## Buck Tales

At this time each year a buck seems to strike many hunters, young and old alike. The bucks are usually a rising of blood pressure and a strange look in the eyes. Diagnosing these cases is relatively easy. These persons are usually suffering from a common ailment known as "deer hunting fever" and as the fall air becomes cooler the fever rises until the annual deer hunting season begins in Hamilton County November 12 and continues through Dec. 31. Shoot-out hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset. A deer with a hardened antler shedding through the skin is law-abiding.

The season is closed on antlerless deer in this county as the status of the present deer population does not warrant the harvesting of any antlerless deer and no permits were issued. However, Hamilton County hunters may not have a very far to fill out their permit as many landowners in adjoining counties have been antlerless deer permits. On the other hand, the landowner can issue these permits to the hunter. It is unlawful to kill or possess an antlerless deer without this permit.

Due to the ample food supply and timely rains the deer are in excellent condition throughout the country; however, hunting with whitetail will not be an easy task due to the presence of heavy foliage still remaining to provide good cover, and the fact that deer will not have to move and considerably to avail themselves of the plentiful food supply in the area.

Let your hunt become marred by a violation unknowingly committed. It is each person's duty to assume responsibility to become acquainted with the hunting regulations. This takes little effort, but you obtain the information from a qualified source and not a source which may have a distorted view of what the law is. The hunting regulations may be obtained free of charge any place where hunting and fishing licenses are sold. Copies of these regulations may also be obtained from the local game warden who will give any additional information you desire.

Following are some reminders of the laws governing the hunting deer season: A resident of this State hunting deer or turkey is required to have a \$3.15 hunting license with the following exceptions: persons under 17 years of age, persons 65 years of age or older, and persons hunting only on land upon which the resident may hunt under a 25c antlerless deer license. Every resident must have either the regular license or the 25c license. It is unlawful for any person to acquire or possess more than one license during a license year.

It is unlawful for any person to use more deer tags during one license year than are originally provided by his hunting license for that year. It is unlawful for any person to use the same deer tag on more than one deer. It is unlawful for any person to use a deer tag which was not issued to such person. It is unlawful to possess the carcass or green hide of a deer with all evidence of sex removed. It is unlawful to hunt deer with any .22 caliber firearm which utilizes rimfire ammunition. It is unlawful to call or attract deer by any means, for the purpose of hunting, except by the rattling of horns. Rigid laws govern the placing of wild game in cold storage or processing plants; therefore, do not embarrass or put the operators of these plants on the spot by asking him to accept any wild game, or part thereof, without the proper information or tag he is required by law to obtain and maintain on record.

With the bringing to bear of high powered rifles during deer season, hunting safety cannot be stressed too strongly. Hunters are cautioned to be extremely careful before pulling the trigger. Be absolutely sure of your target and what is beyond your target. A bullet can be deadly dangerous for several miles. It is inevitable that hunting tragedies will probably occur in many parts of the country. Make sure that you are not one of those responsible. Good luck and good hunting.

**THIS, YOU GOTTA HAVE** to vote in any election during 1967. It is a copy of the voter registration form which all people desiring to vote next year must fill out and file. The new registration law applies to everyone

except those persons who are exempt due to age. In other words, if a poll tax was required for you to vote, then you must file the voter registration certificate. Mrs. Pearl Williams, county tax officer, said that

local deputies would be appointed at a later date to take the registrations here, or residents may fill out this copy and mail to her. Deadline for registering is January 31, same as under the old poll tax law.

## Cat Fight Due in Final Home Grid Game Friday Night

A real "cat fight" is expected this Friday night when the Hico Tigers entertain the May Tigers in a 7:30 p.m. battle at the local stadium in the last home game of the year.

Before the season started, Hico and May were picked to battle it out for third place in the five-team loop, and up to this point the pollsters have been most correct.

