## Entries Down, Quality Up At Annual Stock Show

A warm, clear day greeted exhibitors at the 20th Annual Hico Livestock Show held last Friday at City Park, and 324 animals went through the judges during the day. The number was short of the expected number, but officials and exhibitors alike felt that what the show lacked in numbers was more than made up for in the extra quality of livestock entered. Record for the show is 350.

Last year the show drew 342 entries, with an exceptionally strong sheep division pushing the number to 82. This year 82 sheep were shown, compared to the 120 here last year. All other divisions in the show were up in numbers from a year ago.

Judges for the show last week were Dr. Tim R. Mason of Tarleton State College, livestock, Joel Hill of the Texas Extension Service, and dairy animals, and Mar-

tin Schrank, Pottsville agriculture teacher, who judged the dogs. Harold Walker, local FFA Chapter Advisor, sponsors of the show, expressed his appreciation to exhibitors and spectators for their interest, and to local merchants for their support in making the show a success.

It comes much too late to do much toward salvaging a small-grain chop, but will help to make a crop in isolated areas.

The week of March 19-25 has been designated as National Poison Prevention Week. Its purpose is to call attention to the dangers created by the increasing use of such toxic substances as medicines, polishes, cleaners, solvents, pesticides and others.

Some 600,000 Americans may suffer from accidental poisoning this year unless people become more careful about handling and using harmful chemicals. Over 80 percent of the victims will probably be children under 5 years of age.

Among the most common sources of poisoning are medicines, including aspirin; household items such as kerosene, lighter fluid, furniture polish, paint, shoe polish, turpentine, pesticides, insecticides and rodenticides.

Farm chemicals, garden supplies and poisonous household items should be stored under lock and key, especially if small children are present. Small children cannot read and do not recognize the danger.

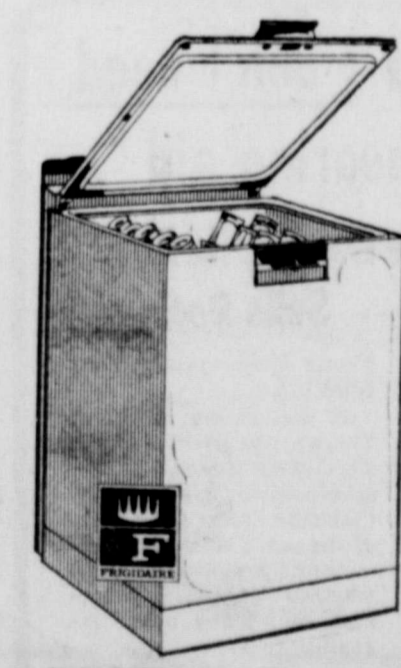

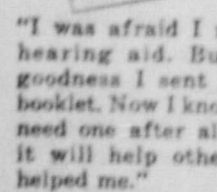
