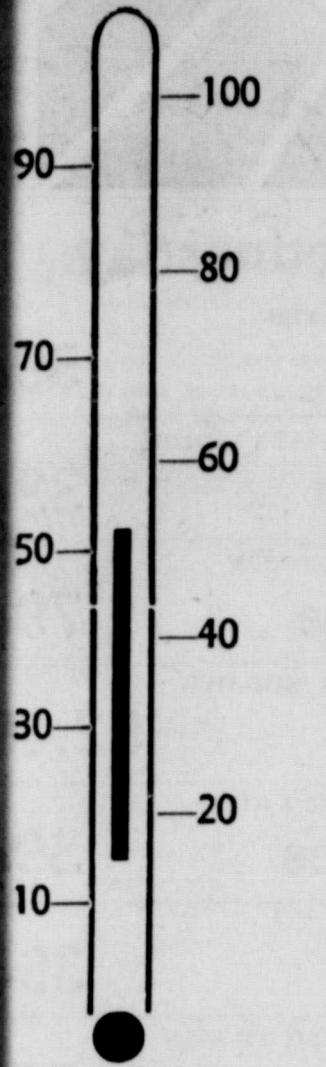

## County Superintendent Gives Trustee Filing Information

County Superintendent W. B. McPherson Jr. this week submitted information pertaining to filing for places on the ballot in the forthcoming school trustee elections.

Trustee elections will be held in all school districts on Saturday, April 1. The time for filing application as candidate for trustee is as follows:

In all elections for the office of County School Trustee of any school district the application of candidates for a place on the ballot shall be filed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the day of the election. Applications of candidates for County Trustee or for trustee of a common or independent school district having fewer than five hundred (500) scholastics shall be filed with the County Judge. For any of the

above elections five or more resident qualified voters may request that certain names be printed on the ballot.

Application of candidates for trustees from independent school districts with more than 500 scholastics shall be filed with the secretary of the school board of trustees.

Regardless of the method used in filing each candidate is required to file a loyalty affidavit before his or her name can be printed on the ballot. Any of these forms may be secured in the office of the County Superintendent.

## Portion of Railroad Sold to Gorman Firm

(ED NOTE: The following story appeared in Wednesday morning's Fort Worth Star-Telegram concerning the Katy Railroad. Hearing for abandonment was held Monday in Fort Worth, but a final ruling was not given then. Several towns along the right of way plan further protest of the action taken Monday, due mainly because some towns were not notified of the hearing.)

Melvin E. Shell of Gorman bought a railroad for peanuts, it was revealed Tuesday. Peanuts is what the line will haul, not the price.

The purchase came about when Missouri-Kansas-Texas Lines decided to abandon 220 miles of its line from near Waco to Stamford.

Shell, co-owner of Gorman Peanut Co., noted that the railroad figures in the welfare of peanut shippers, so he arranged purchase of the 26-mile segment between Gorman and Dublin.

The purchase will provide peanut growers in the Gorman area with rail transportation to Dublin, where processing plants and freight connections are available.

The purchase was arranged with John W. Barriger, president of M-K-T Lines. Price was not disclosed.

Shell bought the segment for shippers along the stretch. His company, he said, expects to ship 2,000 to 3,000 car loads yearly.

The purchase was revealed Tuesday during testimony before

an Interstate Commerce Commission examiner, John F. Collins, in hearings at the Latham Federal Center.

Raymond B. George, general manager of the M-K-T, said the railroad presented evidence at the hearings that indicated the line is losing money.

Opposition to the closing of the line was offered by railroad union representatives.

A ruling on both the purchase and abandonment of the remainder of the line is expected during the summer, ICC officials said.

