#### SCHOOL TRUCK IN ACCIDENT

It is said the truck skidded into the ditch along the side of the road and that the driver attmpted to right it back into the road, when it turned over on its side. Aside from bruises sustained by three or four there was no material injury. One little girl, Anna Mae Long, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Long, sustained a bruise that for a time appeared to be serious, but is now reported to be doing well.





# YOUR DOCTOR

Clear Quartz Windows Promise to Cure Disease Caused by Lack of Ultraviolet Rays in Filtered Sunlight.

Announcement recently that a way has been found to produce clear fused quartz glass in commercial quantities at a reasonable cost followed by word that John Hopkins hospital had installed the world's first quartz window, disclosed a new chapter in the use of natural agencies to fight dis-

The value of clear fused quartz lies n the fact that it affords ready passage to the ultraviolet rays which glass turns back. It is the absence of ultraviolet rays that causes children kept indoors in wintry climates to develop rickets and other diseases. Besides the seven colors of the spectrum-red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet-sunlight contains another "color" which is not visible to the eye and which lies beyond the violet range of the spectrum. This is known as ultraviolet. Not only are the eyes insensitive to its presence, but the pigment of the skin is ordinarily proof against it. When the unpigmented portions of the skin are exposed to the ultraviolet rays sunburn develops. In the extremely rare cases known to science where people have been born withou tany pigment in the skin, it has been necessary to keep them out of the sun to save their lives. Ordinary window glass is opaque to ultraviolet rays, and science has discovered that to this fact rickets, a disease of undeveloped bones in children, is due. The discovery was made by Dr.

William T. Bovie, professory of biophysics in Howard University, with the co-operation of President C. C. Little, of the University of Maine. They used chickens for the experiment, and produced ultraviolet rays with an ordinary mercury lamp, using a quartz globe. Two chickens were raised in a greenhouse, under the same conditions, with identical food, the same dust bath, and the same sized pens. The common glass of the greenhouse kept out the ultraviolet rays. One chicken was exposed to the rays of the mercury lamp for fifteen minutes each day. It developed much faster than its unexposed mate, and at the end of the experiment X-rays showed the bigger chicken had well developed bones, with plenty of calcium and phosphorus salts in them, while the small chicken had poor bone structure and died shortly after the pictures were taken. The chicken exposed to the rays for fifteen minutes a day also showed better development and weighed more than chickens of the same brood which had been permitted to run at large under natural sunlight. That fact has raised the interesting question of whether longer exposure to the rays might cause the the prevalence of pigmy races in the fore above named date. tropics, with their development to maturity taking place much earlier in life than in more temperate climes may be due to an excess of ultraviolet rays from the intense tropical sunlight. In its application to humans, as planned at John Hopkins hospital, the new quartz glass is expected to open a new field of therapeutic treatments. The formation of the bones, which is affected by the rays, involves a series of chemical changes which physiologists call "calcium metabolism." Besides rickets, there are other diseases caused by the absence of calcium, such as otosclerosis, or hardening of the eardrum, and ostemollacia, a chronic progressive adult disease marked by large consumption of goods remains softening of the bones. "The disease records of every city," Dr. Bovie said in announcing his discovery, "show that from ninety-seven to one hundred per cent of all the this season, and most of the other stababies raised in the northern countries, where it is necessary to keep children indoors and to use window glass to shut out the cold, have rickets when examined in the spring. Undoubtedly many other physiological processes are involved. We may expect to find the same factors influencing the growth rate of children as have been found in this experiment, with the chickens. The results of the experiments are of great economic ience of chicken growers that the death rate of chickens at the age of four and five weeks is very high. The experiment shows that this death rate in a broadening of retail trade, and a can be reduced by supplying ultraviolet light to the chickens. Chickens receiving this treatment are not only larger, but are livelier and more vigorous in every way than are those which did not receive it. Advance Continues in Wheat Market. Rye at New High Levels; Feed Grains Lower With Supply Exceed-

Wheat future prices again reached new high levels during the week ending January 24, but demand for cash grain was less active and bulk of sales

were at smaller premiums than recent. ly. Receipt of oats and corn exceeded the moderate demand and prices held steady but did not follow the advance in wheat. Rye prices were at new high levels, while barley and flax

made slight gains. The world's wheat situation showed no material change during the week. Winter wheat acreage in the United States has been increased about 21/2 million acres. Canadian acreage also has been increased slightly but reports covering about half of the total wheat acreage of Europe shows a decrease of about three per cent from the amount seeded in the fall of 1923. If the remaining European countries have not reduced their acreage of wheat more than those already reported, the winter wheat acreage in the Northern Hemisphere will still be somewhat larger.

