This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000 post offices.

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

There have been several predictions of a fertilized shortage in the spring of 1967. The latest warning came from C. D. Welch, Extension Soil Chemist at Texas A&M Univer-

According to Welch, such a situation could develop as national corn acreage is expected to be up 20 fertilizer used in the United States goes to this crop.

The lack of transportation and distribution facilities to deliver the needed fertilizer could make it difficult for farmers to obtain fertilizers at the time needed for

Fertilizer applications now will enable farmers to avoid the potential difficulty in obtaining fertilizer at planting time. If you have clay soil, put your fertilizer in the soil now, in your slack period. -0-

A problem that faced many Hamilton County gardeners last year was root knot nematodes. I hadn't expected this problem as nematodes are generally found in sandy land. Many persons had created a problem however by bringing in sand for gardens and lawns.

All of our locally grown tomatoes are highy susceptable to nematodes and these microscopic pests can make it virtually impossible to grow tomatoes without soil fum-

Nematex, a tomato resistant to most species of root knot nematodes, will be available from commercial seedsmen this spring. The variety was developed for the fresh market and home gardens by Dr. A. L. Harrison of the Plant Disease! Experiment Station at Yoakum. The station is a unit of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Nematex is resistant to fusarium wilt, grey leaf spot, and alternaria collar spot. It is productive under a wide variety of conditions, the fruit is round, attractive and crack resistant, and has a small blossom end scar. Fruit sizes are slightly smaller than the well known Homerus King.

ACP Report Shows Conservation ter resources got a major boost in Hamilton County during 1966, says Chairman James Youngblood of the ASC committee.

Data just compiled by the ASCS office shows that 306 farms participated in the program during the year, with program funds based primarily on conservation needs of farmers in the county.

According to the report, farmers, to date, earned \$70,322 in costshare assistance during 1966. To promote conservation, funds are allocated on a matching basis, with farmers normally sharing half or more of the total cost of the conservation practices carried out.

Practices carried out in Hamilton County consisted of: Permanent pasture grasses; deferred grazing control of competitive shrubs; livestock waterwells and storages; earthen dams, crossfences, shaping and seeding waterways; terracing; diversion terracing.

ACP, according to Youngblood, is aimed at solution of conservation problems. It may help improve the appearance of rural areas, as well as protect the soil, water, woodland, and wildlife resources of the farm and community.

The Hamilton County 1966 ACP original allocation was \$57,881. This includes \$8,729 used for new participants). Due to demands and constructive participation by producers. Hamilton County was allocated an additional \$23,000. This

Mr. Krupala said the Demonstration Cities and Metropolitan Development Act. signed last month by President Johnson, makes it possible for a broader range of Hamilton County families to qualify for housing credit under expanded housing loan authorities of the

The new legislation, Mr. Krupala continued, makes more mortgage credit available to low and moderate income families in Hamilton County by increasing the level of activity of the agency's rural housing loan program.