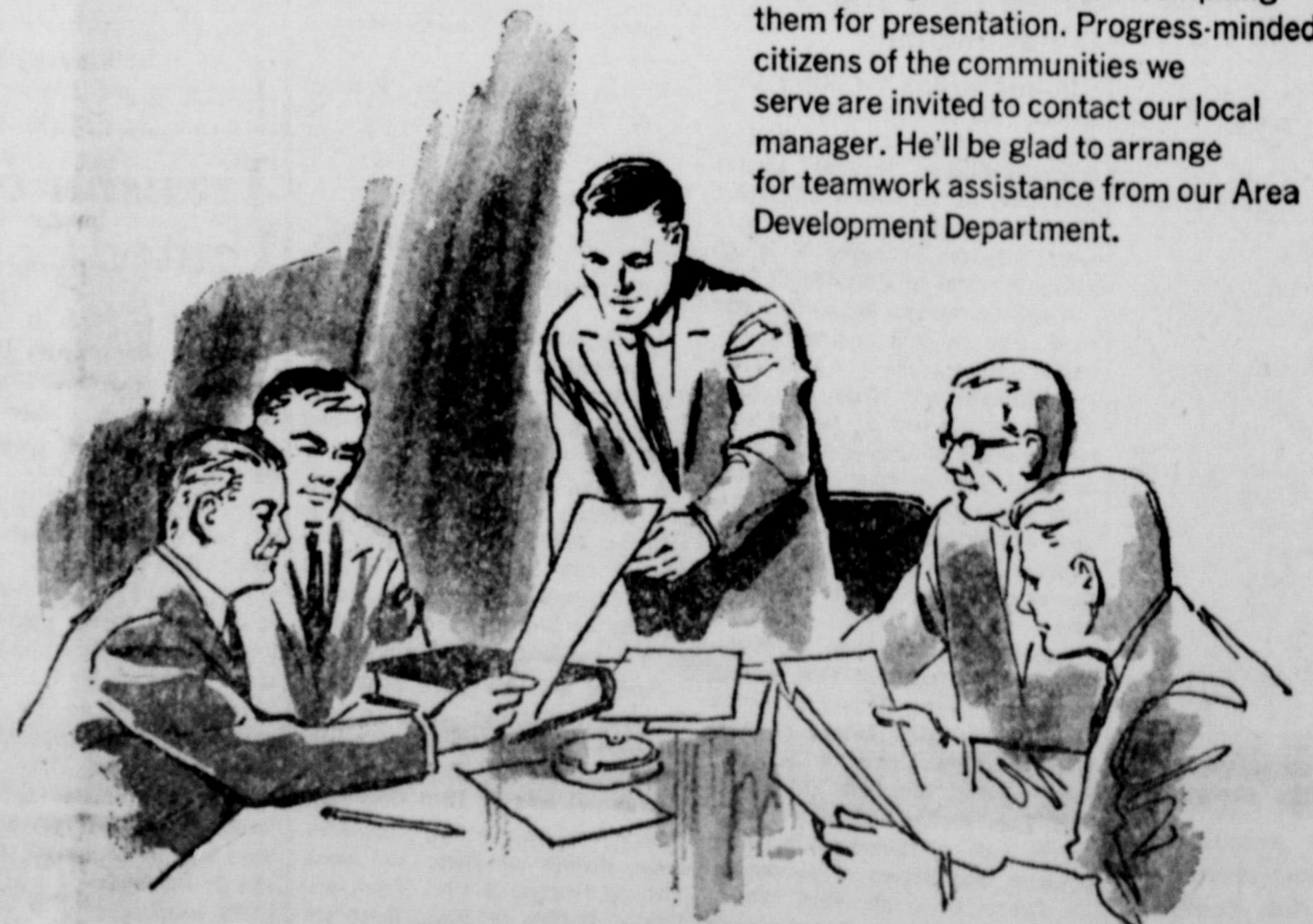



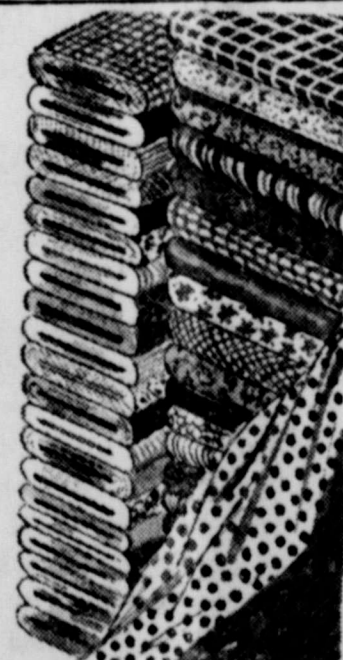

Karen was released Saturday morning and they too were really glad to get started home and also to learn that the daughter's illness could be controlled by medication. Our daughter, Mrs. Carl Ray Sellers came down and spent Wednesday and Thursday with us letting Mrs. Allison go home for two days. Mrs. Sellers drove out to Killeen Wednesday night and spent