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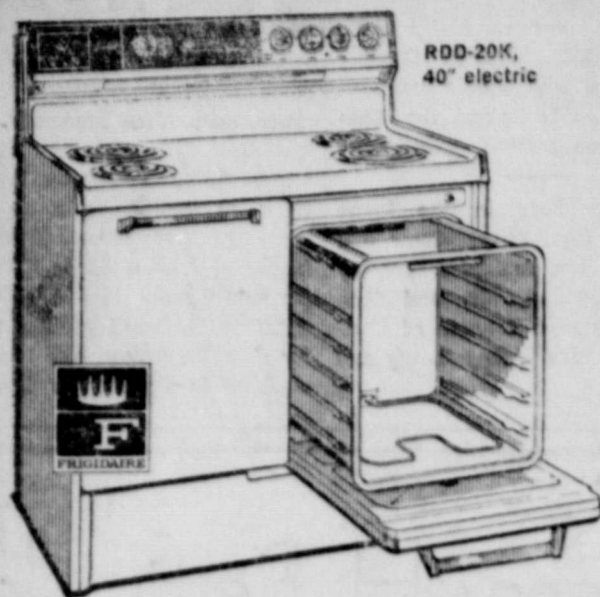

The Hamilton County Historical Survey Committee wishes to thank you for printing an inquiry about the history of the rock fences in this county. Miss Rodgers was kind enough to ask for this favor. Already we have had some replies. Thanks to you.

We need information about the Civil War veterans buried in this county in order to complete our files. We will keep a copy of the data in the County Clerk's office and send the same information to

the Archives Division, Texas State Library, Austin.

If one doesn't have the war records of his soldier, he may get the record from Austin if the soldier enlisted in Texas, and it is free. If the soldier enlisted in another state, north or south, he may get the information by sending one dollar to Washington.

For information write State Archives, 1201 Brazos, Austin, Texas, or Chief, Old Army Branch, War Section Div., National Archives and Records Service, Room 8-W National Archives Bldg., Washington 25, D.C.

We hope to get this list completed by the first of the year.

The completion of these forms has been very slow. Our newspaper in Hamilton printed this form some time ago but information is lagging. If you can find space in your paper to print this form it will be greatly appreciated.

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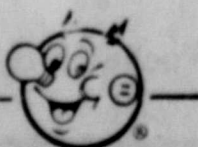
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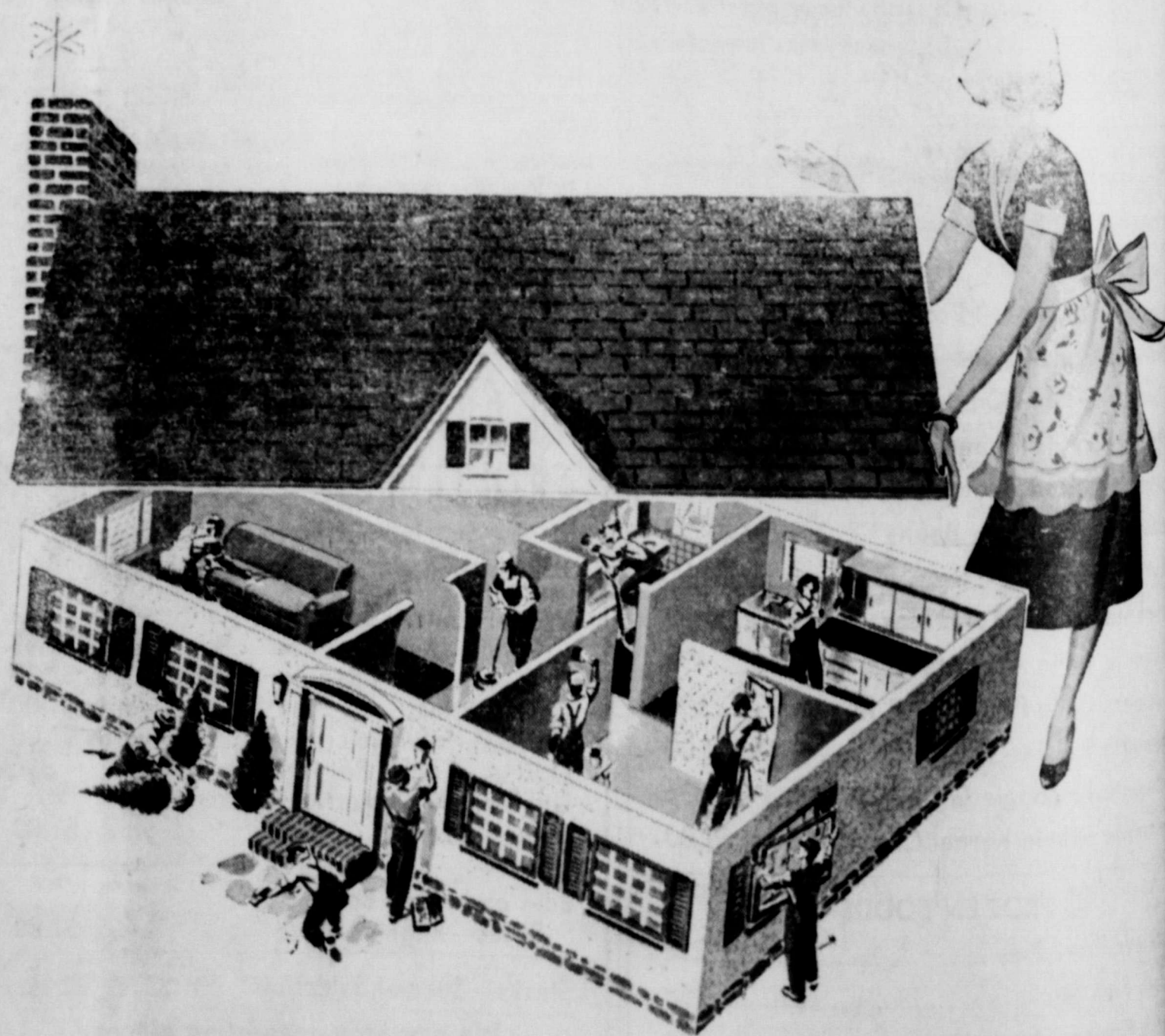
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
