## Local Man Gets \$3,000 Grant From U. of South Carolina

Gary W. Duncan, member of the mathematics department at Sam Houston High School, Arlington, has been awarded a \$3,000 grant by the University of South Carolina to attend its academic year institute for high school teachers of mathematics, Dr. W. L. Williams, institute director, has announced.

The institute, sponsored by a grant from the National Science Foundation, will run through the academic year beginning September 1967. Its purpose is to provide teachers with an opportunity to improve their subject matter compe-

tence, to gain a better understanding of some of the modern basic concepts of mathematics, to increase their skills as teachers and to strengthen their ability to inspire students to choose careers in mathematics.

Some 3,000 applications were received and Duncan was one of 30 applicants accepted for study.

Duncan, a native of Hico, attended Tarleton State College, Baylor University and Texas Christian University. He received his B.S. degree in mathematics education from North Texas State University in May, 1963.

Duncan, who formerly taught at Lovington, New Mexico, will complete work toward his master's degree at NTSU in May.

The teacher plans to attend The University of Texas at Arlington this summer in preparation for the program at South Carolina in September.

Gary is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Buster Duncan of Hico.

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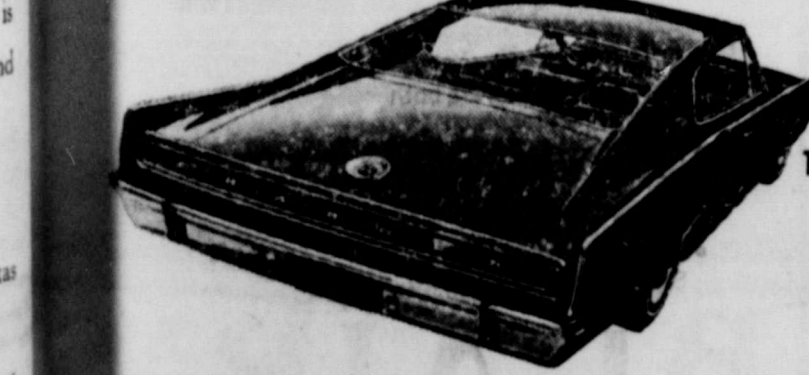

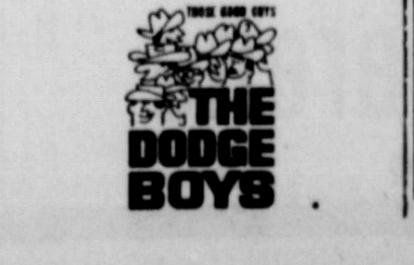

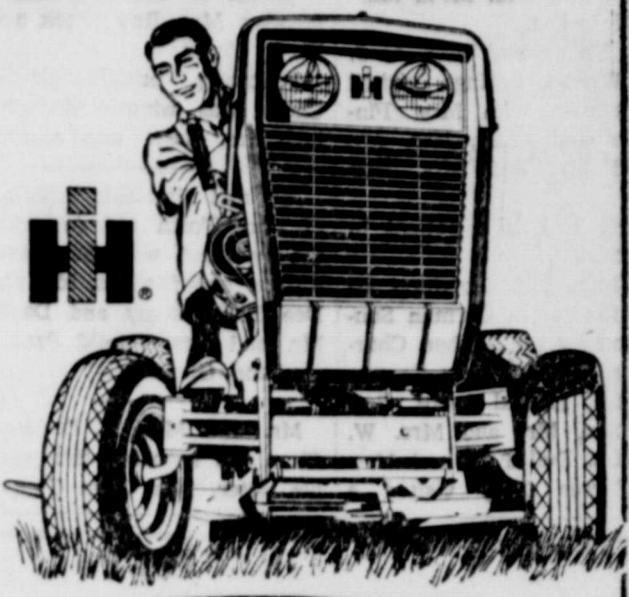

### Fractured 'Philosophy'...

#### "CAT MAN"

Several years ago one of my very good friends and his wife moved out of civilization to a ranch far out in Southwest Texas. It was more than 20 miles to the nearest neighbor's, and almost 40 miles to town. The ranch life was not too lonely, as both my friend and his wife were very busy keeping the many chores of the ranch under control. All went well for several months, until one day a letter came stating the wife's mother was very ill, and needed her daughter to come to her bedside. He hurriedly killed the cat, cut him open, and grasping the intestines began sewing up his incision. The job finished, my friend lay back in relief. He had saved his life by taking action to do what had to be done.

The other fall she described to me had happened just a few days before I arrived for my visit. While working at the top of the windmill, something broke loose and pitched my friend out into midair. Again he plunged earthward, head down, but just before hitting, again he flipped over, landing on his feet. "Just like a cat," she declared. 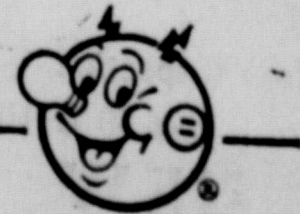

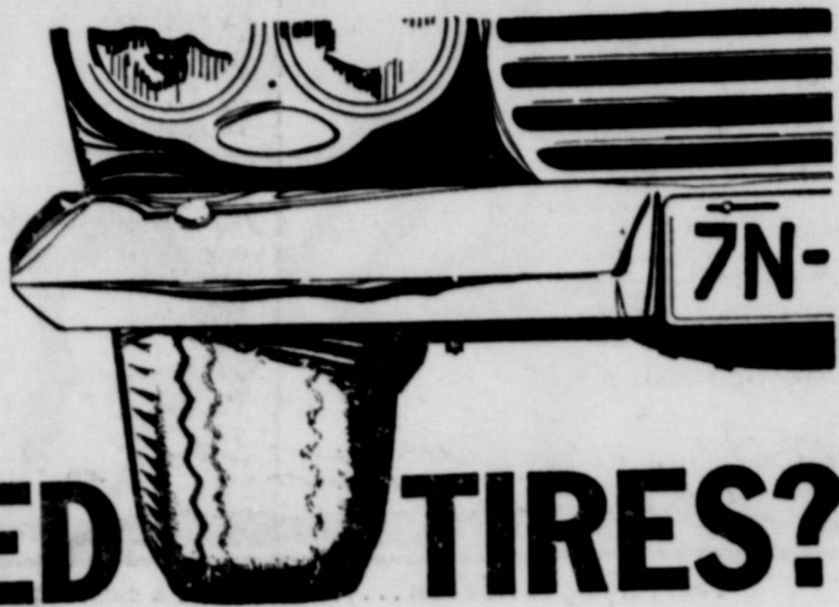