The condition of the growing crop is generally good, although some sections in Europe have suffered from a lack of snow covering, while a fairly large area in the United States has suffered some from ice. The demand for cash wheat continued fairly active but buyers were not inclined to follow the full advance in future prices. Argentine wheat is still being offered in European markets at prices slightly below the United States' quotations and foreign buyers have been less active at the recent price advances. World stocks of wheat in commercial channels are the highest for this time of year since the war and while stocks on farms are smaller than last year this time, it does not seem probable except possibly for high protein grades that any serious shortage will occur in the domestic markets

until new wheat is available. Premiums for spring wheat were reduced slightly at Minneapolis and the bulk of sales of No. 1 dark northern was at two cents under to 31 cents over the May price. No. 1 northern sold at 3 cents under to 40 cents over. Durum offerings were a little heavier and cash premiums for this wheat also were lowered. Especially desirable grades commanded high premiums but medium grades could be moved only at material discounts. No. 1 amber sold at the close of the week in a range of \$1.89-\$2.23 with No. 1 mixed about 10 cents lower.

Premiums for hard winter wheat were also a shade easier, 12 per cent protein at Kansas City being quoted at 7c-8c over the May price, with 121/2 per cent protein, quoted at 10c-11c and 13 per cent protein 14c-15c over. There was a moderate demand from local mills and some mills in the east and was being reflected in a less active demand for wheat. Export bids were around 8c over the Chicago May price for January loading at the Gulf.

Red winter wheat premiums held steady and receipts were scarcely equal to the demand, which was very active both at Chicago and Cincinnati. Buyers for Southern mills were

in the market for immediate and deferred shipments. Prices ranged at around \$2.10-\$2.15 per bushel at the principal markets.

The rye market advanced to new high levels on continued good export demand. Receipts were of only moderate volume and while commercial stocks are relatively large, they represent a large percentage of the world

The continued advance in the wheat market was practically the only strengthening factor in the corn market, but was not sufficient to hold prices to last week's level and a net decline of about 1/2 cent per bushel occurred in the future prices for both May and July deliveries. The cash situation was the principal weakening factor. Receipts were not large but were in excess of the demand at both markets, resulting in a further increase in the commercial stocks. The feeders took very little corn and reports indicate that farmers are marketing a larger percentage of the crop than usual because of its relatively high price compared with the prices of hogs and cattle. Cereal and elevator interests were the principal buyers but the scarcity of storage space at several of the larger markets restricted the demand from elevator interests. A large percentage of receipts at Chicago were of low grades, which could be sold only at heavy discounts. White corn was in better demand that other grades at Omaha and St. Louis and sold at about 2 cents over the yellow at those markets. Less corn was sold to the corn belt from the Kansas City market during the week but there was a better demand for Southern

Buyers. Heavy stocks of oats in terminal markets and a weakness in corn were reflected in lower prices for oats. Receipts continued of moderate volume and at most markets were in excess of current demand. Seed oats were bringing slight premiums at several markets, but the general demand was

## WEATHER FORECAST

FOR THE JOURNAL.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. - Storm wave of week centering on February 4 is expected to bring below normal temperatures and above normal precipitation with very severe weather following storm center. Most severe along the northern storm path that makes a shallow dip in its course from Medicine Hat to Ontario. This storm wave is expected to be the last one of the present winter to carry frost to the far south and is also expected to be the last period of real ice making weather in northern latitudes. Where ground is in condition in cotton sections spring work should be opened up with a rush following this storm period. The principal line of electro-magnetic force, established by the same planetary contact which will cause this storm wave, is expected to center in the vicinity of Southern India and I expect to hear of a disastrous storm accompanied by excessive precipitation in that locality between February 1 and 4. Following this severe storm wave of February 4, gradual change in location of precipitation is expected to begin, as new evaporation area gains and old evaporation area loses force. This change will have very little influence in the Southwest after February 4 the Southwest will have to depend on the Gulf storms for its moisture and the indications for the immediate future are that most of these storms will favor South America, bringing plentiful winter moisture to Argentine and vicinity instead of Southwest United States, where it would be welcome spring moisture at this time.

An official of the British Meteorological Society has been quoted to have forecasted that the year 1925 would be the driest the world had ever known -this kind of forecast is very misleading and will fit any locality that happens to be dry. Had he said England instead of "the world" I would agree with him. I believe that England is to experience a very dry year. I also believe that the five continents will receive above normal precipitation during 1925. A great percentage of this expected rainfall will occur in small areas, making 1925 a year of floods as well as drouth. Western slopes of Europe and Asia, Nothern and Western Africa, Southern and Southeastern Asia, Japan and the Philippines are among the places where I expect above normal rainfall in 1925. I expect the most serious drouth in Canada and the United States. drouth of lesser force in Australia during their coming winter.