May has a 1-1 district record, losing to powerful Bangs 14-0 and winning from hapless Blanket 28-0 last week. On the other hand, the Hico version of the Tigers have faced the number 1 and 2 teams on successive weeks, and have dropped decisive battles to Gorman 45-13 and Bangs 59-0 to own an 0-2 record with two games remaining.

Following the May game, Hico will close out the season on Nov. 18 with a road trip to Blanket.

In last week's contest, it really wasn't as Bangs jumped on the Tigers for 20 points in each of the first two quarters, and then coast-

ed further down the line for their show-down battle with Gorman. The Dragons scored their first TD with only two minutes ten seconds gone in the game on a 95-yard punt return to set the pattern for a long, long evening for Hico fans.

The hosts ran the score to 40-0 at halftime, and added two touchdowns and a safety in the third quarter to hike the score to 56-0 going into the final quarter.

Their only marker in the fourth period was a 3-point field goal, kicked on first down in an effort to hold the score down.

The lone exception was in the U.S. Senate race where Hico people gave incumbent John Tower a scant one-vote margin over Democratic challenger Waggoner Carr. The tally was 106 to 105, with the Republican winning. Statewide, Tower won a decisive victory over Carr.

Local people also endorsed all but two of the 16 Constitutional Amendments on the ballot.

# COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

The continuing decline in domestic and foreign markets for U.S. cotton has resulted in the largest cotton carry-over on record—16.5 million bales on August 1, 1966.

Concern over this situation was a primary consideration in the passage by the U.S. Congress of the 1966 Cotton Research and Promotion Act. Stated purpose of the Act is: "To enable cotton growers to establish, finance and carry out a coordinated program of research and promotion to improve the competitive position of, and to expand markets for cotton."

In order for cotton growers of this area to get information on the legislation an educational meeting will be held November 18 beginning at 2 p.m. in the General Exhibits Building at the Heart of Texas Fair grounds in Waco.

A team of specialists from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, will be on hand to explain details and answer questions relating to the proposed program. The meeting will be educational and both the pros and cons, as established from four regional hearings and the legislation itself, will be discussed.

The Waco meeting is being held for the purpose of presenting information of assistance to cotton producers in making their decision on whether or not to accept the program.

Because of the importance of the legislation and the possible resulting programs, I would like to urge as many Hamilton County cotton producers as possible to attend the November 18th meeting.

Why not put your fertilizer down now instead of waiting until spring?

Fertilizing in the fall reduces planting time since you don't have to bother with fertilizer in the spring. There is less risk of not being able to fertilize in the spring because of bad weather. Also, you don't have to worry about disturbing your sometimes precious planting moisture in the spring to apply fertilizer.

A fourth advantage is the off-season price discount often offered by dealers in the fall.

It's best to apply fall fertilizer only to clay type soils. Fertilizer in sandy soils often leaches out too much during the winter.

For row crops, fertilizer should be applied in a band or bands. This can be done by chiseling between old beds or spreading evenly and rebedding immediately. In this county on the heavy soils, fertilizer can be put down in the fall, slack season, with no loss of yield.

