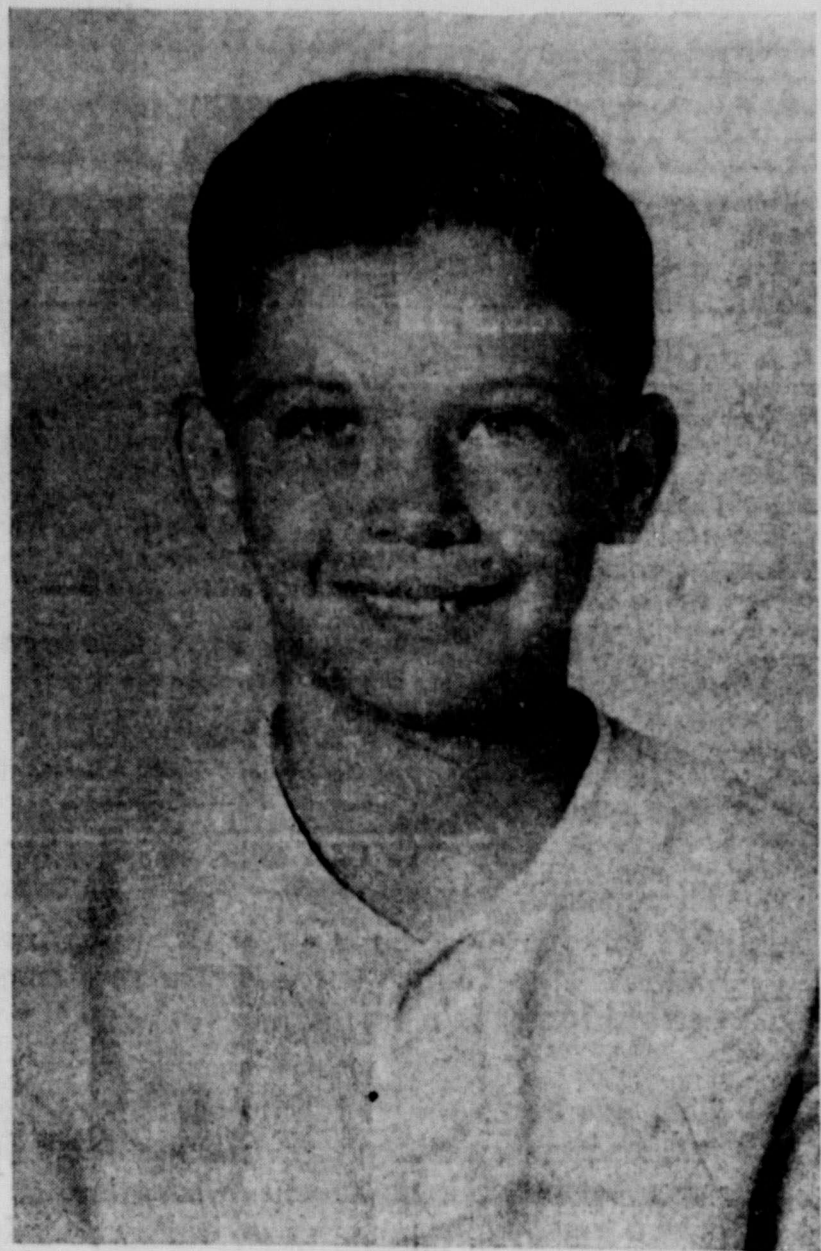

HUBERT JON SCOTT
12-Year-Old Killed Sunday Morning

12-Year-Old Accident Victim Buried Mon.

Funeral services were held at 4:00 o'clock Monday afternoon, January 30 in Hico Church of Christ for Hubert Jon Scott, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Von Scott. Young Scott was killed about 8:30 Sunday morning when a jeep in which he was riding overturned at the farm of his grandmother, Mrs. Golda Scott in the Salem community.

Bro. Nelson Stark, Minister, conducted the services, with burial in Duffau Cemetery under the direction of Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home.

Jon was born January 23, 1955 in Hico, and had been a resident here all of his life. He was a sixth grade student in Hico Elementary School.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Von Scott; two sisters, Devonna and Tanja both of the home; a foster brother, Mike Gravette, stationed with the Army at Fort Riley, Kansas; his grandmo-

ther, Mrs. Golda Scott, and a host of other relatives.

Serving as pallbearers were Mike Christian, Barry Christian, Barry Polk, Don Maness, Mike Turner, Ronnie Lowrance, Howard Strader and James Shipman.