the night with her daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Turner, Keith and Kim. Mrs. Turner came over Thursday and visited with us, and also D. E. We lost 11 pounds while there according to their scales, but according to ours only 9. Our sincere thanks to all who sent cards and letters. 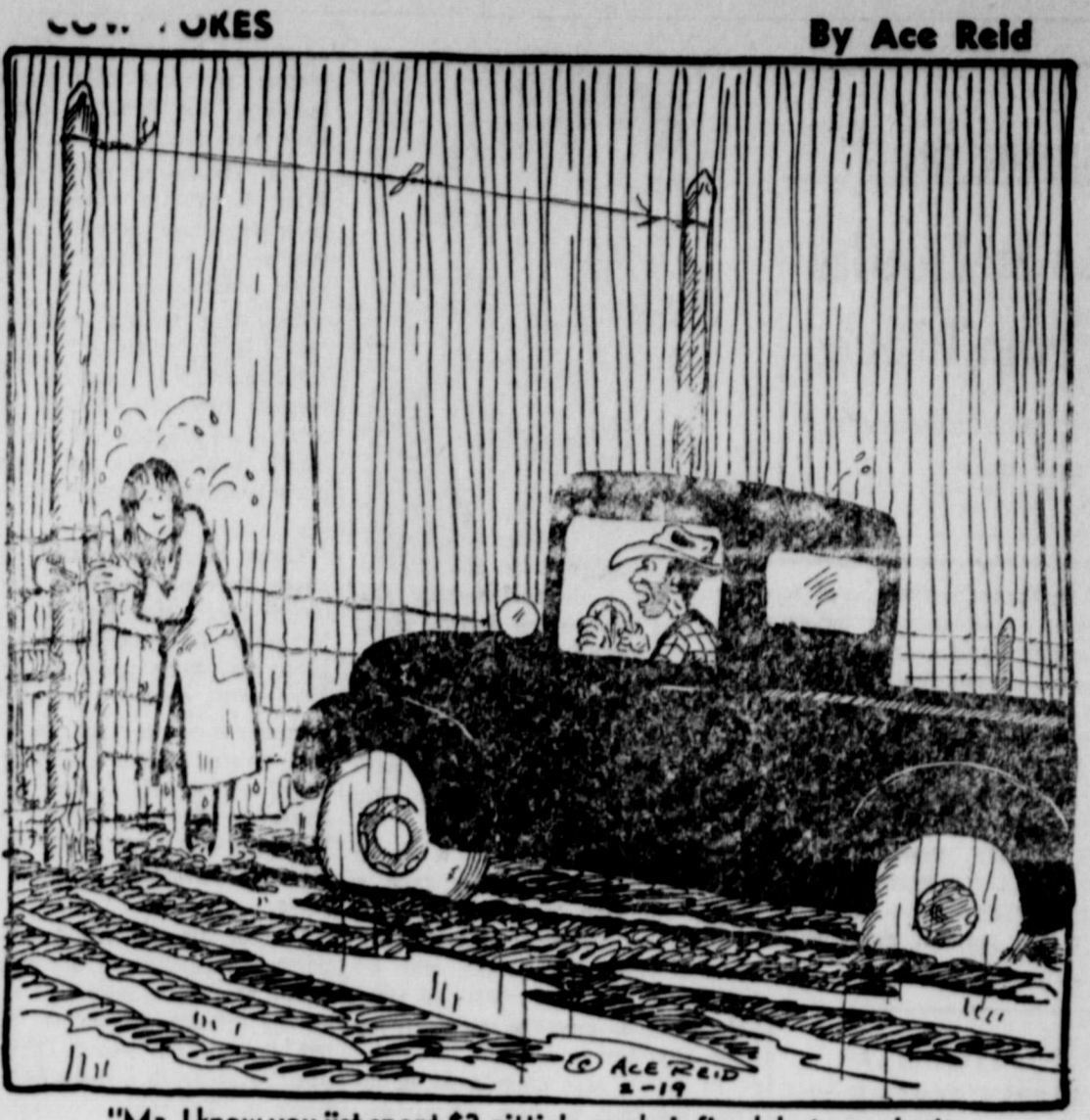

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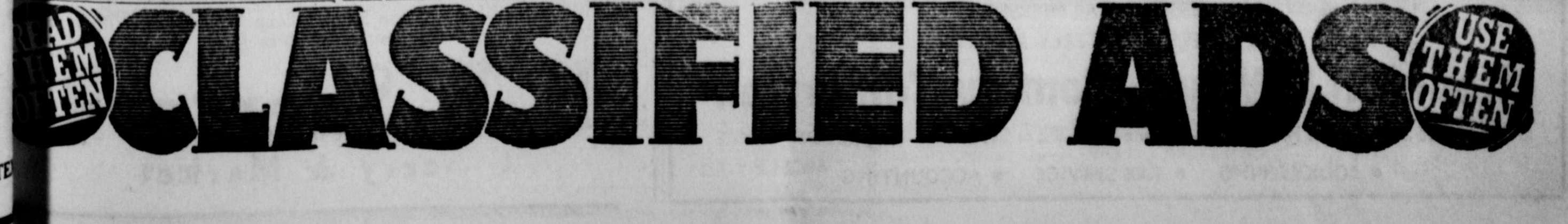

