the eyes insensitive to its presence.

pigmented portions of the skin are
exposed to the ultraviolet rays sunexposed to the ultraviolet rays sun-
burn develops. In the extremely rare
cases known to science where people cases known to science where peopl
have been born withou tany ppigmen
in the skin, it has been necessary to in the skin, it has been necessary to
keep them out of the sun to save their
lives. Ordinary window glass is opaque to ultraviolet rays, and science
has discovered that to this fact rickhas discovered that to this fact rick-
ets, a disease of undeveloped bones in children, is due.
The discovery was made by Dr.
William T. Bovie, professory of bio

physics in Howard University, with
