Approximately 300 visitors registered at the exhibit of paintings of Mrs. J. E. Lincoln in the First National Bank building November 10-14. Friends, ex-students, and relatives attended from surrounding communities, and from Abilene, Ft. Worth, Dallas, Coolidge, Gustine, Fisk, Brownwood, Dublin, and many other places.

The exhibit was sponsored by Hico Review Club.

Mrs. Lincoln's art training includes study with Mrs. Noble of Corsicana, Will A. Kendrick of Waco, Lon Hellums of Fort Worth, Travis Rhea of Weatherford, Gaiha Browning of Taos, New Mexico, Harold A. Roney of San Antonio, and Lonnie Mason of Lubbock.

She has exhibited her paintings in the T.F.W.C. Building in Austin, Lon Hellums Art Gallery in Fort Worth, at the "Mall" and the Ann Page Home in Waco, and in April of this year at the Kyle Hotel in Temple at the TFWC District Show where she won Tri-Color ribbon and two blues and a red ribbon.

At the State Convention in May held at Lubbock, Mrs. Lincoln won second place on her "Resley Creek" painting.

The artist says she has no art talent, only ambition and a desire to create something pleasing. She believes that painting is a most relaxing hobby and a grand way to entertain one's self. Painting is rewarding in many ways, and Mrs. Lincoln says "You can learn to

appreciate nature, to be observant of colors, shapes and forms, and to recognize more readily the various hues, tints and shades in nature. Overall it develops a sense of the beauty in the commonplace things that one passes unnoticed."

In Mrs. Lincoln's travels through the U.S. and over the Continent of Europe, the Middle East, Greece, Turkey, the Holy Land, the Mediterranean Islands, in Egypt along the Nile, and in the Caribbean Area, she has visited the Museums and studied some of the greatest and most valued paintings in the world, realizing at the same time that her efforts would never reach the point of recognition but could give comfort and pleasure just in the trying.

ICC Postpones RR Abandonment

Outlook for the future of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad line running from Bellmead, in Waco, to Stamford, took on new life this week with announcement that the abandonment hearings had been postponed to a date "to be hereafter fixed." The delay announcement came from Congressman Omar Burleson of the 17th District.

The latest abandonment hearing had been originally set for Monday, November 14, but later was changed to November 19. The hearing was set at Hotel Texas in Fort Worth before Examiner Willard Goheen, and the latest delay was at the request of Mr.

Russell R. Sage, for a protestant. A check with local people who have been involved in the proceedings failed to reveal the identity of Mr. Sage.

Proceedings Started in 1961.

On December 8, 1964, the Katy asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to abandon the 220-mile line, and received a hearing date of May 10, 1965. However, on April 19, 1965, John W. Barringer, Chairman of the Board for Katy, asked ICC for permission to delay the hearing, saying the railroad "wanted to take another look at operations of the line."

This came after towns along the line had organized into an official protestant group, and had sought to show the need of the railroad to continue serving the area.

The MKT has leased the line from Texas Central Railroad Co. since April 20, 1914, and Texas Central was also seeking abandonment approval.

Regardless of final outcome, new life has been injected into the situation for the present time, which means that Hico will continue to be served by rail service until such time as approval is given by ICC for abandonment.

Funeral services for Charles Lampton Woodward, 79, were conducted Sunday afternoon at 3:30 in Hico Church of Christ, with Bro. Nelson Stark officiating.

Mr. Woodward passed away at 10:20 p.m. Friday in Scott and White Hospital at Temple. A lifetime resident of Hamilton County, he was born April 4, 1887 at Fairy, and was the son of the late Charles and Eliza Lampton Woodward. He had made his home in Hico for 64 years, and was a retired banker and rancher. Mr. Woodward was a member of the Hico Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Eileen Woodward of Hico, and one sister, Mrs. Mary Lane of Pampa. Serving as pallbearers were Jimmie Broumy, Scottie Broumy, George Newman, Leo Johnson, Derrell Murray and Horace Daniel. Burial was in Hico Cemetery.

The Air Medal was awarded for outstanding meritorious achievement in aerial support of ground operations in Viet Nam from July 27 to Nov. 20, 1965.

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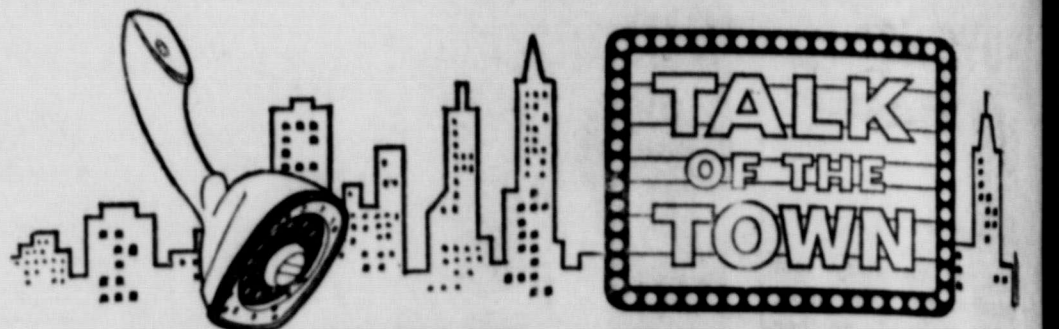

On the Home Range

The Hico 4-H Club will be open to all boys and girls ages 9 to 19 living in Hamilton County or attending a Hamilton County school while residing in an adjacent county. All interested persons are welcome to attend, including parents, boys and girls.

Before you decide to buy something "on time," be sure you know just how much credit your family can afford.

Installment credit can be very useful, but its overuse can be dangerous. When you buy on credit, charge or finance items, or use a payment plan, remember that, sooner or later, the total cost must be paid and that using credit usually costs extra. It may or may not be worth the extra cost to you.

"Misuse of credit is causing an alarming number of U.S. families to file bankruptcy proceedings. The reason, in most cases, is poor management rather than just a lack of money. These families just use more credit than they can afford."

First, of course, you must make sure you can meet all the necessary payments on your credit purchases—even in case of emergency that would reduce income or cause increased spending.

According to some financial experts, if the repayment of your installment debts (not including mortgage payments or ordinary monthly bills) will take more than one year and you have \$200 or less in ready cash, you're not in a good position to cope with emergencies. And if you're also using more than 20 percent of your income to repay installment debts, you're considered in a very risky position.

Unless you know you can meet your financial obligations in an emergency, better wait awhile before buying any more goods on credit.

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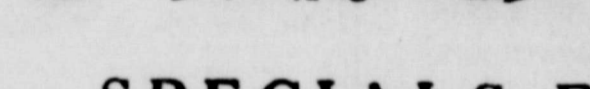