Injured in the mishap which took the life of Jon were Robert Dale Gray, 14, and his brother, Jerry Dan, 11. Robert suffered a cerebral concussion with amnesia and multiple cuts and bruises. Jerry suffered a broken wrist, extensive cuts and bruises, and possible internal injuries and a cerebral concussion.

They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Gray and live on the farm adjacent to the Kelsay property, where the accident occurred. The Gray family tended livestock on the Kelsay place and the three youths were touring the farm in the jeep.

Mr. Gray and his eldest son, David, were summoned to the scene by young Scott's grandmother, who lives on the place where the accident occurred. They, along with Ray Clapp, another neighbor, lifted the jeep from the youths and Clapp took them to the Hico Hospital. The Gray boys were later transferred to Stephenville.

Mrs. Golda Scott was admitted to the Hico Hospital for treatment of extreme shock, where she remained at mid-week.

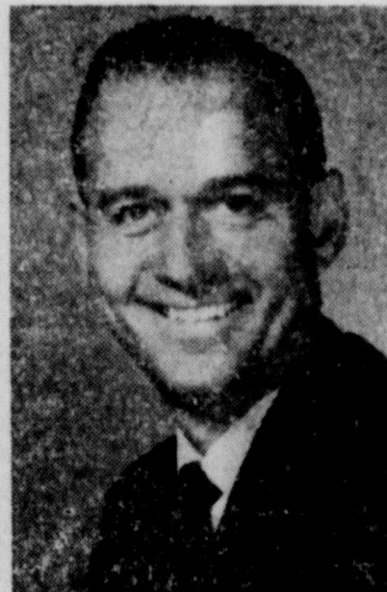
Country Club Officers Elected Friday Night

Lottie Pearl Prisk, by finishing first in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude test for senior girls, became Carlton High School's 1967 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Miss Prisk is now eligible for possible state and national scholarship awards. Her test also earned her a specially designed silver sash from General Mills, sponsor of the contest.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of all schools in the state, with the former receiving a \$1500 college scholarship; her school will be given a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica. State runner-up will be awarded a \$500 educational grant.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow from this state, together with those from all other states and the district of Columbia, each accompanied by her school advisor will join in an extensive paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va. and

Washington, D.C. next spring.

Winner of the 1967 All-American Homemaker will be announced at a dinner in Williamsburg. Her reward will be an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth ranking national winners will have their original scholarships increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

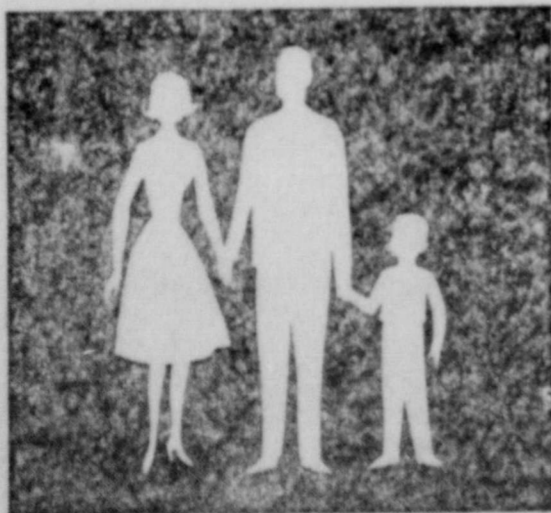

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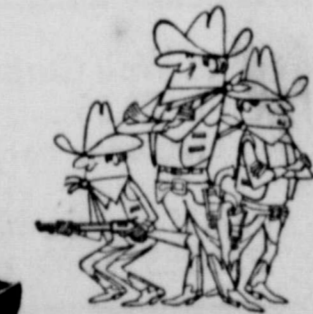
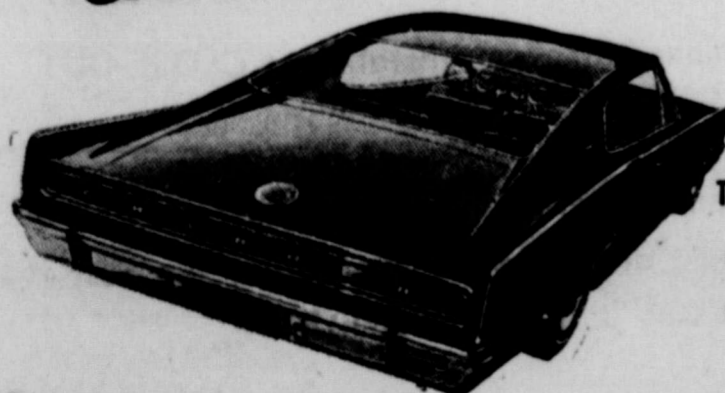

Hico Teachers Complete In-Service Training Workshop

Hico Public School teachers last week completed the third of three In-Service Training Workshops. The workshops were directed by Jimmie Adams of Lampasas and sponsored by the Regional Education Media Center operating under Title III, one of the Federal Government Programs for public schools.