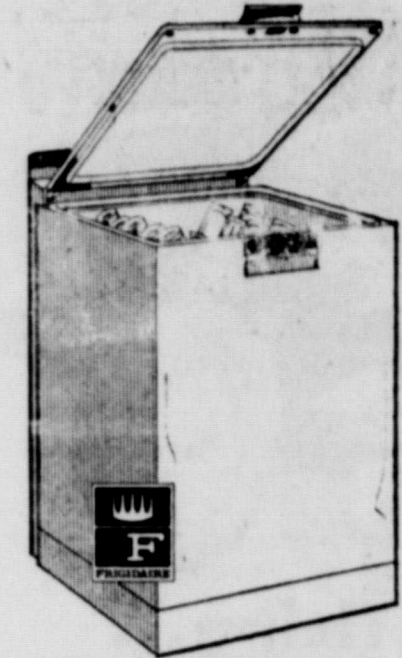

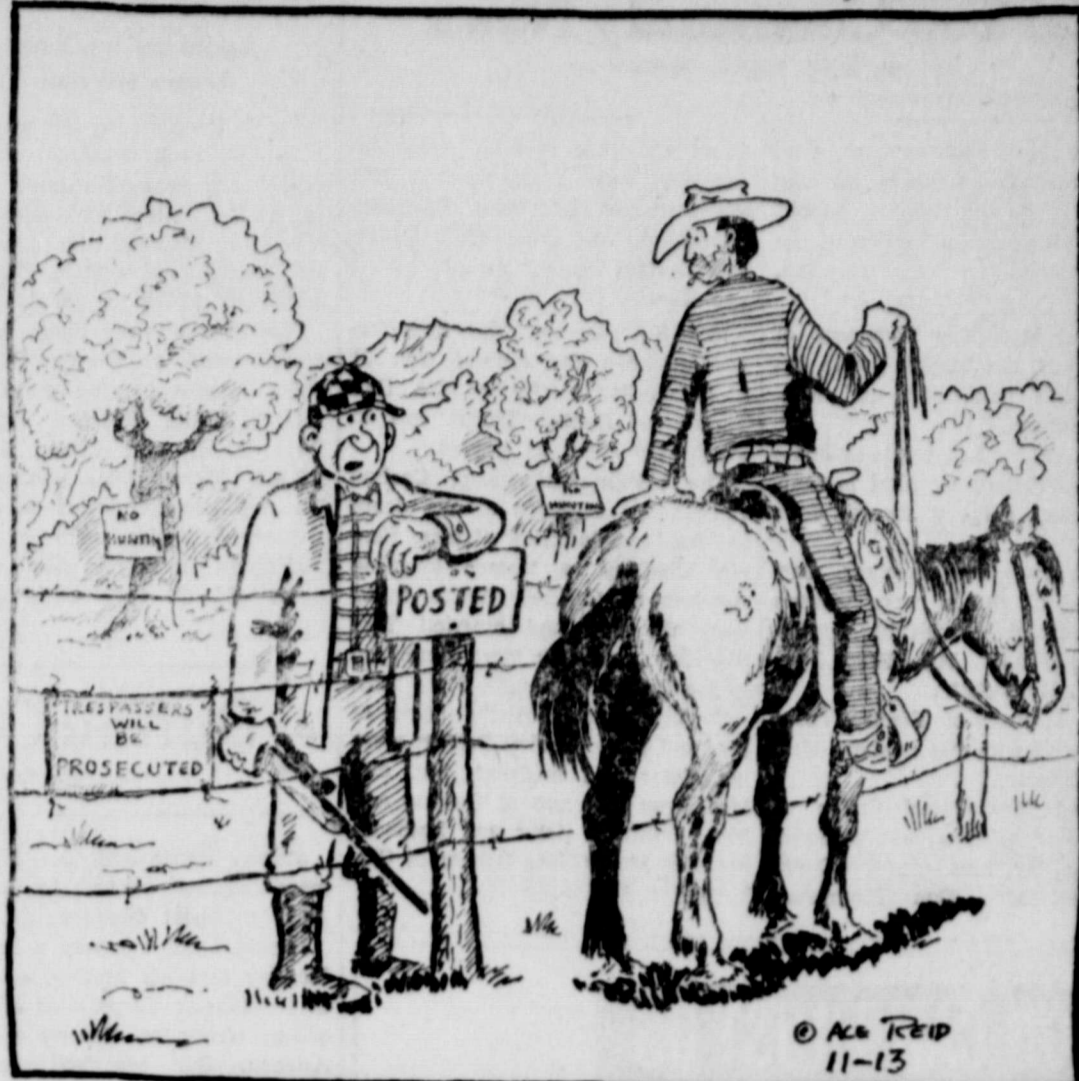
