Ronnie Hefner on "Hunting" I've always liked to hunt, whether it be four or furred animal, yet I've always had the regret of killing anything after I've shot. I've [grown tired of seeing the hunter become a butcher. No longer is there the sport of giving the chased half the chance of the chaser.

Hunters go out now in dove season with their fine, fast-shooting guns to slaughter the defenseless slow-flying dove. On a small piece of acreage out in the country, all I can hear is the frequent fire of shotguns all around me. The dove no longer sits in the tree giving i's scothing mate call, but rather flies from one tree to the next. literally running for its life.

I hunt also and I don't knock hunting, but rather the hunter and his methods. The guns used today in most instances are semi-automatic and can fire up to five shells without reloading. Such guns are supposed to be plugged to a threeconacity but this is hardly ever the case. There's certainly no sportsmanship and very little showing of the sportsman's ability.

Which I hunt I like to carry eith. single shot or dcuble-barrel a halt antice or automatin. I wall with the pin d'canona. nd r. hminen with a shell in the chambor and two or three shells in my norket. This in my mind gives the game the time it takes to pull the gun together, pull back
