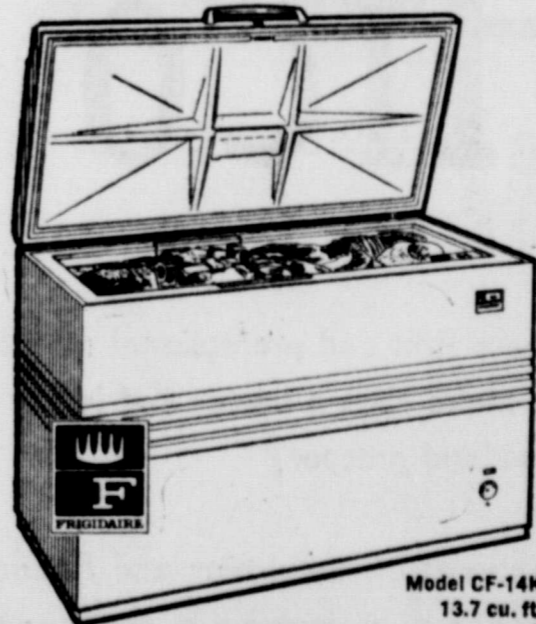