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—The use of poison gas was internationally outlawed following World War I. At that time there was no real concept of biological or chemical warfare other than the use of Mustard Gas. As of today, should nations having germ warfare capability put it to full use, it could, by comparison making bombing appear humane. There are gases which can kill suddenly, paralyze the body for short or long periods; those which

attack the brain and destroy reason, and those which destroy living cells, including plant life. The spreading of germs may even be more devastating because of their ability to create a chain reaction. Crucial days could pass before people even knew they had been attacked. The United States is a large country but it would not take a large attacking force to carry out a surprise biological assault. Our own mobility as a people, with jet airplanes and other modes of travel, would do much of the work for the attacker.

or about 5 percent of our total population, go about their accustomed business, not knowing that they have been attacked.

The trillions of minute droplets from the clouds released by the submarines are aerosols of potent strains of the Pneumonic Plague germ (Pasteurella Pestis).

According to the experts, this "bug" is one of the oldest and fiercest enemies of mankind. In the bubonic form, the plague has killed more humans than all wars combined. Researchers say that the pneumonic type is ever more deadly.

Tests have shown that the disease does not manifest itself for about three days. The victim then has a sudden headache, loss of appetite and fever above 104 degrees. Chances of recovery are slight.

Imagine that the submarine's attack comes in this month of February on a bright morning. San Francisco becomes fully awake. Los Angeles girds itself for its morning adventures on the freeways.

Two of the nation's busiest airports are readied to accommodate 20,000 passengers who will enplane during the day for points throughout the United States. They will also be going to Sydney and Hong Kong and Tokyo.

Before the day is over the plague will have been carried into American cities with a total population of more than 75 million people. Passengers exposed to the germ in San Francisco have deplaned in Chicago, Pittsburg, Philadelphia, New York and Boston. From the more southern part of California, others have gone to Dallas, Mexico City, New Orleans, Miami, Atlanta and Washington, D.C.

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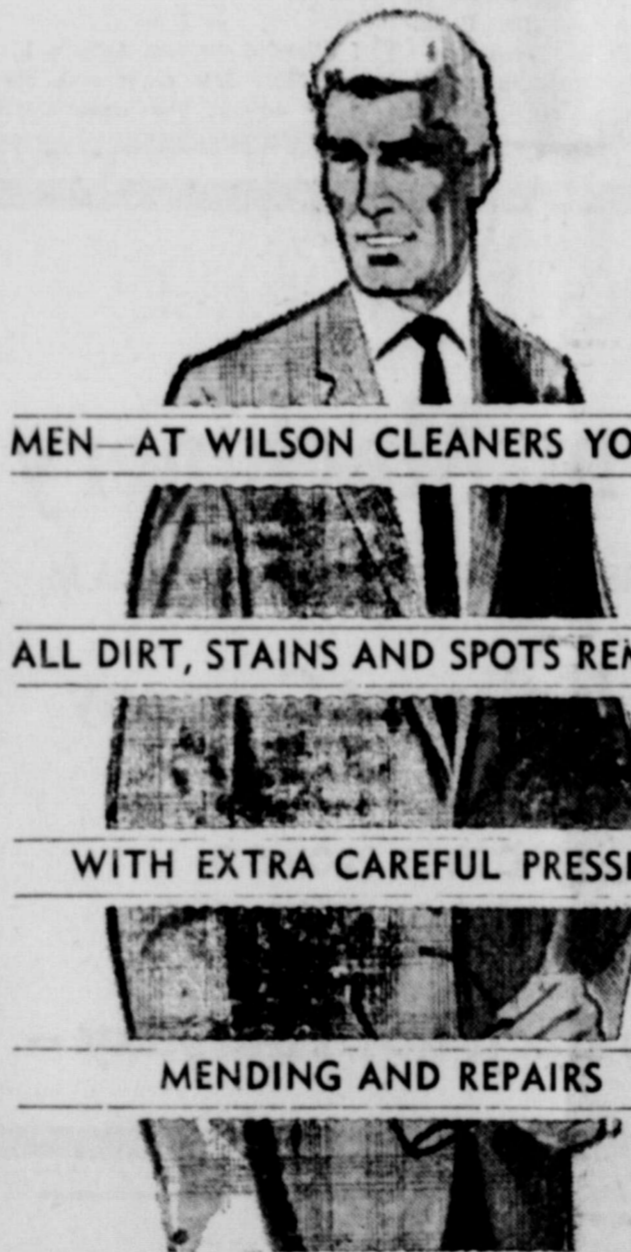
