

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

Fractured 'Filosophy...

One hundred years ago, March 1. 1867, my paternal grandfather hired to a man who had a contract to haul corn for the government from the railroad in Waco to an Army outpost located between Canyon and Amarillo. Grandad had to agree to work a year at a time, and he would not get paid until the end of the year. He was to get \$6.00 monthly, plus his food and bed. Of course his bed was a blanket roll, and was slept on wherever night might overtake the ox wagon cara- and Barbara Baley won second.

There were some sixty or seventy wagons, each wagon was drawn by six oxen, and the load consisted of about 70 bushels of shelled corn. The wagon box was covered by a wagon sheet to protect the corn from the weather. A supply box was mounted on the rear of each wagon. In this box each driver kept his bed roll, clothing, and any other personal needs he might have. Chuck wagons traveled along with the freight wagons, and the cooks drive their own wagons. The drovers walked along beside his lead yoke of oxen, and by use of a bull whip, a check rein, and rather a colorful vocabulary, he was able to keep the oxen in line with the wagon train. The caravan covered a distance of 15 to 18 miles a day, and it took almost three months to make a round trip. Camp was made wherever night overtook the caravan. The wagons were drawn up to make a circle to provide a corral for the oxen at night, and to give protection in case of attack by Indians or outlaws.

Grandad had fought in the Civil War on the side of the Confederacy, and at the close of the war the South was bankrupt, and one had to do whatever he could to get a new start in life. The whole country was in a state of disruption, and very little trust could be placed in anyone. One had to be very careful about choosing friends, as you had no way of knowing whom you might be associating with. Crime of every kind was being done by people in all walks of life, and this forced a respectable person to stay pretty well to himself.

However, grandad had made friends with one man in the wagon train. Each evening grandad and his friend passed away the time by playing card games. Throughout the whole year grandad had been able to be much the better player of the two, and almost always won the games he and his friend indulged in. Of course no one had any money, and the games were played just to pass the time. and for pleasure

Grandad planned to work one year with the corn hauling, and when he got his \$72.00 for the year's work, he would be able to do something else. This much money would give him a start toward doing something for himself. The year passed by, and each man was paid \$72.00 in gold for his work. Just as soon as the men had received their pay, grandad's friend insisted on playing cards, this time for money, as they both now had money. Grandad tried to tell his friend it could not be a fair game, and he did not want to win his hard earned money, but the man continued to insist they have a game anyway. Finally grandad consented to join in the game with his friend and the lesson he learned was long to be remembered.

The man who had pretended to be his friend for the past year, and who grandad had been able to beat with all ease in cards, showed himself to be a very shrewd card player and cleaned grandad out very quickly.

Grandad had now lost his year's work, and the other fellow had doubled his pay with grandad's loss. There was only one thing to do. sign up to haul corn for another year, and be sure no one had the chance to get his pay the next time. This he did, and the lesson learned was worth the price, grandad insisted, as long as he lived.
