Upper Bosque Watershed Project Ahead of Schedule

Construction in the Upper Bosque Watershed is running a year ahead of schedule, according to Marion Porter of the Soil Conservation Service in Stephenville. Since construction operations began in 1965, fifteen structures have been built, or are now under construction. Two other of the floodwater detention dams are scheduled for contracting before June, 1967.

Porter said that the original plan called for 12 dams to be built the first two years. He added that the additional construction is a direct result of the efforts by local sponsors and individual landowners in the securing of easements and application of land treatment measures needed to protect the structures.

Construction has been completed on Sites 4, 5, 13 and 14 above Stephenville, and on Sites 18, 19, 20 and 21 located between Stephenville and Hico.

Sites 1, 2, 8, 12, 17, 24 and 26 are now under construction at this time. Darco Construction Company of College Station is the contractor on Sites 1, 2, 24 and 26. Day Ex-

The 1967 Houston Livestock Show last week was quite an experience. The exhibits building is adjacent to the Astrodome. It is extremely large and it takes all week to become familiar with it. The way the building is constructed, one place in it looks exactly like another.

To illustrate my point I would like to tell you of a little incident that happened soon after we arrived. I hope John Wayne Reich of Carlton 4-H doesn't mind me telling this.

Tuesday morning John and I were awake early. John fed his calf and then decided to give her a bath. He took his heifer to the wash rack and then went back to get some soap and other gear. He returned to the wash rack some five minutes later and his heifer was gone. Obviously she became untied or someone had helped her. John decided. His next step was to come running to me explaining how his calf had disappeared. The first thing I did was to check all of the washracks thinking that he had probably lost his directions and put her in a different place, but I didn't find her. We continued to search every nook and cranny and had it announced over the speaker system thinking that someone would find her. A policeman was helping hunt her and kept suggesting that she had been stolen since she had been missing this long.

Damon Chumney, West Point 4-H'er, caught his calf in the scramble Saturday afternoon. The 12-acre cow pasture covered by the Astrodome is a big place to catch a 300-pound calf in. To make it even a little more exciting there were 12 calves and 24 eager 4-H'ers. To me this is the best part of the rodeo.

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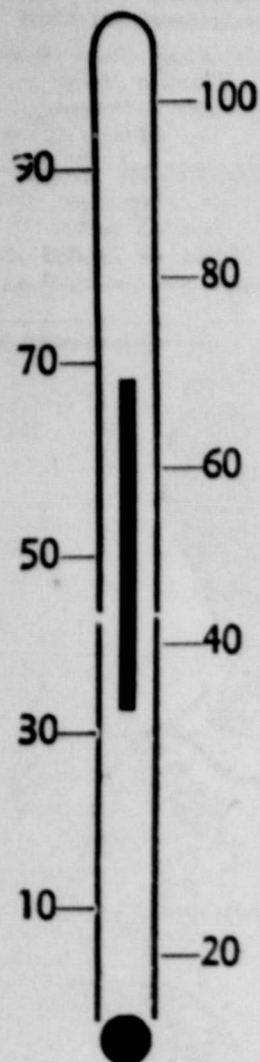

On the Home Range

Brussels sprouts are the littlest members of the cabbage family. The young plants look much like cabbage plants, but as they mature tiny buds form on the stalk. These buds develop into miniature heads similar to common cabbage.

Dozens of these sprouts cluster on a stalk shaded by large spreading leaves at the top. When the sprouts are about one inch in diameter, they are ready for harvest. The best sprouts have a bright green color, compact leaves, and are small and uniform in size.

Fractured 'Filosophy...

Recently in a political satire, we introduced the Honorable Ichabod Eaglefanter, Senator of *&%. Space prevents dealing with but a few of the policy changes our Iccy would like to see brought about in Government, so we should like to enlighten you, our reader, further, to wit:

"The political goal that used to be set for the farmer and his prosperity, was the cow, the sow, and the hen, but this is very outdated. Today what every farmer needs is a Rolls Royce, a pair of water skis, and a good credit at the bank. 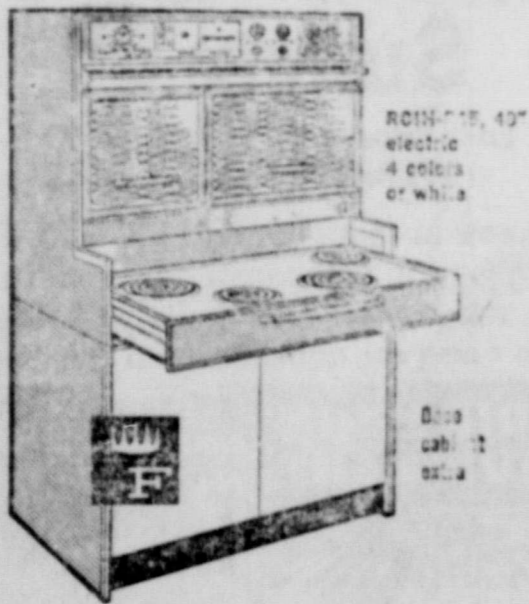
