Warden Gives Statement On Taking Pelts From **Fur-Bearing Animals**

Game Warden Tom Abbott called attention this week to the fact that December and January are the months when it is legal in Texas to take fur bearing animals for

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department's book of laws lists the following fur bearing animals of badger, skunk, racoon, muskrat, o'possum, fox and civic. Abbott says that all of these animals have been seen in Hamilton County at one time or another with the possible exception of beaver and otter.

According to the law pelts from any of these animals may be legally taken only during the months of December and January, with the exceptions of mink which may be taken between November 15 and Jan. 15, and muskrats which may be taken between Nov. 15 and Mar. 15. Even though these are the seasons for taking pelts, any of the fur bearing animals may be killed for any other purpose, such as food or sport, any time during the year,

A \$1.00 resident trappers license is required of anyone who attempts to sell any of the pelts he has taken lawfully. The license may be obtained from the Texas Parks & Wadlife Department, Austin, or from Blair's Hardware in Hico or Geo. Chambless in Hamilton.

Buyers of such pelts which were legally taken must own either a wholesale or a retail fur bearer's license.

The game warden pointed out certain illegal practices which are often carried on by hunters of the fur-bearing animals. Among these are hunting from public roads, discharging firearms from or across public roads and trespassing. He said there is a possibility of a double violation in some instances, since hunting fur bearers from public roads and firing guns from public roads are distinct and separate