Purpose of the local workshop was to help teachers prepare more attractive teaching aids and preserve teaching materials that had been clipped from magazines, newspapers, or books.

Hico teachers first learned to dry-mount illustrative material. The dry mounting, not only served as a permanent mount, but made materials to be displayed more attractive, easier to display, and more convenient for filing. While dry mounting, the teachers used a dry mount press produced by "Seal."

After dry mounting, the local teachers were instructed in laminating techniques. Mr. Adams explained that laminated materials could be handled without fear of damage since the procedure involved covering the product with a thin plastic coating. Mr. Adams showed the group the laminated 1945 special edition of the Fort Worth Press announcing the death of President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Laminating procedure also strengthens anything that is to be handled and is waterproof.

Another procedure learned was the process of chartexing. Chartex products have a cloth backing, and adds body to maps, charts, or pictures being used.

In the second workshop, Hico teachers worked with spray paints and blocked letters. The group painted slogans for bulletin boards, signs, or other types of lettering that might be useful. The teachers also worked with "Wri-Co" kits used in making professional printed lettering.

The group "lifted" color from a magazine picture making a transparency to be used with an overhead projector. After following instructions for making the transparency, the teachers mounted their transparency and sprayed them

with lacquer to insure permanency.

In the final workshop, each teacher brought materials pertaining to his or her field of instruction. Put together a teaching block would be of help in his work.

During the final workshop, Adams demonstrated how a que projector could be used to project a picture on the wall and be traced, then used as a pattern for other illustrative material.

Weather does make a difference in the quality and supplies of some produce arriving at local markets. This is a good time of year to compare prices on fresh and frozen vegetables to find the best values. Heading choices at the fresh vegetable counter are cabbage, head lettuce, carrots, celery, loose turnips, potatoes, and hard shell squash.

Other quality offerings include cauliflower, broccoli, yellow squash, snap beans and eggplant. In the citrus fruit line, oranges are most plentiful, with ample grapefruit

offerings. Both have very attractive price tags. Watch for exceptionally good values in canned orange juice and concentrated frozen orange juice. Apples, pears, avocados and bananas are good fruit choices.

In the meat department, several good cuts of beef are being featured which are just right for pot roasting. T-Bone, sirloin, and round are other good values. Boston butt roasts of fresh pork and smoked ham portions are good choices this week. Some brands of bacon are selling at attractive price levels. Frying chickens and eggs continue to be real food bargains.

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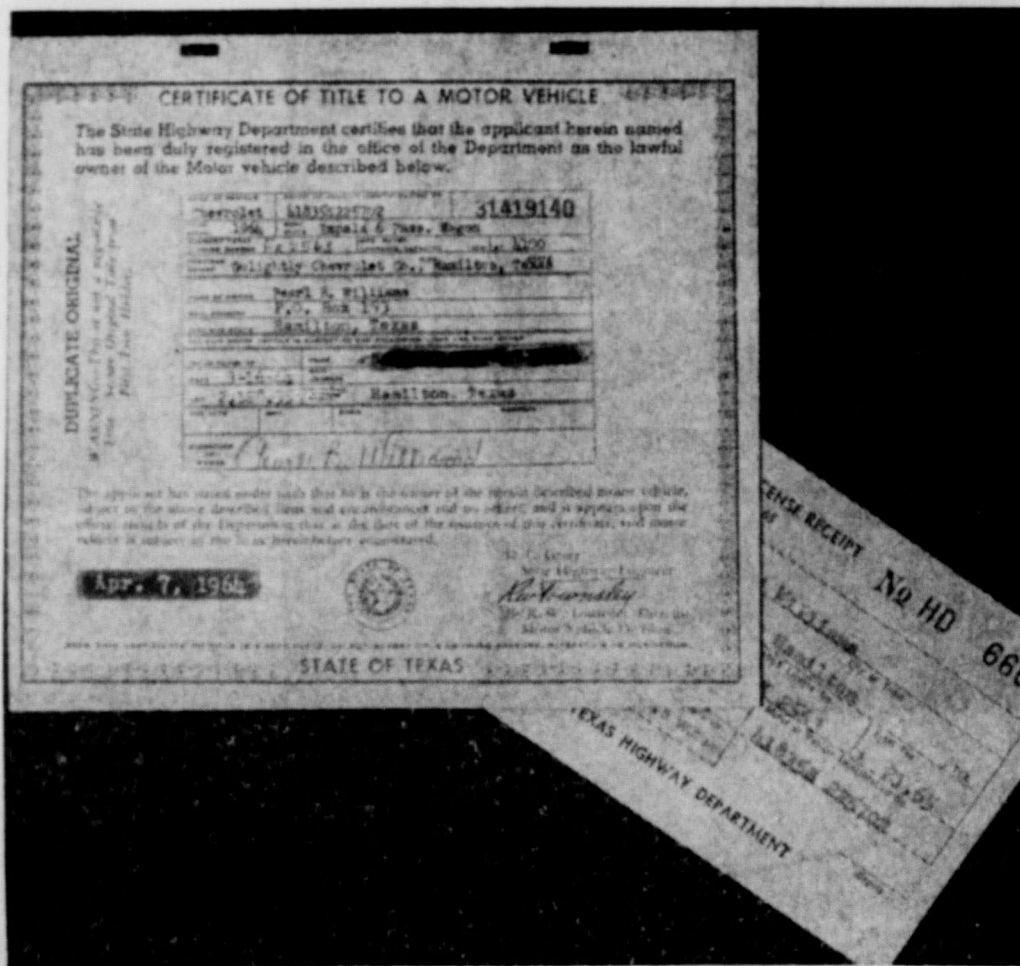



