

Hico Without Rodgers In Insurance Business First Time in 80 Years

For the first time in 80 years, Hico is without a member of the Rodgers family in the insurance business.

The fact was brought out last week after the announcement that Miss Thoma Rodgers had sold her insurance business to Mrs. Odis Petsick.

The late J. P. Rodgers Sr. and his brother, J. C. Rodgers, first formed an insurance partnership in 1886. The partnership lasted until 1913 when J. P. sold his interest to J. C. when offered the postmaster's job here.

After serving eight years in that position, J. P. went in competition with his brother in the insurance business in 1921. And in 1930, his daughter, Thoma, joined the firm which was named J. P. Rodgers & Daughter Insurance. Miss Rodgers continued the business up to the present time.

Another interesting sidelight was the fact that when the late J. P. Rodgers, Jr. retired as a rural mail carrier last December 30, it marked the first time in 53 years that a member of the Rodgers family was not associated with the U.S. Postal Service