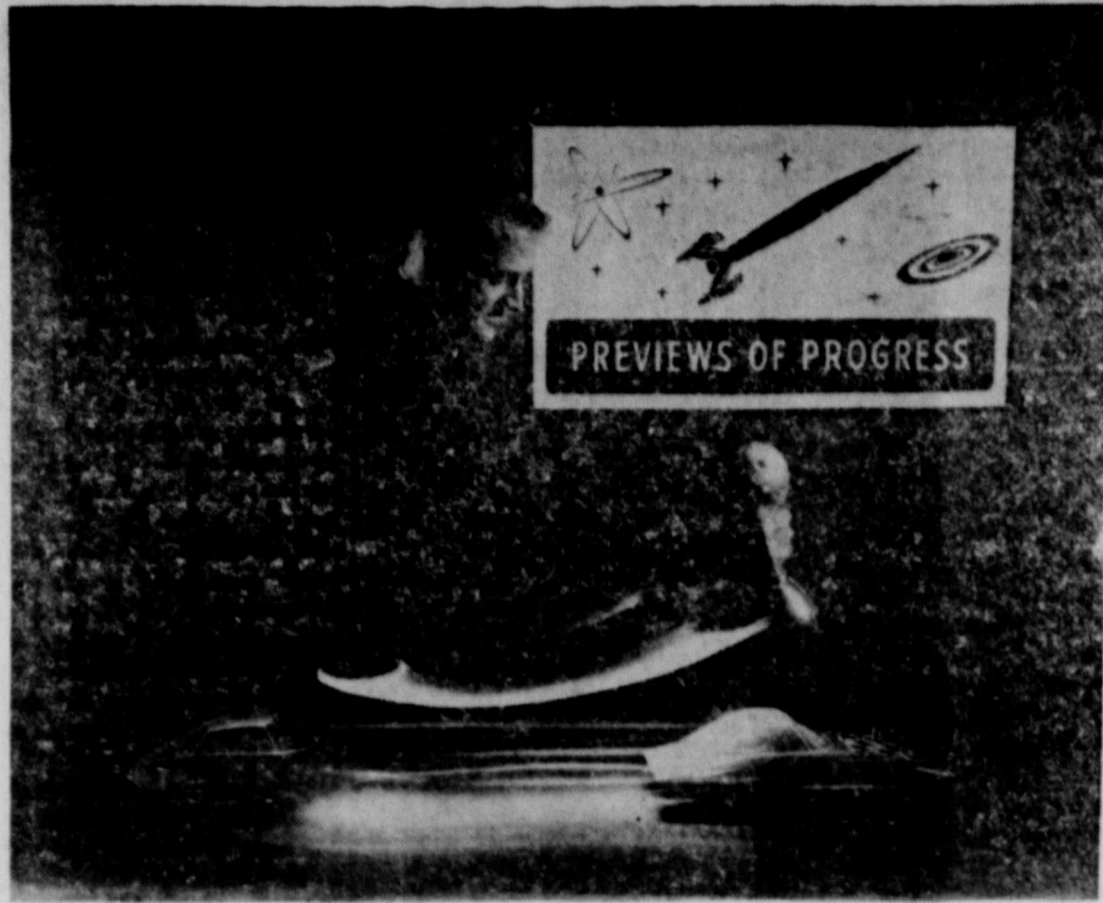
Don't miss the Hamilton County Junior Livestock Show this week. The show will be at the Fair Grounds in Hamilton this Friday, Feb. 3. All livestock are to be in place by 9 a.m. and they will not be released until 4 p.m. Friday afternoon. We would like to ask that the swine exhibitors get their animals to the show early as they will be judged first.

Stanley Westbrook, Tarelton's Livestock Judging Coach, will be judge. Judging will start at 9:30 a.m. Friday morning. Order of judging will be swine, sheep, goats, poultry, dairy and beef cattle.

We certainly hope that everyone will come out and see the livestock exhibits, the judging, and the youngsters exhibit their animals. From the quality of animals I have seen, I would think that this show would rate with the best ever in Hamilton. There are 207 entries.

These contestants will be trying for the championship ribbons and showmanship awards offered. Six trophies and two silver medallions are up for grabs this year. Trophies will be awarded to the outstanding showmen in the swine, beef, dairy, sheep and goat divisions, and an all-around trophy will be presented to the youngster scoring the most points in the show. Points are awarded on basis of animals placing. Silver medallions, donated by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, will be presented to the owner of the outstanding female in both the sheep and goat divisions.

Be sure to take time to come out and see the fine livestock and the work that these youngsters are

'Preview of Progress,' GM Science Show, Here Friday

"Liquid sunshine" powers a portable radio. A small platform slides across the floor on a thin layer of air. And a "misbehaving" suitcase illustrates principles used in modern guidance systems.

Livestock Show Committee members are Dr. C. B. Cathey, chairman; Bill McCutcheon, superintendent; and Monroe Reinert, Lagree West, Bob Jones, Bob Wright, Gail Christian, Ralph Lawrence, and Seth Moore.

Hico High Schol students will see these and other interesting demonstrations when the famed General Motors science show, "Previews of Progress," appears at the school this Friday at 1:45 p.m.

"We seek through Previews to inspire more young people to make science and engineering their career and provide the trained talent America must have to keep pace with the promise of the future," James M. Roche, president of General Motors, declares.

David G. Gosler of GM public relations staff will narrate the 45-minute, non-commercial presentation. He is one of seven units that take the show to more than a million students each year.

One of the highlights of the show is a fuel cell, a device that converts chemical energy into electrical power. Potentially one of the most significant scientific developments of the century, the fuel cell manufactures electricity with much greater efficiency than is now obtained from conventional power plants.

In the show, a few drops of "liquid sunshine" added to the cells provide enough energy to operate a portable radio.

Another example of solar energy.

the amazing Sunmobile, will be demonstrated. The 15-inch model car depends on eight photo-electric cells for its operation. The button-like cells on the hood of the car convert light rays into electricity which drives a small electrical motor inside the car. The 300-watt lamp is used to simulate the sun's rays in the show. As the light strikes the cells, the Sunmobile moves smoothly across a table.

In addition to sun power, the Previews audience will see an air bearing platform in operation. This small platform, supported by three large circular pads, is designed to slide over any flat surface on a thin layer of air.

Another Previews sequence illustrates principles used in modern guidance systems. A student volunteer will manipulate a suitcase with "a mind of its own" as the lecturer explains how today's planes, ships and missiles are safely guided along predetermined courses.

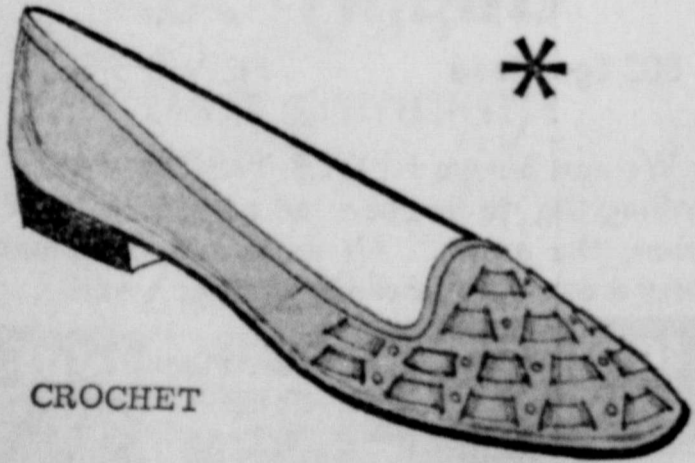
